

Se Anuncian Los Ganadores Del Concurso de Pintura 1987

San Antonio, Tx-Los ganadores del concurso artístico hispano, "1987 Year of the Hispanic Poster Competition" celebrando 1987 como el año de la mujer hispana, fueron anunciados recientemente por la organización Centro Cultural de las Artes de Guadalupe.

La obra ganadora fue la pintura del artista de San Antonio, Tomás Vásquez, a quien se le presentaron los \$1,000 del primer premio. La pintura será presentada en el cartel oficial de la primera conferencia hispana de mujeres organizada por la Asociación de Mujeres Hispanas de Texas en el Colony Park Hotel de Dallas el 21 de noviembre.

Nueve jueces representativos de diversas entidades seleccionaron los obras de los tres primeros lugares. El segundo y tercer lugar fueron ganados por Jenny Finch, \$750, y Maureen O'Malley, \$500, también de San Antonio.

Más de 50 concursantes

S.P.C. Celebrates 30 Years

The South Plains College is set to celebrate its 30th Anniversary November 21 with a host of activities for area citizens, parents, former students and friends of the college.

The celebration on the Levelland campus will include a Campus Open House, Parents' Day and 1987-88 Homecoming. A special Campus Dedication Ceremony is slated for 2 pm that day.

It was 30 years ago this month that citizens gathered on the Quadrangle of the newly completed Levelland campus to participate in the College's formal dedication ceremony. Texas Gov. Price Daniel was on hand to deliver the dedication address. Also present was State Senator Preston Smith of Lubbock.

The college registered its first class of students on Sept. 15, 1958, and an unexpected 536 people signed up for classes, far surpassing the expected enrollment for the college's first year.

"There is a lot to celebrate at South Plains College this year," said Dr. Marvin Baker, president of SPC since 1961. "We extend a warm invitation for all our college friends, parents of current

students, and SPC alumni to join us in celebrating 30 years of growth and excellence."

Registration for parents, visitors and former students gets underway at 1 p.m. in the Student Center. A special campus dedication ceremony, recreating the one held in November 1958, begins at 2 p.m. Special guests for the ceremony will include former Texas Gov. Preston Smith and Dr. CC. Colvert, retired professor and consultant for union college administration, University of Texas at Austin. Both men, along with a 10-member citizen's committee, were instrumental in lobbying the State Board of Education to approve the establishment of South Plains College in 1957.

The Campus Open House will be held from 3-5 pm. A number of the college's educational programs and departments will be holding demonstrations of training and educational equipment and providing tours through facilities.

Homecoming activities get underway at 6 pm with the SPC lady Texans playing Scottsdale (Ariz.) College in Texas Dome. The Texans will play Cisco Junior College at 8 pm.

Young Parent Services

Young Parent Services is an agency that provides direct services to pregnant teens and teen-parents. The primary focus of the agency is on adolescent parenthood. The aim of Young Parent Services is to help teen parents stay in school and/or find employment. Education and self-sufficiency are major goals at Young Parent Services.

YPS is located at 1717 Avenue K, Suite 227. A young mothers' support group meets weekly, each Tuesday from 4:00-5:30 p.m. This group spends time on social activities as well as educational activities. Several teen parent workshops have been scheduled for the upcoming months. On November 14, Self-Esteem, on January 16, Sexuality, and on February 20, Job Training. All workshops will be held at YPS from 9-11 a.m. Childcare will be provided. Also beginning December 5 parenting skills

classes will be offered on alternate Saturday mornings from 9-11 a.m. On-site childcare is provided for each of these activities.

YPS is currently funded by an ACTION grant. According to Grant guidelines, YPS is striving to have a large volunteer component in their agency. Volunteers are needed to work as "Parent Partners", clerical help, and programming facilitators. Young Parent Services greatest asset will be its volunteers. The first volunteer training and orientation was set for October 29, Thursday from 6-8 p.m. Other training sessions will be held November 19, January 14, February 11, and March 10. Anyone interested in volunteering should call 763-8135.

