

Reagan 'Joins' the Partnership' with National Hispanic Scholarship Fund

President Ronald Reagan "Joined the Partnership" in support of higher education for Hispanic college students during an Oval Office Meeting with officials from the National Hispanic Scholarship Fund (NHSF) and Anheuser-Busch Companies executives last week, in commemoration of National Hispanic Heritage Week.

The meeting was a part of NHSF's annual development program, which was launched earlier this year with the announcement of \$1 million in support from Anheuser-Busch Companies.

A major component of the 1987 development program, under the theme, "Join the Partnership" is fundraising. With activities scheduled for September, October and November, NHSF will hold 33 fundraising events throughout the United States.

In Lubbock, a reception will be held during November to honor local NHSF scholarship

recipients. Aside from the fundraising activities, NHSF is developing an alumni network, local action committees in selected cities and an Education Support Group.

NHSF officials present for the Oval Office event were: Archbishop Patrick Flores, NHSF president; Ernie Robles, NHSF executive director; and NHSF board member Clifford Whitehill, senior vice president and general counsel for General Mills, Inc. in Minneapolis; Ricardo Nunez, chairman of the board for Interstate Bank of Commerce in Miami; Paul Sedillo, secretary of Hispanic Affairs for the United States Catholic Conference in Washington, D.C.; and Gilbert Chavez, senior staff member of the Federal Interagency for the Department of Education in Washington, D.C.

Representing Anheuser-Busch Companies were August A. Busch III, chairman of the board and

president, and Jesse Aguirre, vice president of Corporate Relations. "We are proud of the accomplishments of NHSF," said Busch. "NHSF has already helped thousands of Hispanics in the United States, and we intend for it to help thousands more with our support."

Founded in 1975, NHSF awarded its first scholarship a year later. Since then, the organization has provided a total of \$3.6 million in scholarships to more than 6,000 NHSF scholars throughout the United States. Recipients include students of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban,

Caribbean, and Central and South America descent. NHSF scholars are selected on the basis of academic achievement, personal strengths, leadership abilities and financial need. Corridos! To Be Shown On Local PBS Channel 5

Based on Valdez's stage hit, the one-hour entertainment special, airing Wednesday, October 7th at 8:00 p.m. on PBS, Channel 5, Lubbock, dramatizes five vibrant Mexican-American ballads.

Long before television and radio, "los corridos" were the singing voice of the people along, above and below the two thousand-mile U.S.-Mexican border. These vibrant songs of names and places, faces and events, heroes and tragedies are vividly dramatized in *Corridos! Tales of Passion and Revolution*, a KQED/San Francisco special produced in association with El Teatro Campesino, premiering Wednesday, October 7th at 8:00 p.m. on PBS. Written, directed and starring El Teatro Campesino founder Luis Valdez, the production realizes the dramatic potential of the most famous and tuneful Mexican-American folk ballads, or "corridos". Brought to life through a rich combination of story, music and imaginative art direction, these ballads carry the viewer from Mexico in the late 1800s to 1920s America. Completely adapted for television from the acclaimed El Teatro Campesino stage production, *Corridos! Tales of Passion and Revolution* features members of the original cast and new artists, including popular songstress Linda Ronstadt. "I learned my first corrido literally on my mother's knee," says writer/director Valdez. "You get it with mama's milk. I also remember growing up and hearing corridos sung at family parties. I was very touched by the whole generation that sang corridos. I thought it would be tragic if this fold tradition were lost, and I wanted to find a way to preserve it. I also realized what rich material there was that would involve both music and theater, material that really cried out for visual interpretation. That's how our original stage production evolved.

"We were fortunate Linda Ronstadt joined the project," continues Valdez. "Her vocal range is incredible—from the

Una Pieza del Rompecabezas de la Enseñanza: Involucración De los Padres de Familia

Cuando alguien me pregunta por qué los padres hispanos de familia no se involucran en la enseñanza de sus hijos, les cuento acerca de mis padres.

Mi escuela primaria, predominantemente hispana, estaba congestionada sobremediana. Tuvo sesiones dobles hasta el cuarto grado. La mitad del campo de juegos se usaba como lote de estacionamiento para los maestros, y no había cafetería ni locales para reuniones.

Cuando mis padres y otras personas se organizaron y trataron de llevar sus preocupaciones a la escuela, no se les recibió con agrado. Se necesitó de una "huelga sentada" en la oficina del director antes de que este se hallara dispuesto siquiera a hablar con ellos. Esto se produjo después de las amenazas hechas al grupo de padres y madres, de que se les arrestaría si no se marchaban.

