El mejor compositor del año fue Carlos Cardenas. Los otros tres nominados fueron Leon Pulido, Pacido Salazar y Luis Silva.

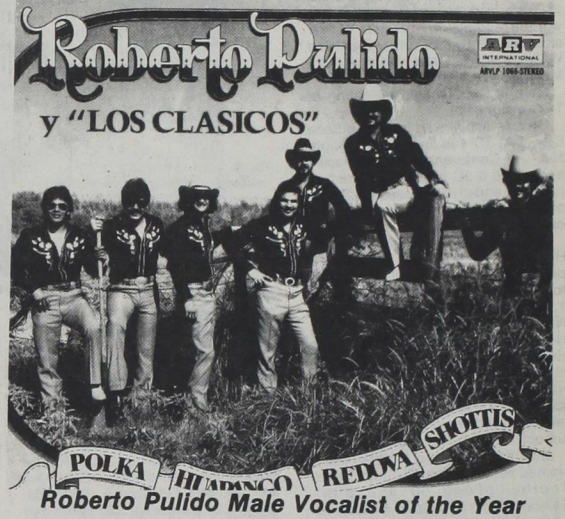

Hispanos Nombrados Al Gabinete

Washington — Un grupo de líderes hispanos celebró una reunión con un alto funcionario la Casa Blanca para considerar la forma en que sus comunidades pueden contribuir a la formulación y ejecución de la política del gobierno del presidente Ronald Reagan.

Circulos hispanos criticaron en semanas recientes las pocas designaciones de representantes de sus comunidades en los más altos niveles del gobierno de Reagan, aunque el presidente en su reciente conferencia de prensa pidió que no se lo juzgara hasta que se terminasen de hacer las alrededor de 17,000 designaciones que acompañan el cambio de gobierno.

En ultimos dias el presidente Reagan anunció que nominará a Michael Cardenas de Fresno, Calif., como director de la Administración de Pequeños Negocios (Small Business Administration, SBA.)

Por otra parte el Senador Harrison Schmitt, Representante de Nuevo México, fue informado de fuente oficial que el Presidente Reagan nominará, a mediados de

esta semana, al doctor John Hernandez de Las Cruces, Nuevo México, como Delegado Administrador de la Agencia de Protección Ambiental (Environmental Protection Agency).

Cárdenas de 47 años, socio de la firma Nacional Contable Fox & Co., ha permanecido activo en las líneas republicanas de California desde 1967. Anteriormente fue miembro del Consejo Regional de la S.B.A. en Fresno y San Francisco.

Hernandez de 51 años, educado en Harvard y especializado en Ingeniería Ambiental y Recursos Acuáticos, fue Decano del Colegio de Ingeniería de la Universidad de Estado de Nuevo México desde 1975 hasta 1980; actualmente continúa en esta Universidad como catedrático.

Los dirigentes hispanos, representantes de varias organizaciones, se reunieron con el director de desarrollo de política de la Casa Blanca, Edwin J. Gray, para plantearle sus deseos de que hay "una activa participación de hispanos en la formulación y ejecución de política en todosel gobierno."

A Dissenting View to U.S. Immigration Study

Si yo tuviera la alternativa desafortunada de tener que recomendar todas las propuestas elevadas al Presidente y al Congreso por la Comisión Selecta sobre Política de Inmigración y Refugiados, o de no recomendar ninguna, recomendaría dejar la ley como está hoy. Al tiempo que abrigo los sentimientos más fuertes de que nuestros estatutos y prácticas nacionales sober inmigración no están funcionando, llego a la conclusión de que las recomendaciones, como un todo, trabajarán con menor eficacia.

El criterio de última instancia en lo tocante a una política chere sobre inmigración debe ser lo que resulte más beneficioso al interés de la nación. Ese interes resultará servido interiormente al continuar el objetivo humanitario de reunir las familias y de fortalecer nuestro crecimiento económico. Internacionalmente, debe fomentar la paz y la estabilidad.

Las realidades internacionales afectan a la inmigración. Los

países en vías de desarrollo están sufriendo un crecimiento de población sin precedentes, mientras que los ya desarrollados, incluyendo al nuestro, experimentan tasas de nacimientos cada vez menores, proyectando escasez de mano de obra. Se espera que México aumente su población de 65 a 100 millones de personas para fines del siglo. Mientras tanto, los factores economicos continuos — la inflación, los impuestos más elevados, los costos en aumento de la mano de obra y los materiales — estan forzando a las compañías estadounidenses a relocalizarse en naciones en desarrollo y a unirse al número creciente de corporaciones multi-nacionles que no conocen fronteras nacionales.

Lamento que la Comisión no estudiara adecuadamente si debieramos tener una relación especial con el Hemisferio Occidental. Quizás entre 1 1/2 y 3 millones de inmigrantes mexicanos se hallan dentro de nuestras fronteras sin la documentación apropiada. Mientras que nuestros estatutos escritos no permiten dicha entrada, nuestra ley de hecho la anima. La ejecución

relajada de la ley de inmigración y la necesidad que alegan los negocios estadounidenses de tener una provision abundante de mano de obra sin habilidad y barata, ha ayudado a crear un gran numero de personas que viven fuera de la protección de nuestras leyes, una sub-clase de seres humanos sin poder, carentes de derechos humanos. Eso es algo que ningun democracia puede aceptar.