The agency is open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Most programming is done after school, evenings, and week-ends.

Coalition Holds Fundraiser Sat. & Sun

The Tri-Ethnic Coalition-Unitary Status is sponsoring a Radiothon on Saturday and Sunday, November 14 and 15 through KLF B Radio Station. The American G.I. Forum, a Tri-Ethnic Coalition member, is directing the radiothon in order to raise funds needed to pay legal fees associated with the coalition's opposition to the Lubbock Independent School District's premature unitary status request. The radiothon is scheduled from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm on those two days. Beginning at 8:00 am on Saturdays, Dr. Maria Rivas will provide information to the public regarding the reasons why the 11 community organizations are opposed to the LISD's being declared a unitary system. In addition during the two days through the radiothon, the Coalition will be asking for individuals who have information or examples that indicate that the school district is running a segregated school system or is

guilty of discriminatory practices to call a specified phone number in order to give the information to Coalition member.

As you know, Judge Woodward has signed the consent decree filed by the school district. This decree paves way for the school district to be declared unitary: a district that is free of all evidence of a segregated school system which includes discrimination and unequal educational opportunity. Since the IEC-US does not believe that LISD is free of discriminatory or segregative practices, it is going to fight this premature bid. There will be a hearing in February in order to determine whether the district will be declared a unitary system. The Coalition needs to identify people in the community who would be willing to testify and give reasons and examples as to why LISD should not be declared unitary. There are fees associated with a court hearing that must be paid if we are to have our day in court.

Therefore, please tune in to KLF B Radio Station on Saturday and Sunday, November 14 and 15 and participate by giving a donation or by providing information regarding this present and future education of all our children. In addition to Dr. Maria Rivas, Linda DeLeon, the three Hispanic Mothers who intervened in the lawsuit, other leaders in the community will be interviewed as to their opposition to this bid. INS Otorga 114,000 Amnistías

Washington, D.C.—El primer programa nacional para inmigrantes indocumentados alcanza su punto medio esta semana, con participación cerca del monto que se estimaba, pero con una grave incertidumbre acerca del número de ilegales que obtendrán status legal.

Al llegar al final de los primeros seis meses del programa de un año, el Servicio de Inmigración y Naturalización estima que alrededor de 950,000 inmigrantes han solicitado la amnistía. Si continúa este paso durante los seis meses restantes, el programa llegará a incluir a cerca de 2 millones de personas, cantidad predicha por el Comisionado del Servicio de Inmigración y Naturalización, Alan C. Nelson.

Sin embargo, el "SIN" ha emitido decisiones finales de

aprobación o rechazo en tan solo el 10 o 12% de los casos recibidos en los primeros 6 meses. El resto aún permanece bajo revisión.

La gran mayoría de las decisiones finales, han sido más bien aprobaciones 114,000 aprobaciones y 800 rechazos. Pero los oficiales del "SIN" y otros grupos estiman que estos primeros casos han sido los más fáciles y que los subsecuentes irán haciéndose más complicados y difíciles para tomar una decisión lo que hará que el porcentaje de aprobación sea menor.

"Los casos que hemos estado analizando han sido los primeros y más sólidos, donde las personas eran claramente ilegales, y el proceso mucho más fácil", dijo Terry M. O'Reilly, asistente del comisionado para legalización del "SIN", quien agregó: "Yo espero que vamos a ver muchos casos hacia el final del programa los

cuales podrán ser mucho más difíciles."

Linda Wong, especialista de inmigración para el Fondo Educativo y de Defensa de los Mexicanos, dijo que el "SIN" no alcanzará sus objetivos a menos que motive la participación de personas que tengan menos posibilidad de aprobación. Tales casos vendrían a ser "personas con casos criminales, o quienes hayan recibido algún tipo de beneficio social o que hubieran salido de Estados Unidos por un cierto tiempo". "Estas personas son las que necesitan saber que el "SIN" cuando menos les dará el beneficio de la duda."