Por último, después de que no hubo cambios, los padres recurrieron a la única alternativa que les quedaba. Boicotearon a la escuela durante una semana y, junto con sus hijos e hijas, recorrieron la línea del piquete, exigiendo una enseñanza de buena calidad.

Cerca de 15 años después, aquella escuela tiene uno de los mayores recintos de Los Angeles. Aunque funciona todo el año para acomodar a su alumnado numeroso, ahora tiene algunos de los locales que nuestros padres exigieron hace decenio y medio. No sé cuántos de los cambios son el resultado de su interés, pero sospecho que aquel interés ayudó.

No fué fácil el que mis padres y los demás adoptaran dicha postura. Recuerdo que estaba entonces en el quinto grado, y que recorría concienzudamente la fila del piquete con mi madre y mi hermano menor. Se necesitó un interés genuino por parte de mis padres para desafiarse al sistema de aquella manera.

Un estudio reciente halló que los padres hispanos tienen mayores "aspiraciones" en cuanto a la enseñanza de sus hijos que los padres no hispanos, pero que también tienen "expectativas" muy bajas. Para muchos de nosotros, los que estamos involucrados en la enseñanza, esto no es ninguna sorpresa. Cuando se examina la ejecutoria de las escuelas respecto de los hispanos, no es extraño que los padres hispanos no esperen que sus hijos no reciban una enseñanza de buena calidad.

Se presumiría que hay una conexión natural para los hispanos entre la enseñanza y la familia. Ambas son preferencias de alto nivel, que se mencionan en casi todos los estudios de la comunidad. Hay, sin embargo, muchos obstáculos — algunos muy reales, y otros creados artificialmente.

Los estudios de escolaridad nacionales muestran que hasta un 56% de los adultos hispanos pueden estimarse como analfabetos funcionales en inglés, y que más de la mitad de los jóvenes hispanos adultos no tienen habilidades de instrucción por encima del nivel rudimentario. Esos bajos niveles de

escolaridad hacen difícil para los padres el dedicarse a las actividades de aprendizaje tan críticas como leerles a sus hijos. La carencia de habilidades fundamentales o avanzadas hace difícil para ellos el interpretar y analizar los cursos de acción escolares que puedan ser perjudiciales.

Aun así, las escuelas pueden hacer mucho para cultivar y explotar el interés elevado de los padres hispanos por la enseñanza de sus hijos. Pueden emplear a trabajadores bilingües de enlace con el exterior. Pueden suministrar servicio de guardería infantil durante las conferencias entre maestros y padres. Pueden explicar el plan de estudios y el efecto de los cursos de acción escolares a los padres. Pueden efectuar adiestramiento en el trabajo para los maestros acerca del modo de trabajar con los padres y las madres de familias.

La asociación entre las escuelas y las organizaciones e instituciones de la comunidad hispana puede producir una tremenda involucración de parte de los padres. Estos grupos tienen acostumbradamente personal bilingüe que puede ayudar a los padres y maestros a sobreponerse a sus ansiedades mutuas. Aún antes de que los chicos se matriculen en la escuela, pueden desarrollar programas para enseñar a los padres el modo de trabajar con sus hijos en sus casas. Los programas destinados a los padres también pueden ayudar a fomentar la escolaridad, el análisis de los cursos de acción escolares y la involucración.

Cuando nuestras escuelas no adoptan esta clase de iniciativa, la participación de instituciones intermediarias, tales como las organizaciones basadas en la comunidad, y las iglesias, resulta crítica.

Los programas federales pueden ayudar a unir a los padres y a las escuelas. El proyecto de ley

compreensivo aprobado por la Cámara de Representantes de los Estados Unidos en Mayo último contienen dos disposiciones destinadas a adentrar a los padres con conocimientos limitados del inglés y escolaridad reducida en el trámite de la enseñanza. Tales disposiciones exigirían que se pusiera la información sobre los programas a la disposición de los padres de familia en forma comprensible para ellos. El Senado podría agregar disposiciones comparables cuando volviera a autorizar los programas de enseñanza compensatoria y bilingüe.

Si hemos de romper el ciclo de analfabetismo hereditario, deberían de ampliarse los programas federales tales como el de Alfabetización Familiar en Inglés. El proyecto de ley sobre Conocimiento del Inglés ofrece otros instrumentos.