Estoy de acuerdo con el criterio de la Comisión, de "legalizar" a los indocumentados. El método que se recomienda, sin embargo, es defectuoso.

Primero, la Comisión ha destacado que la ejecución estricta de la ley debe preceder o ir paralela al programa de legalización. Si una persona indocumentada se presenta, creyendo que tiene elegibilidad, pero se equivoca al adovinar, se arriesga a que la deporten. No se establecieron razones para la exclusión. La mayor parte de los indocumentados son personas trabajadoras — de la clase que ha engrandecido a esta nación. Em-

If I had the unfortunate choice of having to recommend all of the proposals forwarded to President and the Congress by the Select Commission on Immigration and Refugee Policy, or none, I would recommend leaving the law as it is today. While I entertain the strongest feelings that our national immigration statutes and practices are not working, I conclude that the recommendations, as a whole, will work less well.

The ultimate criteria for a cohesive immigration policy must be whatever is in the best interest of the country. That interest will be served domestically by continuing the humanitarian goal of family reunification and by fortifying our economic growth. Internationally, it must promote peace and stability.

International realities affect immigration. Developing countries are undergoing unprecedented population growth while the developed countries, including our own, are experiencing declining birth rates, projecting shortages of labor. Mexico is expected to increase its population from 65 to 100 million by the end of century. Meanwhile, continued economic factors — inflation, higher taxes, increased labor and material costs — are forcing American companies to relocate in developing countries and to join the growing number of multinational corporations which know no national bounds.

I regret that the Commission did not adequately consider whether we should have a special relationship with the Western Hemisphere. Perhaps 1 1/2 to 3 million Mexican immigrants find themselves within our borders without proper documentation. While our written statutes do not permit such entry, our de facto law encourages it. Law immigration enforcement and the claimed need by U.S. businesses for a plentiful supply of unskilled, cheap labor has helped to create a large group of persons living outside the protection of our laws, an underclass of powerless human beings devoid of human rights. That is something no democracy can accept.

I agree with the Commission's response to "legalize" the undocumented. The recommended method, however, is defective.

First, the Commission has stressed that tough enforcement must precede or go hand-in-hand with the Openrec or go hand-in-hand with the legalization program. If an undocumented person comes forward believing eligibility exists but guesses wrong, deportation is in the offing. No grounds for exclusion were established. Most undocumented are working people — the type who have made this country great. Yet because they are not monied, an unsympathetic legal interpretation could deem them likely to become public charges. The Commission set no qualifying period for residency requirement can be lengthy, nor can it ignore the migratory nature of some undocumented if the "legalization"

program is to succeed.

Second, the Immigration and Naturalization Service will apparently be in charge of the program. Right or wrong, the INS is viewed by the undocumented and by representatives of religious and other organizations which help the undocumented as a hopeless anti-alien agency — the "enemy."

Third, the Commission report seems to disfavor the Mexican, who represents only one half of the undocumented but in 1979 represented 93 percent of those apprehended. The enforcement programs stress border control. The Commission approves current enforcement priorities in which only a small portion to the enforcement budget deals with the non-Mexican (much of it European) undocumented.

The Commission's proposals will drive the undocumented, particularly the Mexican undocumented, further underground. In 1976, an Australian "legalization" program reportedly attracted less than 20 percent of that country's undocumented. I estimate that a program structured pursuant to our recommendations will draw as few as 2 percent.

The goal should be to have every undocumented immigrant come forward. Those who are eligible should be documented. Those who are not should be offered temporary status with the opportunity, after a few years, of qualifying for permanent residence.—B

Tech's '81 Football Signees

For the skeptics who said Texas Tech's 1981 recruiting efforts would be badly damaged with the coaching change, Jerry Moore can now look back and smile.

The Red Raiders recently signed 22 players who Moore feels will become definite assets to the football program in the future.

"We missed out on three weeks," Moore said of the Raiders' absence period when Rex Dockery left and Moore arrived. "But we came back strong. We missed out on some, but it could have been a heck of a lot worse. It certainly was no disaster. We really did well with running backs."

Moore and his staff inked nine of the top 100 players in Texas (according to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram). Plus, it was announced that quarterback Layne Walker of Clovis, N.M. and running back Mark Williams of El Paso have transferred to Tech from other universities and will be eligible in the fall. Walker attended SMU for one year and Williams started two years at New Mexico.

Here is the alphabetic listing of Tech's signees:

Hasson Arbubakrr, from Pasadena City, CA, JC and Weequahick High, N.J.—All-Conference at defensive end on 10-0 JC team voted No. 1 in nation at end of regular season. Team captain. Team was 19-2 during JC career.

Gerald Bean, 6-0, Running-back, Houston Yates—Texas Football's preseason first team all-state. Was fourth leading rusher in Houston with 1,221 yards and 8.4 average as senior. Named to Star-Telegram's and Houston Post's Top 100, All-Greater Houston by Post and All-Greater Houston Super 60 by Chronicle. Had 804 yards in backup role as junior. "He's a slashing type runner and a good receiver," says high school coach Luther Booker.

