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Now is the time for homeowners to start inspecting their trees for
bagworms, states County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley.
Bagworms feed on the foliage of many trees, especially the evergreen varieties. Several trees in the Bailey County area were badly damaged by these pests last year. Small bag. worms hatch in late spring bags left on the tree during the winter.
Young worms spin silken sacs and attach small bits of leaves or twigs to the outside. The bagworm carries this sac wherever it goes. Later in the year, full grown larva attach to the
tree and pupate within th
bag. After some time male bagworm moths emerge and mate with females which remain inside the bag. The female then lays eggs inside the bag to start the cycle over again.
Application of insec Application of insec-
ticides should be made when small worms are first observed. Chemical controls are not effective on he older and larger bagworms A fow insecticide which are available locally or use on bagworms are malathion, sevin, diazinon, and dipel. The homeowner hould read the label to insure proper application rates and to be certain that the tree being treated will not be damaged by the insecticide.

sure programs are fully ready before they are put into production, and that they comply with the highest of military and economic standards. This year, for example, the Senate Armed Services Committee recommended cut-
backs in funding for the Trident Submarine and the CX cargo aircraft because of disparities in program planning In other words, we will do everything in our power to ut costs, without cutting corners in our defense needs.
$I$ might add that the Administration shares this view. Secretary of Defense Casper Weinberger earned his nick-

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## Estate Plan Vital To Ag Producers

Estate planning at some
point becomes a concern every farmer, contends an economist in contends an here.
Dr. Wayne Hayenga, an attorney as well as economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service,
Texas A\&M University System, says an "asset ceze is one of the big with respect to for disposition preparing land.
The first goal of an asse freeze is to fix, at today's price levels, the taxable estate of the landowner and to let all future appreciation in the land pass directly to the next generation without being subject tax in the landowner's A second sure that goal is to make can still retain control and the incom he or she lives.
To secure this right, the landowner sets up a corporation. This corporation is authorized to issue two classes of stock -. common stock and preferred stock. The landowner transfers
his farm land to the corhis farm land to the cor-
poration for both some poration for both some preferred stock. At this point the landowner is still the sole owner and the stockholder of the corporation, the economis explains.
After the corporation is set up, the landowner then chooses one of the two estate tax laws. These benefits are the annual $\$ 3,000$ exemption, and the lifetime unified credit equiv alent exemption of $\$ 175$, By using the annual $\mathbf{\$ 3}$, oce exemption, landowners can give anybody and worth of property each worth of property each
year gift tax free. Also, the landowner can give a one time gift of $\$ 175,625$ away using his equivalent exemption credit and not pay any gift taxes with cash out of his pocket, Hayenga adds.
"After selecting the best gift program for his goals,
the landowner can make

- gifts of the common stock to his expected heirs. As the land value increases, the increase will go to the common stockholders if the corporate charter is struc tured properly. The value of preferred stock will re gives away all of the com mon stock and keeps only his preferred stock. The amount he keeps depend owner transfers $\$ 5000,000$ of farm land to a corpor ation in 1981. He or she receives $\$ 100,000$ of com-
mon stock and $\$ 400,000$ of mon stock and $\$ 400,000$ of
preferred stock preferred stock in a
tax-free exchange. In the first few years, the land owner transfers all of the common stock to the child-
ren.
The, 10 years later, after incorporating, the landowner may die. At this time, if the land continued to appreciate at 10 percent, the farm would be worth $\$ 1,290,000$. Since the land-
owner gave away all comowner gave away all com-
mon stock and kept only mon stock and kept only
the preferred stock the the preferred stock, the
estate would contain estate would contain only
$\$ 400,000$ of preferred stock "Depending on how the landowner made use of gift

iness. Owners of each share have a vote in bus-
shes. iness matters. But when the corporation is set up. ownership can be struc tured so the landowner will retain voting control as long as he or she owns the preferred stock.
Income tax costs may
increase increase or decrease, de-
pending on the individua pending on the individual
business and the owners' goals.