Cuando los padres están involucrados, los adelantos académicos de sus hijos mejoran. En las comunidades hispanas, la involucración de los padres no puede ser únicamente una alternativa. Debe de ser un elemento fundamental del programa de estudios de la escuela.

A medida que comienza el nuevo curso escolar y que muchos padres y madres llevan personalmente a sus hijos a las escuelas, está madura la oportunidad para que las escuelas se comuniquen con ellos.

Algún día, espero interesarme tanto por la enseñanza de mis hijos como mis padres lo hicieron por la mía. Para entonces, según espero, las escuelas serán verdaderamente aliados.

To earn the title of West Texas music awards, the process of selecting what artists and music to vote on should be on a wider more accurate scale than that which Mr. Rick Benavidez, owner manager of KTLK is doing.

The radio stations of West Texas should conduct the nominating of artists and music, then the people of West Texas "y somos muchos chicanos" should vote. The people of West Texas listen to a wide variety of music due to the numerous stations that we have in this part of the state, and lots of really good music that never even gets air play on your station. Every major city from the Permian Basin to El Paso to Amarillo has a station and even the smaller communities have one. Let us the people of West Texas choose our favorites, not you Mr. B. Actually, it is the bands that play at your special events and concerts that get the credit where it's not deserved, namely artists for Cara and CBS records in San Antonio.

I cannot believe how you robbed the truly favorite artists of West Texas last year and left out some of the best music in Texas from your list of favorites. Examples:

either by the leadership or by Hispanics in general. In politics, it is the unanimity of voters toward issues--not the issues themselves--that count.

Accordingly, the dilemma with Hispanics in politics is not a failure to recognize the problems affecting the group. It is, rather, a failure to achieve a semblance of unanimity. And this is no easy task.

How can one, for example, reconcile Linda Chavez, the executive director of U.S. English, who believes that if Hispanics do not care enough to learn English they should not be allowed to vote, with that of the more Hispanic view of bilingual ballots?

Drafting political agendas is the task of bureaucrats and even of academicians. Forming consensus and forging alliances are the tasks of politicians. But they should be able to barter the political power they have achieved without fear that they may offend those who provide them with grants, funds or political recognition.

Hispanic political power lies in building constituencies in the neighborhoods, not in rehashing ideas in conference halls.

Hispanic Leaders Need Constituencies, Not Agendas

Starting in October, Hispanic leaders from throughout the country will begin formulating a "Hispanic agenda," a consensual anumeration of issues most important to U.S. Hispanics. The issues are those which they feel ought to be addressed by 1988 presidential candidates and which they hope will be implemented into public policy by the incoming administration -- whether Democratic or Republican.

From a bureaucratic point of view, this perhaps is a good idea. The bureaucratic mind, after all, is very much at ease drafting agendas, dissecting ideas, arguing points and fine-tuning phraseology, much too often, alas, to the point of turning it into incomprehensible jargon.

If this effort indicates something, it is that Hispanic leaders still are pretty much bureaucratic. They still are tied to their roots--the myriad of War on Poverty programs spawned during the 1960s which, in effect, co-opted many of them by offering them, ironically enough, positions of bureaucratic leadership.

Many have obviously forgotten that one can't be a true advocate for no-nonsense social change by depending upon those who benefit from or are content with--the status quo.

Those who give grants, from beer companies on up to the federal government, can also take them away, thus creating a political dependency in the very name of fostering independence.

From a hard-nosed political perspective, a Hispanic agenda is futile, not only because there is nothing much it can contain that will elicit ethnic solidarity, but because political agendas become superfluous in the brusque give-and-take of politics.

The best proof of that is San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros. Cisneros is generally credited with having brought up the idea of a national Hispanic agenda during this summer's League of United Latin American Citizens convention in Corpus Christi, Texas.

By far the brightest Hispanic light in this country's political firmament, Cisneros is very careful not to identify himself as a spokesman for Hispanic concerns. It is a role that restricts, not expands, political influence. But while restraint may be a sound

political strategy on his part, it doesn't do too much for any Hispanic agenda.

If Cisneros, a heavyweight, won't push it, who will?

Remember Walter Mondale? The 1984 Democratic presidential candidate was one of the strongest supporters of Hispanic issues both as a U.S. senator and as vice president. But during the 1984 campaign, as he felt the political wind blowing ever so strongly in the opposite direction, Mondale became increasingly lukewarm to "Hispanic" issues, including our Central American policy and the then-Simpson-Mazzoli immigration bill.