Sid Chambers, Line, Burkburnett—Named second-team All-State, Texas Football's Top 90 and Star-Telegram's and Houston Post's Top 100. Three-time All-District. Considered one of top linemen in state.

Ansel Cole, running-back, San Antonio Jay—"By far the fastest football player in San Antonio," says coach L. G. Henderson. Sparked team to Class 5A state semifinals. Rushed for 1,149 yards on 122 carries for 9.4 average. Named to Texas Football's Top 90 and Star-Telegram's and Houston Post's Top 100. Named All-City and All-District 30-AAAAA.

Tim Crawford, 6-3, line, Houston Kashmere—Named All-Greater HSD at offensive tackle and All-District 19-AAAAA by Chronicle. Captain of

district championship team. "He's been our most outstanding blocker for the past two years," says coach Johnny Felder.

Scott Davis, 6-3, Line, Plano—Named All-Metro at defensive tackle by Dallas Times-Herald. Played both ways the last month for state 5A finalist.

Wayne Dawson, 6-0, Fullback, Temple-Team was 25-1 during two

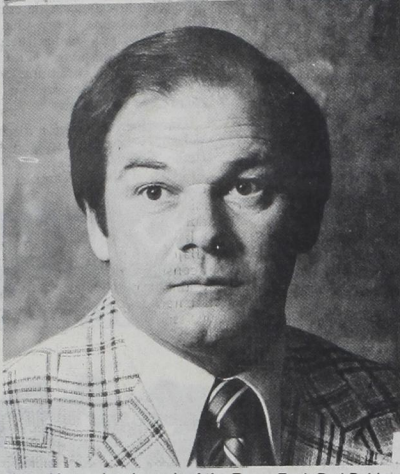
Rushed 1,276 as a senior and 1,100 as a junior. First team All-District and District Offensive Player-of-the-Year. Broke nine tackles on one run against McKinney senior year.

James Martin, 6-2, Linemen, Klondike—All-State at nose-guard as junior. Also played tight end. All-South Plains three times and All-District three times both ways.

Joe McMeans, 6-2, linebacker, Jayton—First-Team All-State by TSWA. All-District at linebacker and fullback.

Don Oberdeck, 6-2, line, Plano—Named All-Metro offensive lineman by Times-Herald. Helped team to state semifinals and 12-2 record. Played little as a junior but late blooming helped Plano develop excellent inside running attack.

Tony Pullins, 6-2, linebacker, Houston Aldine—Leading catalyst on team that won nine straight and 21-AAAAA title. Named to Star-

year starting career, including state championship junior year. Team was ranked No. 1 during senior year regular season. All-central Texas and All-District 15-AAAAA at running-back. Gained 871 yards on 120 carries and scored 10 TDs. "Wayne is a bullish type runner with 9.9 speed," says coach Bob McQueen.

Mark Gold, 6-5, Tight-end, Round Rock—Named All-district 15-AAAAA and to Star-Telegram's Top 100. Caught 21 passes for 350 yards and three TDs as senior.

William Harris, 6-1, linebacker, Houston Stafford Dulles—Injured with broken arm halfway through senior season. Also played guard on offense. All-district 25-AAAAA as sophomore and junior.

Willie Johnson, 6-3, line, Shallowater—Named All-South Plains and All-District. "One of the best defensive linemen we saw on film this year," said recruiting coordinator Taylor McNeal.

Robert Lewis, 6-1, running-back, Greenville—Named to Texas Football Top 90 and Star Telegram's Top 100. Team was 10-0 and beat Plano 10-7, but lost title due to ineligible player.

Telegram's Top 100, Texas Football's Top 90, Houston Chronicle's Super 60 and All-Greater Houston by Post and Chronicle.

Rusty Roark, 6-2, quarterback, Monahans—Passed for over 1,000 yards and rushed for 700 more. Team led nine-team 2-AAAA in total offense with 324.7 per game.

Troy Smith, wide-receiver, Amarillo Palo Duro—Named to Star-Telegram's and Houston Post's Top 100. Caught 32 passes for 581 yards and gained 258 yards on 42 carries. Team captain. All-Panhandle and All-district 3-AAAAA two years. League's

offensive Player of the Year.

Buzz Tatom, 6-3, tight-end, Richardson High—Texas Football's Top 90. Five of his 13 catches went for TDs. Also started at defensive end. Bench presses 360.

Ronnie Thomas, 5-10, running-back, Victoria Stroman—First team 5A All-State by TSWA. Named Texas Football's Top 90 and Houston Post's Top 100. Rushed for 1,382 yards on 225 carries and 18 TDs. Had best game of 242 yards against Lamar Consolidated. Had 1,055 yards and 15 TDs as junior despite missing three games with injury.

Joe Walter, 6-8, line, North Garland—All-District at offensive tackle. Could grow to 280.

Keven Williams, 6-4, quarterback, Houston Lamar—Named to All-Greater Houston Super 60 by Chronicle and Star-Telegram's Top 100. Led city of Houston in passing. Completed 71 of 178 of 1,145 yards and four TDs. Best game was 17 of 29 for 238 yards.