Por su parte Charles Kamasaki, especialista de inmigración para el Consejo Nacional de La Raza dijo: "El mayor problema es que no sabemos en realidad cuántas personas han sido legalizadas."

Galavision's Eighth Anniversary Inaugurated with National Advertising Campaign

Galavision, the only Spanish-language television network found exclusively on cable, has, for the first time in its history, launched a national outdoor advertising campaign. The promotion is designed to increase name awareness and promote Galavision's eighth anniversary, explained Eduardo Dominguez, director of Marketing for Galavision.

The colorful advertisements, featuring the word "Galavision" in bright red letters on a midnight blue background, can be found on billboards and bus exteriors in the top 13 Hispanic markets throughout the United States, in some instances local cable companies are co-opting these ads so their name and phone number appear as well.

In addition to the outdoor campaign, Galavision is also placing full page advertisements in major Spanish-language daily and weekly newspapers. The ads emphasize the wide variety of programming found on Galavision and invite non-subscribers to contact their local cable companies to sign up for the service.

"This advertising campaign comes at an important time in

Galavision's growth. With our basic service and our introduction in new markets, more Hispanics than ever now have access to Galavision," said the network's Dominguez.

Launched on October 26, 1979, to provide Spanish-language programming via cable, Galavision is one of the pioneers of the cable industry. The network started with five affiliates and about 800 subscribers. Its 12-hour daily programming featured almost exclusively movies (24 different films a month), novelas and two monthly specials.

Today, Galavision's subscriber base is made up of more than 900,000 Hispanic households. Its programming is delivered 24 hours a day, seven days a week via the Galaxy 1 satellite to almost 300 affiliates in the United States and Puerto Rico. In addition to the 140 films shown each month, Galavision also features news, novelas, musical variety programs, theatrical productions, sports events, sitcoms, talk shows, children's programming, music videos and the first Spanish-language home shopping program.

Another Cross In The War With Agent Orange

My war will never end. I now accept the fact that its imprint on me is permanent. I mourn the boy who went to Vietnam, who saw and caused hurt and injury. I accept the man I have become. War has always been familiar to my culture - not because we seek it or glorify it, but because we cannot escape it.

In the home of my abuela - my grandmother - in the farming community of Brighton, Colo., were 17 pictures of sons and grandsons in soldier uniforms. It was there I went to receive her blessing of farewell before beginning my journey to join a Marine Corps fighting unit.

She, in expectation, was standing in the living room waiting. Without a word, she left the room, to return with my grandfather Lucas. They directed me to kneel and kiss the Santo Niño, the plaster statue. Then they placed it in a chest to await my return.

"You will return," said my abuela. Her boundless faith was unweakened by the knowledge of sons and others who failed to return and now rest in Colorado's Fort Logan National Cemetery.

I did come back. As though in expectation, she was standing in her living room. Again, without a word, she left the room and returned with my grandfather. They directed me to kneel and

receive their blessing of welcome. The Santo Niño was returned to its place on the family altar.

I began a new life. There were no parades for Tomas. No yellow ribbon songs. I was not invited to parties. I was invited to step outside and fight. So I did, any time, anywhere.

At 23, I wove an armor to isolate myself from feeling and emotion, from further injury. It became not a shield, but a prison.

I wear it no longer. Old wounds have been re-examined, admitted to, cauterized and healed. Now I like the person I am becoming. I forgave myself and gave up expecting forgiveness from others.

But now the bleeding starts again. My war will never end. Agent Orange. So named for the orange-colored stripe that circled the drums that stored it, Agent Orange, sprayed on 5 million acres for a decade, a deloliant turning green jungle forests into cracked earth wastelands.

Agent Orange, 12.8 million gallons sprayed, laced with dioxin so lethal that a single drop divided among 1,000 people will kill them all.

Those who died in combat are remembered on the wall of the memorial on the mall in Washington, D.C. Many were Hispanic - a disproportionate number. It was another war we could not escape. Those with

crippling physical injury or scarred souls are less visible. Only now are we almost forgiven for being agents for the national humiliation of defeat.

