"Speed" is just one of many common labels users of Methamphetamine hang on the illegal and addictive drug. It's also referred to by users as 'Meth', 'Crank Crystal', 'Go', or 'Go Fast' Whatever it's called, it is highly addictive, dangerous and deadly, and it is growing in popularity among drug users. It is appearing, minously enough, more in he southwest. If that brings to mind California, Arizona and New Mexico hink again. You forgot to nclude Texas. You forgot Yoakum County, and probably all 253 other exas counties. It is here. Meth, or speed, has been round a long time. It was used extensively by all Hitler was believed to be a meth addict it was produced and sold by outlaw motorcycle gangs in many 'Hippy' groups.
Only in the last few years has it started a strong resurge among druggies, becoming the drug of choice in many cases over cocaine and heroin.
It is a very strong stimulant. in common language, blows your mind and de stroys your body. Usually sold in quarter gram units, sealed in heated coin bags, glass vials or plastic straws, it usually brings $\$ 25$ on the street.
Users normally experience a 'high', or hours. Speed causes many of the same symptoms of a cocaine user hyperactive, talkative, agitated, drastic mood swings Addicts, or 'Speed Freaks' are highly paranoid con stantly fearing they are being watched they are against. These conditions, along with the fact many speed freaks carry guns make them extremely dan-

In larger cities, distribution of speed by street gangs is lucrative part of their income. These gangs often ecruit children nine to welve years old to do their street selling. Use of speed and other illegal drugs has played a major role in rising levels of theft, burg laries and violence.