Jerry Zachery, 6-2, running-back, Midland High—Houston Chronicle Top 60, Texas Football Top 90, Star-Telegram and Houston Post Top 100. Broke leg in second game of senior season. Brother James started two years for A&M. Called by one UCLA scout as one of the best I back prospects in the country.

Offensive lineman, Bobby Prince was a new 1981 football signee who was added to the list Tuesday.

Prince, a 6-4, 220-pounder who is from Waco is the 23rd player who was added with the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Disabled should not wait

Workers in our area suffering from a physical or mental impairment which prevents them from working should consider applying for social security disability benefits when its it appears this condition will last 12 months or more.

Social security disability benefits can be paid to workers under 65, disabled widows and widowers 50 or older, and to unmarried adults. Social security disability benefits can be paid to workers under 65, disabled widows and widowers 50 or older, and to unmarried adults disabled before reaching 22.

Under social se security, a person is considered disabled if he or she has a condition which prevents him or her from doing any substantial gainful work and is expected to last for at least 12 months or to

result in death.

No payments can be made to a disabled worker, widow, or widower for the first 5 months of disability.

Before a persona applies for disability benefits, it will be helpful if he or she gathers certain information. This will help speed up the application process. This includes:

The person's social security number.

Date last worked

Date person became sick or was injured.

Type of illness or injury.

Date returned to work, if no longer disabled.

Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, institutions, or clinics that provided treatment for the disability and

dates of treatment.

Military service serial number and VA claim number if available.

List of kinds of jobs performed in previous 10 years.

Names, social security numbers, and dates of-birth of spouse and children.

Birth certificate.

Birth certificate.

Workers' compensation number if any.

A person should not delay applying if all this information is not available. The people at the social security office may be able to help. They can give more information about disability benefits. The office is located 1205 Texas Avenue Rm 102, Lubbock, TX and the telephone number is 762-7385.

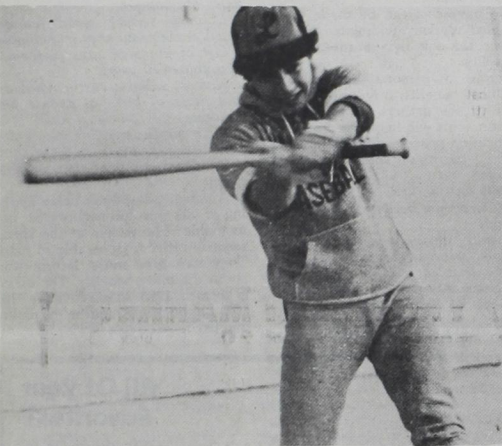

Tech Competes In Texas Invitational

A last chance effort to qualify for the AIAW National Championship awaits several members of the Texas Tech women's swimming and diving team when the Red Raiders compete in the Texas Invitational Friday and Saturday in Austin.

Coach Sue Larson said she is very confident that the meet will produce some national qualifiers for the Red Raiders.

To date, diver Becky Bryant is the only Raider to qualify for nationals March 18-21 in Columbia, S.C. Bryant will compete in the one-meter diving event.

Two Texas Tech relays and one individual swimmer are within tenths or hundredths of seconds from qualifying for the national competition.

Tech's 200-yard Medley Relay just missed qualifying for nationals last weekend at the State TAIW meet in Houston. The Raiders finished with a time of 1:50.31, good enough for a third place in the event, but 2/100's of a second off the 1:50.29 qualifying mark.

The Red Raider 200-yard Free Relay was disqualified at state but will have another chance to try and meet or better the 1:37.59 national qualifying time.

Individually, Tech's Janie James is only 15/100's of a second off the 50-yard backstroke time. At the state meet, James swam a 28.14, just short of the 27.99 national mark.

Several other Tech swimmers have a shot at the national meet, Larson said. These include Dorinda Jung in the 50- and 100-yard freestyle events, Amy Thorpe in the 100-yard freestyle, Debbie Kaufman in the 50-yard butterfly and Cynthia Rinehart in the 100-yard individual medley.

When Larson took over reins as head coach for the Raiders, the swimming and diving team several goals for the 1980-81 season. One of those goals was to rewrite the record books at Tech. The Raiders set 10 school records while in Houston at the state meet. A total of 17 school records have been set by the Raiders this season.

SWC Tournament At San Antonio

Texas Tech made its sixth straight appearance in the Southwest Conference Post-Season Tournament's host city this week when the Red Raiders meet Texas in a quarterfinal match at 9 p.m. Thursday at San Antonio's HemisFair Arena.

Texas Tech had a 15-12 season record to San Antonio while Texas entered the 6th SWC Classic with a 13-14 record on the season. Arkansas went into the tourney with a 22-6 record while Houston had a 19-8 mark with Baylor going in with a 15-11 record TCU went in with a 10-17 record for the season.

Texas Tech owns a 33-27 edge over the Longhorns in the series that began in 1939. The two teams split their two SWC games this season with the Raiders winning in Lubbock 89-79 while the Longhorns prevailed in Austin 65-54.