We are "honored" with license plates, "Platoon," "Full Metal Jacket." Some revisionist historians are even saying that Vietnam was never really a loss.

I am angry because a person I knew died last week at age 40. He was exposed to Agent Orange. He is dead now and his children are imperiled also. Another person, Hispanic, a closer friend, will die soon. He is a good husband and father, he is a masterful teacher, and he is another victim of Agent Orange.

Our government admits to nothing. I don't expect it to. "Atomic veterans" exposed to radiation are still encountering government resistance. This is not a column about statistical probability. If it were, then the incidence of dying Vietnamese, American and Australian veterans would prove correlation. So also would children born with spina bifida, cleft palates, shortened limbs, enlarged livers, sight and hearing losses, kidney and heart abnormalities, and intestinal and testicular alterations.

This is a column about a request to my government. I don't want a parade. I don't want more equitable GI Bill benefits. I have made myself responsible for my own spiritual healing.

I want the epilogue of my war to be that those who returned were treated with justice. Only then will the complete reconciliation happen. Can you hear me?





At Halfway Point, Legalization Is Far Short of Goals

The U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service's 12-month legalization program, ordered by Congress to provide qualified undocumented immigrants with legal status, has reached its midpoint. It's a natural time to measure its progress, and many are doing just that. Two conflicting views are emerging.

The most widely held position, the one being promoted by INS, is that the program is running relatively well.

While the number of applications is much lower than projected--a million were filed in six months -- 85 percent of them were submitted directly to INS. By passed were the specially created community-based networks set up as intermediaries between INS and its nervous clientele.

This statistic has some INS leaders crowing that Latino and other groups' warnings about applicants' fears of INS were exaggerated.

Many in the Hispanic community, as well as other immigration professionals, counter that while most applicants did deliver their own completed packages to INS, they did so only after receiving considerable assistance elsewhere. Unfortunately, many paid dearly

for it.

A second view, weighing INS's initial projections of 3.9 million eligible applicants, emphasizes the fears of INS that still exist in the immigrant community after more than five decades of mistrust.

The INS estimate was used by Congress when it appropriated \$1 billion annually for the next four years of the program. Agency officials owe Congress an explanation for their overestimate, at least.

The agency should also inform lawmakers of its efforts to derail the Qualified Designated Entities (QDEs) that were created to help applicants. Although QDEs have a contract with INS to service applicants, the agency has not used a dime of its \$10.5 million advertising budget to promote these groups. It has treated QDEs more as adversaries than as players on its team.

There are more ominous implications in the low number of applications that INS must acknowledge and address immediately. Foremost is the problem of family unity. Thirty percent of Hispanic families in the United States have three or more children. If this number applies also to families seeking legalization, thousands of them face a "Sofie's Choice" dilemma if

any of the children were not born in the United States.

The law, as INS reads it, says that if an entire family has not lived in the United States continuously since before Jan. 1, 1982, then it is not entitled to stay together. For who knows how many thousands of mothers or fathers, to seek and accept legalization could mean permanent separation from their children or spouses. Would you enter into a contract like that?

A just-completed survey by the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials (NALEO) of organizations serving legalization applicants shows that applicants are not coming forward because of their apprehensions--anxiety over the deportation of ineligible family members and a general fear of the INS itself.

The problem of finding and, where possible, gathering documentation to prove residency is not widely known to the public. Many applicants, working in cash-only jobs, lived with relatives or friends in unbelievably overcrowded housing. They cannot produce paycheck stubs or receipts from landlords. Since some of the required documentation comes from the applicants' countries of origin, there have been delays in securing the proper

proof of birth or marriage certificates. Finally, there are the financial issues. Although the application fee is \$185 for an individual or \$420 for a family, this is only the beginning.

Consider the other costs: some pay \$500 to \$2,500 in attorneys' fees, \$50 to \$70 for the physical examination, \$20 to \$50 in notary public charges, and \$10 to \$20 for translation of every document submitted. (INS headquarters refused to translate its application form.) Including the INS filing fee, the total price tag for temporary legal residence could range from \$1,000 to \$3,000. These are staggering costs for families living on a minimum-wage income.