Mondale's sheepishness surfaced even after a massive voter registration drive had supposedly registered more than one million new Hispanic voters, the vast majority of whom leaned to the Democratic Party, and after being assured by Hispanic leaders that Hispanic voters would be mobilized.

In reality, there is very little that can be enumerated in Hispanic agenda that has not been enumerated publicly many times before.

If Hispanics have a commonality, it is their poverty and their dismal record in educational achievement. To be sure, there may be a consensus on pverty and the need to better the educational system, but there certainly is no unanimity regarding solutions,

Do or Die For Backs To The Wall Red Raiders



Amid a region-wide apathy and defeatism born of a near-decade of losing, the Texas Tech Red Raiders prepared this week for Saturday's television-dictated noon kick-off against the nationally 15th-ranked Texas Aggies.

Tech's deeply disappointing 36-22 last week to Baylor in Waco, also locally televised, apparently triggered a gloomy mood that contrasted sharply with Lubbock's first, bright days of autumn.

Only about 40,000 fans are expected in Jones Stadium for the game, which will be televised locally by Raycom on Channel 11.

The Aggies were listed as prohibitive 11 point betting favorites as of Wednesday afternoon.

The Raiders committed seven turnovers in their conference opener, losing a game they should have won.

The Aggie offense will be led by youthful QB gunslinger Lance Pavlas, who will be throwing against a suspect defense, and sophomore speedster Darren Lewis.

More impressive so far, though, has been the Aggie defense, especially up its middle.

Nose guard Sammy O'Brien, LB Jon Roper, and SS Chet Brooks.

The Aggies blitz often, so all three of the above Aggies may come at once against Tech's highly-regarded offensive line, led by guards Mike McBride and Jeff Keith.

After their defeat last week, the Raiders' backs are up against the wall. That conference opening defeat will cost them dearly in the standings, and after A&M, they get Arkansas next week at Jones.

NFL STRIKE

Who Are These Guys? Scrubs & Scabs on TV

While the real players for the 28 National Football League teams will park their Mercedes and walk picket lines like ordinary union laborers Sunday, scrub-stitute scab teams will resume NFL play.

At SPORTSWEEK deadline Wednesday afternoon, the players' strike that cancelled all games last weekend and threatens to trash the 87 NFL season seemed farther from solutions than ever.

Union representative Gene Upshaw vowed the union would "do whatever's necessary to stop these games," according to the Associated Press.

In rebuttal, Miami Dolphins owner Joe Robbie said "the fight is over control of football, it's not over money. Owners are not going to surrender control of the games to the union."

Meanwhile, figurehead NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle told

the Dallas Morning News that the two sides "were too far apart" for him to intervene.

While small crowds are expected to show up at stadiums across the country Sunday, the ultimate winner of the owner-union battle ultimately may be decided by the real source of money and power in professional football, the commercial entertainment television networks.

Under the present NFL-TV contracts, the networks are not obligated to carry "replacement" NFL games, and whether they will carry the games may be decided by how many people watch them.

If ratings drop, big bucks corporate sponsors will drop their advertising, and the networks will zap pro football. Already, Chysler and Ford have bugged out of TV sponsorship, USA Today reported last week.

Monday, two teams whose mathematical chances of winning the West Division pennants were deemed as high as players' salaries clinched their divisions.

The Minnesota Twins edged the Texas Rangers 5-3 in Arlington and the San Francisco Giants edged the San Diego Padres 5-4 on relief pitcher Bill Robinson's 8th inning home run and three innings of scoreless pitching.

NL playoffs begin Tuesday, and AL playoffs begin Wednesday. Both championship series, preludes to the World Series, are best of seven matchups.



world of rock 'n roll, to country, the world of swing, operetta, and now to traditional Mexican music. Having her musicality allows the true emotional range and impact of these stories to come to life."

"I love Mexican music," confesses Ronstadt. "You see, it's really part of my background. My grandfather was Mexican American and led a band in the late 1800s in Tucson. He taught my father hundreds of Mexican songs. So, I knew a lot about Mexican music and culture since I was a young girl. Working on Corridos! was, in a strange way, like living through a memory."

"You know, Lola Beltran (a famous Mexican singer) was my idol when I was a kid," continues Ronstadt. "I just loved to hear her sing... And I really wanted to sing like that when I sang rock 'n roll... That kind of edge on my voice."