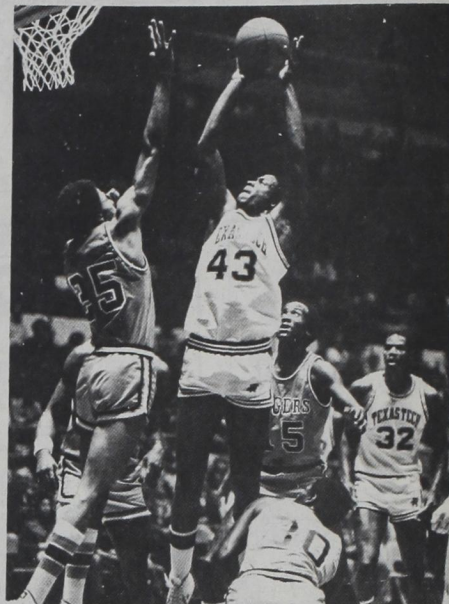
Also, Texas Tech owns a 30-23 edge over Arkansas in the series that began in 1942. The Razorbacks are currently on an 11-game winning streak over the Raiders. The 'Hogs ran their streak to 11 by sweeping both SWC games over the Raiders this season. Arkansas won in Fayetteville by a 60-35 score and in Lubbock by a 64-61 count.

Texas Tech has won 10 while Houston has won eight in the series that began in 1961. The Raiders and Cougars split a pair of league games this season with Houston winning in Houston, 73-70 while Tech won in Lubbock by a 81-70 count.

Texas Tech has won 35 while Baylor has won 21 in the series that started in 1937. Baylor won this year's game in Waco by a 69-61 while Tech won the two team's meeting in Lubbock by a 56-53 count.

Texas Tech has won 46 while TCU has won 24 in the series that began in 1932. The Raiders won both contests with the Frogs this season to run their winning streak to 19 in the rivalry with TCU. The Raiders won 57-54 in Lubbock and 70-60 in overtime in Fort Worth.

Red Raider coach Gerald Myers is 190-103 since becoming the Texas Tech coach at mid-season, 1971. His overall record is 222-146. Against tourney teams, Myers is: 15-7 against Texas; 20-3 against TCU; 18-5 against Baylor; 9-8 against Houston and 10-13 against Arkansas. Myers has never coached a losing Red Raider team.

Taking a look at the other coaches, Texas' Longhorn coach Abe Lemons is 94-51 at Texas since taking over five seasons ago.

Houston's Cougar coach Guy Lewis is 474-232 at Houston in this, his 25th season.

Horned Frog coach Jim Killingsworth is 17-36 in two seasons at TCU. Killingsworth is 156-140 overall in his coaching career.

Bears' coach Jim Haller has won 65 and lost 52 in four seasons at Baylor. Razorback coach Eddie Sutton is 163-43 in seven seasons at Arkansas. The Raiders kept their record of never losing a SWC Tournament first-round game intact by fast breaking by SMU 80-58. Tech also put on a shot blocking exhibition with the Raiders rejecting seven SMU shots with Leslie Nichols with four, leading the way. Jeff Taylor was the Raiders' leading scorer with 19 points while

Ralph Brewster chipped in a season high 17 points. Steve Smith with a career high 14 points and Clarence Swannegan with 12 points were other Raiders in double figures Ben Hill led the Raiders in rebounding with six caroms. In other first round action, TCU eliminated Texas A&M by taking a 62-60 win over the Aggies in College Station while Texas ended Rice's season by downing the Owls 58-44 in Austin.

The Red Raiders' 6-4 junior from Hobbs, N.M., has either shared the lead or led the team in scoring in the last three Tech games. The streak started when he scored 23 points against Texas in Austin. He shared the scoring lead with Clarence Swannegan in the Arkansas game when both chipped in 16 each. He led all scorers in Monday night's first round game when he scored 19.

pero, por razón de que no tienen dinero, una interpretación legal carente de simpatía podría considerarlas susceptibles de convertirse en carga pública. La Comisión no fijó período de cualificación para la residencia. Tal requisito de residencia no puede ser extenso, ni puede pasar por alto la naturaleza migratoria de algunos indocumentados, si es que el programa de "legalización" ha de tener éxito.

Segundo, el Servicio de Inmigración y Naturalización estará, aparentemente, a cargo del programa. Con razón o sin ella, los indocumentados y los representantes de organizaciones religiosas y otras, que ayudan a los indocumentados, ven al Servicio de Inmigración y Naturalización como una dependencia anti-extranjera sin esperanza — el enemigo."

Tercero, el informe de la Comisión parece ser desfavorable para los mexicanos, que representan únicamente la mitad de los indocumentados pero que, en 1979, representaban el 93 por ciento de los detenidos. El programa de ejecución de la ley hace énfasis sobre el control de la frontera. La Comisión aprueba las prioridades actuales de ejecución, en las cuales solamente una proporción pequeña del presupuesto de ejecución se refiere a los

indocumentados no mexicanos primordialmente europeos).