There may be a temptation to the dismiss legalization applicants' difficulties. After all, they did enter the country illegally. They are not able to vote and have no organized constituency. But if the law of the land provides for this group, then it is in our country's best interest that the program be administered efficiently and equitably.

At legalization's midpoint, we have not reached these goals.

A Mitad de Camino, La Legalizacion Carece Bastante de Propositos

El programa de legalización del Servicio de Inmigración y Naturalización de los EE.UU. (Sin), encargado por el Congreso para proveer con estatuto legal a los inmigrantes cualificados indocumentados, a llegado a su punto central. Esta es la hora apropiada para evaluar su progreso, y muchos están haciendo exactamente esto.

Dos puntos de vista en conflicto estan surgiendo.

La actitud que más prevalece, la cual se encuentra patrocinada por el SIN, es que el programa está funcionando relativamente bien.

Mientras que el número de solicitudes es más bajo que el proyectado -- menos de un millón han sido presentadas en seis meses--85% de estas fueron presentadas directamente al SIN. Pasadas por alto fueron las redes de base comunal especialmente creadas, establecidas como intermediarias entre el SIN y su nerviosa clientela. Esta estadística hace jactarse a algunos dirigentes del SIN en el hecho de que las advertencias sobre el miedo de los solicitantes al SIN, llevadas a cabo por Latino y otros grupos, fueron exageradas.

Muchos en la comunidad hispana, así también como otros profesionales involucrados en inmigración, replicaron que aún cuando la mayoría de los solicitantes entregaron su propio paquete completo al SIN, lo hicieron sólo después de recibir considerable ayuda en otra parte. Desafortunadamente, muchos pagaron considerablemente por esto.

Un segundo punto de vista, el cual considera las proyecciones iniciales del SIN de 3.9 millones de solicitantes elegibles, pone énfasis en el miedo que aún existe en la comunidad inmigratoria luego de más de cinco décadas de desconfianza.

Los cálculos del SIN fueron usados por el Congreso cuando el mismo consignó 1,000 millones de dólares anuales para el programa en los próximos cuatro años. Al menos, funcionarios de la dependencia gubernamental deben una explicación al Congreso por su exagerada evaluación. La dependencia gubernamental debiera también informar a los legisladores de sus esfuerzos en hacer descarrilar las Entidades Capacitadas Designadas que fueron creadas para ayudar a los solicitantes. Aunque las Entidades Capacitadas Designadas tienen un contrato con el SIN para servir a los solicitantes, la dependencia gubernamental no ha gastado ni diez centavos de su presupuesto de 10.5 millones de dólares para propaganda a los electos de financiar esos grupos. La misma ha tratado a las Entidades Capacitadas Designadas más como a un adversario que como a jugadores su propio equipo.

En el bajo número de solicitudes se encuentran implicaciones más siniestras que el SIN debe reconocer a tratar inmediatamente. Ante todo está el problema de la unidad familiar. Treinta y tres por ciento de las familias hispanas en los Estados Unidos tienen tres o más hijos. Si este número también se considera para las familias que buscan legalización, miles de ellas deben confrontarse con una dilema de "Alternativa de Sofía" si alguno de sus hijos no hubiera nacido en los Estados Unidos.

La ley, tanto como el SIN la interpreta, dice que si una familia completa no ha vivido en los Estados Unidos continuamente desde antes del primero de Enero de 1982, no está autorizada a permanecer junta. Para quienes sabe cuantos miles de madres y padres, buscar y aceptar legalización pudiera significar la separación permanente de sus hijos y cónyuges. Entraría Ud. en tal contrato? En una encuesta reciente completada por la Asociación Nacional de Funcionarios Latinos Elegidos y Nombrados (NALEO) acerca de las organizaciones que sirven a los solicitantes de amnistía señala que los solicitantes no se presentan debido a la aprehensión--ansiedad sobre las deportaciones de miembros de la familia ineligibles y de un temor general al SIN mismo.