Daniel Valdez was also impressed with Ronstadt's musical range. "She was born to sing this music," notes the music director and conductor, who sings two duets with Ronstadt in the special. "I've been a real fan of Linda's for years, and when she did the Blue Bayou song in Spanish, I said, 'Wow! Her voice is really something.' I didn't realize that her style of singing could be so Mexican. Her expression of certain words came so naturally."

Daniel Valdez conducts some considerable musical forces on the show. In addition to Ronstadt, Corridos! features America's premier mariachi group, Los Camperos, with whom Ronstadt has previously appeared.

"People complain that Mexican music is dead, that it's under glass in a museum," continues Daniel Valdez. "But that's not true. Especially for the corrido, because it was created for people to change, to add to, to create new verses for. It was meant to be passed from generation to generation. It's a very special kind of medicine for the human spirit."

Concurs Luis Valdez, "Yes, that's the secret to the energy and spirit behind the corrido. You take your life experience and you incorporate it into your song. That means you're able to survive, you're able to pass on your experiences to the next generation, which is the essence of the corrido tradition—it's something that's passed on."

A veces estamos convencidos hasta de devolverle mal al que nos ofendió porque creamos que eso es "valentía," mientras pensamos que eso de perdonar es señal de "cobardía". Y por eso, a los que somos cristianos, y que no por eso dejamos de ser humanos, se nos hace muy duro perdonar como Cristo nos pide en el Evangelio. Algunas personas piensan que en el Antiguo Testamento todo es "Ley del Talio", que dice: "Al que te saque un ojo, tu sacale otro ojo", y "al que te tumbale un diente, tu tumbale otro diente"; y eso hace vengarse. Pero no es así; la primera ley de los humanos se ha ido purificando, poco a poquito, hasta llegar a formarse, muy clara, la Ley del Perdón. Dios dice que El va a vengarse de los vengadores... Pero si perdonamos las ofensas que nos haga nuestro prójimo, Dios nos va a perdonar nuestros pecados cuando le pidamos perdón. (Eclesiástico 27, 33 y 28, 9). Dios nos ayuda a sentir la necesidad que tenemos de ser perdonados. Pero, nosotros tenemos que perdonar para merecer el perdón de Dios. (Mat. 6, 14-15).

Los discípulos de Jesucristo conocían esta ley pero no estaban

seguros de como tenían que practicarla. Por eso Pedro, que no sabía que iba a ser el primer Papa "Jefe de la Iglesia", le preguntó al Señor Jesús: "Si mi hermano me ofende, cuantas veces tengo que perdonarle? Hasta siete veces? Pero que sorpresa se llevo Pedro y los demás discípulos cuando Jesús les dijo: "No nomas siete, veces, sino hasta setenta veces siete." Con esto, Jesús esta diciendo que para un cristiano, no existen limites en el perdón. Tenemos que perdonar siempre que nos sintamos ofendidos. En San Mateo 18, 21-25; Jesús nos pone en claro el sentido de la Ley de Amor y nos cuenta una parábola para que veamos la diferencia del perdón que nosotros esperamos de Dios, y el perdón que nosotros debemos de ofrecerles a nuestros hermanos: Dios te ha perdonado una deuda grande, y tu debes de sentirte obligado a perdonarles las deudas chiquitas o grandes a los que te han ofendido. No hagamos lo que aquel hombre de la parábola, que fue perdonado por su patron pero,

despues, el no quiso perdonar a otro que le debía una insignificancia. Y cuando el patron supo lo sucedido, lo llamo y le dijo: "Siervo malo...tu tambien debes de tener compasion de tu companero, como yo tuve compasion de ti". Y luego, no lo solto hasta que pagara todo lo que debía. Pues lo mismo va a hacer Nuestro Padre Celestial con cada uno de nosotros, si no perdonamos de corazon a nuestros hermanos. (Mat. 18, 21-35); Si decimos que Dios nos ha amado a nosotros antes de que nosotros lo amaramos a El, tambien nosotros tenemos que afirmar que El nos perdono primero a nosotros. Toda la Historia de la Salvacion es la manifestacion del Amor de Dios al que va unido Su Perdón. Para eso nos dio esa prueba mandandonos a Su Hijo, para que en El encontráramos la reconciliacion con Dios. Lo unico que nos exige es que perdonemos, "de corazon", como El nos perdona, para que seamos dignos del perdón que Dios nos ofrece.

El Desafio Del Discipulado

Pero siempre se arrepintió y obedeció a su padre. A veces nosotros mismos y con Dios. Entonces, pidámosle Su poder para obedecerle aún cuando no queramos.