Las propuestas de la Comisión llevarán a los indocumentados, especialmente los mexicanos, a ocultarse más aún. En 1976, un programa australiano de "legalización" se informó que atrajo menos del 20 por ciento de los indocumentados de aquel país. Estimo que un programa estructurado con arreglo a nuestras recomendaciones atraerá tan poco como un 2 por ciento.

La meta debiera ser el lograr que se presentaran todos los inmigrantes indocumentados. Aquellos que fueran elegibles debieran recibir sus documentos. Los que no lo fueran deberían obtener un status temporal, con la oportunidad, después de unos pocos años, de calificar para la residencia permanente.

Nuestra pauta general de inmigración debiera permitir la entrada legal aumentada desde el Hemisferio Occidental, especialmente México. Nuestro gobierno se ha mostrado renuente a reconocer la reclamación legítima al asilo por parte de los que huyen de la opresión dictatorial y del caos de la guerra civil en la América Latina. Los litigios, como el testimonio que se nos ha presentado, han señalado la norma

doble de nuestra nación, que permite la entrada de decenas de millares de cubanos, judíos rusos y otros favorecidos políticamente por nuestras administraciones nacionales, mientras que se rechaza a los haitianos y salvadoreños.

Las leyes que protegen a los trabajadores estadounidenses deben cumplirse energicamente. Un funcionario estatal de California declaró que su oficina equilibraba el cumplimiento estricto de la ley en la industria de la confección de vestidos con la realidad de que la industria mudarse o cerrar si la ejecución fuera enérgica. Nuestro gobierno condona las prácticas de contratar mano de obra barata, dócil e indocumentada.

El Congreso ha dejado de dotar de fondos los programas ya establecidos — por ejemplo, la verificación de los documentos entregados por los visitantes extranjeros a la salida contra los expedidos a la llegada. Necesitamos el cumplimiento enérgico, profesional y constitucional de las leyes de inmigración. Estoy de acuerdo con las recomendaciones de la Comisión en el sentido de que necesitamos agentes fronterizos mejor adiestrados y mejor pagados, así como un ejecución interior vigorosa de la ley. Rechazo los "sistemas de sensores, las avionetas, los helicópteros los dispositivos para ver mejor en la obscuridad, una fuerza de trabajo móvil y el aumento de personal fronterizo." Todo eso suena a zona militarizada. El mejor enfoque es disminuir la presión para atravesar la frontera o para "olvidarse de regresar."

Pongo obediencia a la recomendación de ilegalizar el que los empleadores contraten inmigrantes sin documentos. Esto crearía un gran número de infractores entre los patronos. Únicamente los "seguramente empleables" serían contratados. Aquellos que aparecieran como "extranjeros" por su color, idioma o costumbres, sufrirían de discriminación. Además, cualquier cualquier sistema de identificación universal, ya sea por medio de una tarjeta o de los documentos ya existentes, se inmiscuye profundamente en la tradición estadounidense. A deferencia de la mayor parte de las naciones europeas, nosotros no tenemos una fuerza de policía nacional u otros dispositivo que permita a nuestro gobierno seguir el rastro a cada ciudadano o extranjero.

Debieramos trabajar para poner alto a la dependencia de cualquier

industria sobre los programas de "trabajadores temporeros." Un estudio del Departamento de Trabajo de los Estados Unidos ha dictaminado que: "Una nación que lucha para fomentar la igualdad de oportunidades y el respeto a los derechos humanos se vería en dificultades para hacer frente a las pautas actuales de inmigración ilegal, si importara un gran número de hispanos y los relegara a la condición de segunda clase."

Mi último interés se refiere a la naturalización. La Comisión recomienda el uso continuo del requisito del idioma inglés para la ciudadanía. El informe de la Comisión contempla el idioma como unificador nacional. Creo que eso interpreta mal el carácter de nuestra unión nacional, la realidad de nuestra historia y la diversidad de nuestro pueblo. Los Estados Unidos son una unión política — o una unión cultural, idiomática, religiosa o racial. Nuestras primeras leyes de naturalización no tenían requisito de idioma. Debieramos hacer hoy lo que se hacía antes de que el "nativismo" (un término agradable del principio para describir el prejuicio racial y étnico) del siglo diecinueve se asentara; debieramos dar la bienvenida a los recién llegados con los brazos abiertos, a todas las obligaciones y todos los privilegios de ser estadounidenses completos. Los demás requisitos de la naturalización — que los solicitantes estudien la Constitución, que sean de buen carácter moral y que hayan estado en el país durante cinco años — me parecen razonables. La votación que favoreció el requisito continuado del idioma inglés fue efectuada por medio del correo. Solo dos de nosotros nos opusimos a dicho requisito. Lamento no haber tenido nunca la oportunidad de discutir este asunto en una reunión de la Comisión.

Esta preocupación, me parece, ilustra el camino fácil aunque equivocado que esta Comisión ha recorrido.

Our government has been reluctant to recognize the legitimate claim to asylum by those fleeing dictatorial oppression and the chaos of civil war in Latin America. Litigation, like testimony presented to us, has pinpointed our country's dual standard which permits entry of tens of thousands of Cubans, Russian Jews, and others who are politically favored by our national administrations, while rejecting Haitians and Salvadorans.

