


C of C Banquet Draws **Best Crowd In Years**

The McNabb family reported the disturbance caused by the searchers, or possibly the fugitive's presence, caused his dogs to bark the entire night.

The original warrant from Howard County was on a misdemeanor charge, but later in the day, the Sheriffs office here searched the national communications network, and found an outstanding felony arrest warrant on Garcia from the State of Missouri.

Rogers next presented a request to advertise for bids on a re-manufactured second anesthesia machine for the County Hospital. He cited a number of instances where a patient in a critical condition needed immediate anesthesia treatment, and the present single machine was either in use or in another area of the hospital. The Court approved advertising for bids due February 16.

The Court heard a report from Ross Shamburger, relative to the County's Blue Cross/Blue Shield Health Insurance. The current health policy contract will expire March 1, 1996. An agreement has been reached with the Texas Association of Counties (TAC) aligning the insurance group with TAC, making County premium rates available at reduced rates. Shamburger reported the very large number of medical claims handled by Blue Cross last year necessitated a raise in premiums,

which would be offset to a degree by a 4% savings offered in the TAC alignment three month rotating basis. proposal. Packets of information about several plans were distributed to the Court, which recommended continued studies of the proposals, with the final decision to be made at next week's court