El problema de encontrar y, donde fuera posible, reunir la documentación para probar residencia no es muy conocida por el público. Muchos solicitantes, empleados en trabajos donde el pago consiste en dinero en efectivo, viven con parientes o amigos en viviendas increíblemente congestionadas. Los mismos no pueden presentar

talones de cheques de pago o recibos de los dueños de casa. Debido a que algunos de los documentos requeridos vienen de los países de origen de los solicitantes, ha habido demoras en obtener las prueba correspondientes de sus certificados de nacimiento y de matrimonio.

Finalmente, están las cuestiones financieras. Aunque los honorarios por la solicitud son de 185 dólares por individuo o 420 dólares por familia, esto es sólo el comienzo. Considere los demás costos: algunos pagan de 500 a 2,500 dólares en honorarios de abogados; de 50 a 70 dólares por el examen médico; de 20 a 50 dólares en costos de notario; y de 10 a 20 dólares por la traducción de cada documento presentado (la sede del SIN rehusa traducir sus solicitudes al español o a cualquier otro idioma con excepción del inglés).

Incluyendo los honorarios de expediente del SIN, la etiqueta de precio por una residencia legal temporaria podría variar entre 1,000 a 3,000 dólares. Estos costos

son considerables para una familia que vive con un salario mínimo de ingresos.

Tal vez exista la tentación de deshechar las dificultades de legalización de los solicitantes. Después de todo, entraron al país ilegalmente. Los mismos no están capacitados para votar y no disponen de un electorado organizado. Pero si la ley del país mantiene a este grupo, entonces va en el mejor interés de nuestro país que el programa sea administrado en forma eficiente y ecuatime.

En el punto central de la legalización no hemos llegado a estas metas.





bowl hopes may rest on SWC opponents

Taking the day off after scoring their most impressive, important and tingling victory of the year last Saturday in Jones Stadium against TCU, the Texas Tech Red Raiders will be watching a couple of Southwest Conference football games this weekend with interest.

Interest? That word fits the attention Tech coaches and players will rivet upon the Texas-TCU and Arkansas-Texas A&M games Saturday as snugly as the professed "disinterest" Joe Biden, Ted Kennedy and other liberal pit-bull dogs of the Senate Judiciary Committee rivet upon conservative nominees to the Supreme Court.

Because the Raiders, 3-3 in the conference, have only one game remaining, their hopes to cap an anticipated 7-4 season with a second bowl consecutive bowl appearance. But that hope may well depend upon how three of the four teams above them in the conference standings fare in the dying days of the '87 season.

At noon Saturday, Texas A&M meets Arkansas in College Station, and two hours later, Texas and TCU will kick off in Austin.

The games are vital to Tech's bowl hopes because three of those four teams will fail to gain the Cotton Bowl berth that comes with the conference championship and will contend with Tech for selection to the Independence Bowl or the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Tech went to the Independence Bowl last December, losing to Mississippi, and would love to go back again this year.

"I'd hate to see our season end in a couple of weeks," said Billy Joe Tolliver, the John Wayne-Roger Staubach hero of Saturday's garrison-rescuing, cavalry charge finish.

Officials of both bowls might well prefer the Razorbacks, Longhorns and Aggies over the Raiders because of their better records, and larger following of fans.

But the Razorbacks seem in the best position to win the conference title and visit Dallas on New Year's Day.

The Razorbacks will go to the Cotton Bowl if they beat the Aggies and if the Longhorns lose one more game.

If the Razorbacks lose to the Aggies, they can go to Dallas

January only if TCU beats both Texas and A&M and Baylor beats Texas.

The Longhorns are in Dallas January 1 if they win the rest of their games. They play TCU, Baylor, and Texas A&M.


If the Longhorns lose one more game, they can go in a two-way tie with Arkansas.

If they lose to TCU or Baylor, they can still go if they beat A&M and one other team. If they beat the Aggies and finish in a three-way tie with Arkansas and A&M, the Longhorns who go because they beat both.