The laws which protect U.S. workers should be vigorously enforced. A California State official testified to us that his office balanced strong enforcement of the law in the garment industry with the reality that the industry might move out or close down if enforcement were vigorous. Our government countenances employer practices of hiring the cheap, docile undocumented.

Congress has failed to fund programs presently in place — for example, checking papers turned in by foreign visitors on their departure against those issued on their arrival. We need vigorous, professional and constitutional enforcement of immigration laws. I agree with the Commission recommendations that we need better-trained and better-paid border patrol agents as well as vigorous interior enforcement. I reject "sensor systems, light planes, helicopters, night-viewing devices, a mobile task force, and increase border personnel." This sounds like a militarized zone. The best approach is to reduce the pressure to cross the border or to "forget to leave."

I object to the recommendation to make it illegal for employers to hire undocumented immigrants. It would create a large number of employer lawbreakers. Only "safe hires" will be employed. Those who appear to be "foreign" in color, language or custom will suffer discrimination. Additionally, any system for universal identification, whether by card or presently existing documents, intrudes deeply into the American tradition. Unlike most European

countries, we do not have a national police force or other device which permits our government to keep close tabs on each citizen or foreigner.

We should work to end the dependency of any industry on "temporary worker" programs. A U.S. Labor Department study has concluded: "A nation struggling to promote equal opportunity and a respect for human rights would be hard put to deal with current patterns of illegal immigration by importing large numbers of Hispanics and relegating them to a second-class status."

My last concern deals with naturalization. The Commission recommends the continued use of English-language requirement for citizenship. The Commission report views language as a national unifier. I feel that it misinterprets the character of our national union, the reality of our history, and the diversity of our people. America is political union — not a cultural, linguistic, religious or racial union. Our early naturalization laws had no language requirement. We should do today as was done before the "nativism" (an early nice word to describe ethnic and racial prejudice) of the 19th Century set in; we should welcome the new arrivals with open arms, to all the obligations and the privileges of being full Americans. The other requirements of naturalization — that applicants study the Constitution, be of good character, and be in this country 5 years — strike me as sound. The vote favoring the continued English-language requirement for citizenship was taken by mail. Only two of us opposed it. I regret that we never had a chance to discuss this issue at a Commission hearing. I believe, illustrates the easy but erroneous road this Commission has traveled.

CHS Looks For Coach

Lubbock Independent School District athletic director Pete Ragus said Tuesday the search to find a replacement for Coronado High School basketball coach Barry Arnwine would begin immediately.

Prevenga la descomposición de la madera en las casas

College Station — La tecnología en construcción de viviendas ha aumentado considerablemente durante los últimos años. Sin embargo, muchas viviendas están siendo construidas sin la atención adecuada necesaria para evitar costosas reparaciones en el futuro, indica Chuck Stayton, especialista del área en productos de madera, quien trabaja para el Servicio de Extensión Agrícola de Texas, Sistema de la Universidad de Texas A&M.

La madera de construcción, el "plywood" y otros productos de madera usados en construcción están sujetos a descomposición. Esta descomposición, causada por numerosos hongos que destruyen la madera y se alimentan de ella, puede resultar en fallas estructurales y reparaciones costosas.

"El mejor control para la descomposición de la madera es mantener los productos de madera secos durante su procesamiento, transporte y uso," argumenta Stayton. "Cuando el contenido de humedad de la madera se mantiene a menos del 20 por ciento, la mayoría de hongos causantes de descomposición no pueden atacar la madera."

Stayton señala seis precauciones específicas que se deben tomar para evitar que la humedad del suelo penetre en una casa.

"Ante todo, instale los forros de madera exteriores a seis pulgadas o más arriba de la plataforma de tierra. Asegúrese que cualquier otra parte de madera puede a un mínimo de ocho pulgadas del suelo a menos que haya sido tratado a presión con un producto para preservar."

"En segundo lugar, deje 18 pulgadas o más de espacio libre entre las vigas del piso y el suelo en áreas para gater. Una distancia mayor es todavía mejor."

"Tercero, haga que la plataforma de afuera sea inclinada hacia afuera, para que haya buen drenaje. En algunas zonas puede que sea necesario hacer zanjas (ditch) o colocar tubos de barro enterrados."

"Una cuarta medida es instalar una ventanilla para ventilación de un pie cuadrado por cada 150 pies de espacio libre que haya bajo la casa. Coloque las ventanillas en lados opuestos y tan cerca de las esquinas como sea posible."

"Después, use carpas de polietileno de cuatro a seis milímetros de

grosor para cubrir el suelo del espacio libre que hay bajo la casa, y bajo todas las bases de construcción."

"Finalmente, tome precauciones especiales con los corredores, terrazas y recipientes para plantas rellenos con tierra, manteniendo la tierra a 8 pulgadas más abajo del nivel de todas las piezas de madera que forman parte de la estructura de la casa. Nivele las terrazas de forma que tengan una inclinación alejándose de la casa, para evitar que el agua se estanque," agrega el especialista.

Stayton también sugiere seis precauciones en la construcción de techos para evitar que la madera se pudra.

