## LCEC Readies For Y2K Drill

## Lea County Electric Cooperative has announced that it will

 be participating with other electric utilities in a nation wide drill intended to test Y2K readiness. The exercise, to be held in the late evening hours of Wednesday, September 8, and the early morning of Thursday, September 9, is a "dress rehearsal for the date change to January 1, 2000, but will also prepare the Cooperative to respond to outages which may occur as a result of the date change to 9/9/99. Throughout the computer industry, there is speculation that because some computers utilize the 9/9/99 as a "halt" or "kill" code, power delivery systems could be affected. "The likelihood that we will experience a problem is very small," according to Allen Brown, LCEC's Manager of Marketing and Member Services. "The Wednesday night drill will help us assess the adequacy of our Y 2 K contingency plan, establish critical communication links, and position us to respond quickly to any problems which may arise.LCEC and its wholesale power supplier, Southwestern Public Service, have been working since the mid 90 's to assess and resolve any potential problems associated with the advent of the new millennium. "We've ensured our systems are Y2K compliant and have received assurance from our power supplier that they, too, are ready for the new century,' said Brown.

## CSW Groundbreaking

 ScheduledOfficials at College of the Southwest recently announced that groundbreaking for the school's long anticipated campus expansion is scheduled for Wednesday, September 8, at 10:30 a.m. east of Scarborough Memorial Library.

The groundbreaking ceremonies officially begin the implementation of Phase One of CSW's 'Faith in 2000' capital campaign. Initially launched in January 1997, the $\$ 6.2$ million capital campaign goal, the largest in the school's history, was completed by spring 1998
Upon completion of the first of its three phase campus master plan, CSW students and residents will enjoy a number of new or expanded buildings.