Like the Longhorns, the Aggies can go to the Cotton Bowl if they win the rest of their games.

If they lose one more time, they still can go in a two-way tie with Arkansas.

If they beat Arkansas and lose to TCU, they still can go if they beat Texas and A&M; Arkansas loses to A&M, and A&M; and A&M and, or Texas winds up 5-2.

Clawed 'boys Meet 4-4 Pats Sunday

The up-again, down-again Dallas 'boys—still bleeding after their third mauling in seven years in the Silver Lions' den in Detroit—will start all over again at noon Sunday when they line up in New England against the equally unpredictable Patriots.

Both teams sport 4-4 records, but the Pats, with what might prove to be a frigid and therefore undercounted home field advantage, are favored by four betting points.

Despite their numerous problems, both teams entertain realistic hopes of winning a playoff berth in this year's strike-trashed NFL season.

New England actually enjoys a positional advantage over Dallas. The Patriots are locked in a five way tie in the AFL East Division.

The 'boys record places them two full games behind the arch-rival Washington Redskins in the NFC East.

Super Bowl challengers two years ago, the Patriots have fallen victims to many injuries this year, and are as impossible to figure out as the 'boys.

Dallas' most recent loss, following their Monday night clobbering of the Giants, once again brought out the mean streak in their notorious front-running fans and media.

The favorite targets of 'boys "fans" disenchantment, Danny White and Tony Dorsett, received most of the abuse, but this time even Coach Tom Landry did not escape criticism.

For the third time in three games since the strike ended, Dorsett's numbers were unimpressive. The preening but gifted running back gained only 29 yards in 11 carries, and committed a costly fumble that led to the final score.

In those three games, Dorsett has run for only 64 yards in 36 carries, a 1.8 average.

White, hounded as mercilessly all afternoon as Christians in old Rome, tossed four interceptions and was sacked four times.

Yet some of the crying seemed warranted. Against Detroit,

As for the players themselves, excuses flew in true silver-and-blue fashion.

"We shouldn't have lost to the

Lions," said defensive tackle Kevin Brooks. "But there's no predicting what this team will do."

"Things just didn't go our way," safety Bill Bates said.

the latecomer

The high-pitched roar of the crowd echoes across University Avenue as the late comer nears the stadium gates.

But for some reason, the crowd visible from the avenue is silent and motionless. Where are the cheers coming from. The voice of the field announcer, a muffled baritone, is unintelligible.

Fewer fans than usual are leaving the stadium, and the late comer decides to ask the first group of young people he passes what the score is.

"We're winning, 30-21," a well-dressed young woman answers, darting across the always dangerous avenue, like a running back.

Across the other side of the street himself, the late comer finds out why the Tech crowd is not making the noise he hears. He can hear the voice of the field announcer now: Touchdown pass complete from Rascoe to Stone," the field announcer says.

Inside the stadium, the latecomer reads the square red dots on the scoreboard: Tech 30, TCU 28. Three minutes, fifty one seconds to play.

Tech receives the TCU kickoff in front of the late comer, who makes his way to his familiar spot in the southeast corner of the stadium.

Tech rushes three times for short yardage and has to punt away. But not to worry, Jamie Simmons kicks the ball toward the Town and Country shopping center and TCU has 80 yards to go in less than three minutes.

David Rascoe, the TCU quarterback, completes a pass to a wide-open white-uniformed receiver, and some uneasiness stirs among the familiar faithful in the southeast corner of the stadium. But there are now less than three minutes to play. Surely, nothing to worry about.

On the next play, Tech defender Donald Harris makes a clear dash and leap toward Rascoe's next pass, an arching spiral toward the sidelines in front of the Tech bench.

"You actually can't see as clear as you can on television," the late comer thinks when the fans in front of him rise up, blocking his view.

Somehow, Harris has missed, but the white-uniform TCU receiver has not. The receiver lopes easily down the sidelines and prances into the end-zone.