Para empezar, use tejas de madera de un tipo que sean altamente resistentes a descomponerse o algunas que haya sido tratadas a presión en las regiones en que la madera se pudre fácilmente. También, una inclinación mínima de cuatro pies por cada doce pies es necesaria para evitar que el agua se acumule bajo las tejas.

Segundo, deje suficiente techo que sobresalga para que el agua de las lluvias caiga alejándose de la casa. Se necesita un techo que sobresalga 30 pulgadas de ancho en regiones cálidas y lluviosas, tales como la costa del golfo en Texas.

Después, coloque las tejas del techo por lo menos de tres cuartos a una pulgada más allá de las partes de madera del techo que sobresale y orilla del tejado para evitar que el agua de lluvia corra hacia abajo del techo y por debajo de la orilla de las tejas. Las vigas y vigas de la parte colgante del techo deben ser tratadas a presión o deben ser de madera altamente resistente a podrirse.

La cuarta precaución es asegurarse de que los desagües tengan un desnivel hacia los tubos en que caen para que el agua corra adecuadamente. Mantenga los canales y tubos de desagüe libres de hojas u otras suciedades y sitúelos de forma que el agua caiga sobre un bloque o en los tubos de drenaje.

Finalmente, proporcione alguna forma de ventilación en los áticos. Las ventanillas colocadas en o cerca de la orilla del techo y en la parte colgante del techo deberían proporcionar un pie cuadrado de ventilación por cada 150 pies cuadrados de superficie del ático.

"Los principales problemas de descomposición que han importunado a dueños de casa durante años se pueden evitar dando especial atención a estas áreas problemáticas," argumenta Stayton. "Algunos estudios han demostrado que la negligencia de no seguir estos consejos causa la mayor parte de los problemas de descomposición en casas residenciales. El mejor momento de prevenir la descomposición de la madera es antes de que la casa sea construida."

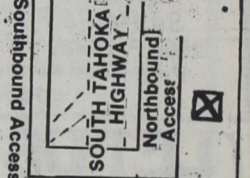

Legislative Update

From Congressman Kent Hance

President Reagan submitted his long-awaited economic package to Congress and the nation during his State of the Union speech February 18. The package has two major provisions: the first is a 30 percent reduction in personal income taxes to be phased in by 1984, along with an accelerated and simplified depreciation schedule for businesses; the second is a major reduction in federal spending and federal programs. The slash in federal programs covered a wide range of areas from Medicaid and certain Social Security benefits to the postal service and Farmers Home Administration loans to farmers. The only major area exempt from spending cuts was defense, for which the President has proposed major spending increases.

SAFE FROM THE BUDGET AX Seven "basic" social programs have been specifically excluded by President Reagan from the proposed budget cuts. The areas the President says he will not cut include: 1) the basic retirement program of Social Security which benefits dependents and survivors as well as retirees; 2) the Medicare program; 3) Supplemental Security Income, which provides financial assistance to the blind, disabled or elderly poor; 4) benefits for veterans with service-related disabilities and for military pensioners-related disabilities; 5) the core of the school free lunch program; 6) Operation Head Start for disadvantaged children; and 7) the summer jobs for youths program.

FEDERAL SPENDING—The biggest issues facing congress this year will be in the area of reducing federal spending programs. It is important that all areas of federal spending be examined for possible spending reductions and that no area be forced to shoulder an unfair portion of funding cuts. I feel that most Americans are willing to make necessary sacrifices in order to bring government spending under control, provided the budget cuts are broad and do not favor any special interest groups.

BALANCED BUDGET—I have long advocated that the United States operate on a balanced bud-

get. Last year I joined Texas Congress, am Ujo Ogra, on signing legislation which would have forced a balanced federal budget. Unfortunately, the bill failed by a few votes. This year, I am again co-sponsoring a constitutional amendment which would require a balanced budget except in cases of national emergency. Although President Reagan (like President Carter) has proposed achieving a balanced budget by Fiscal Year 1984, the Reagan budget projects a deficit of 145 billion in FY 1982 and of 122.9 billion in FY 1983. There are many of us in Congress who are pledged to balance the

budget earlier than FY 1984.

SOCIAL SECURITY—The Social SECURITY SYSTEM WILL BE A MAJOR ISSUE BEFORE Congress over the next two years. Texas Congressman J.J. Pickle is Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Social Security and has begun committee hearings on the matter. While the system currently is fiscally sound, action will have to be taken by Congress this year to ensure the financial strength of the system. President Reagan and many others are proposing major changes in the Social Security system. While I am not currently endorsing any one proposal for changing the system, I am committed to ensuring that it remains financially sound. Allowing the system to go bankrupt would be the worst

possible action for millions of Americans who have paid into the system for years.

1981 FARM BILL—Hearings will begin soon in the House Agriculture Committee on the new 1981 Farm Bill. The Farm Bill will be totally rewritten this year and will vitally affect farmers in Texas. Texas Congressman Kika de la Garza of South Texas is the new Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee and will preside over the full committee hearings. Congressmen Charles Stenholm, Jack Hightower and I plan to hold a series of field hearings in West Texas this spring to receive testimony on the new legislation. We hope to have an announcement soon concerning the time and location of these public hearings.