Disaster has struck. The square red dots read TCU 34, Tech 31. The place-kick soars high through the crossbars and onto the roof of the athletic office.

Now the Tech crowd is quiet. Like silent. But a high short kick-off is returned by Tech's number 34.

The field position brings the crowd to life. They are on their feet, cheering.

Billy Joe fades back on first down, and with protection that seems to last forever, lobs an arching pass toward two TCU defenders and Tyrone Thurman. Complete and a first down.

This time, Tolley, arms outstretched, calls a play at the line, tades back, and hits Ervin Farris. Farris spins away from a tackler, races toward the far sidelines and runs out of bounds.

Now, everybody is yelling. James Gray tries to run around right end, like he did the first play of the game, but gains only one yard. Then a pass to Eddie Anderson falls incomplete, as the crowd boos loudly.

Where are those TV replays? Wasn't that interference?

The fans are now yelling, hoarsely, and watching Tolley and the square red dots. Third and nine. But Tolley, again with all the time in the world, passes to Anderson, who catches the ball and runs out of bounds.

Then the pass. Where are those TV replays?

Tolley throws, and Wayne Walker catches it. All alone.



The Challenge of Discipleship

How easy it is for us disciples of Christ to condemn or not affirm the classic vices (getting drunk, abusing drugs, sexual sins, greed) but how very difficult it is for us to condemn gossiping. The Body of Christ, the Church, is not suffering so much from attacks from the outside but rather from the gossip on the inside. The problem is that we do not realize, or we do not want to realize, the seriousness of gossiping. The author of the first letter to Timothy did not want the young ladies to become gossips and Paul in his first letter to the Corinthians said that those who slander others with gossip shall not even inherit the kingdom of God. We are not even to sit down to eat with such people according to St. Paul.

How can we resolve this problem? The first thing that we must do is to recognize the

seriousness of gossiping. The above mentioned biblical passages let us know that God does not treat gossiping lightly. God condemns it! Secondly, we have to realize how much harm gossip does to others and to the unity and the witness of the Body of Christ, the Church. In the third place, we need to admit if we have the problem of gossiping. I know that I have had to struggle within myself not to gossip or to encourage gossiping by listening. Fourthly, we need to repent of this sin and ask God to forgive us and to fill us with His love for our neighbor. If we have a problem with some one or if a brother or sister in the Lord is doing something sinful or harmful, then we need to learn to pray for that person and go to that person in private to speak in love to him or her concerning his or her behavior. (See Matthew 18:15-17). May God bless you this week to be a blessing to others.


El Desafio del Discipulado

El problema es que no nos damos cuenta, o no queremos darnos cuenta, de la gravedad del chisme. El autor de la primera carta a Timoteo no quería que las señoritas llegaran a ser chismosas y Pablo en su primera carta a los corintios dijo que los que tratan de lastimar a otros con sus chismes ni heredarán al reino de Dios. Ni hemos de sentarnos para comer con tales personas segun San Pablo.

¿Como podemos resolver este problema? La primera cosa que tenemos que hacer es reconocer

que tan serio es el chismear. Por medio de los pasajes biblicos ya mencionados podemos ver que Dios nos considera a este hecho ligeramente. Dios los condena. Segundo, tenemos que darnos cuenta cuanto daño el chisme hace a otros y a la unidad y al testimonio del cuerpo de Cristo, la Iglesia. En el tercer lugar, necesitamos admitir si nosotros tenemos este problema de chismear. Yo sé que yo he tenido que luchar conmigo mismo para no chismear o escuchar al chisme. En el cuarto lugar, necesitamos arrepentirnos de este pecado y pedir a Dios que nos perdone y que nos llene con Su amor por nuestro prójimo. Si tenemos un problema con alguien o si nuestro hermano o hermana está haciendo algo mal o dañoso, entonces necesitamos aprender orar por la persona e ir a la persona en privado para hablar en amor con él o ella acerca de su comportamiento. (Vea Mateo 18: 15-17). Que Dios les bendiga esta semana para sean una bendición a otros.
