

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# Court hears update on EMS

Charla Mitchell, official with South Plains EMS region organization in Lubbock, brought Commissioners Court up to date on the 24 county EMS organization Yoakum County belongs to and supports.

Mitchell said the regional organization is the only one in the state with a state apporoved and operating trauma center. She reported over \$400 million dollars are spent on trauma cases in Texas annually, and more than \$180 billion in the nation, more money that is spent on cancer or heart disease problems.

She told the court the high ratring of the region EMS could not have been achieved without the financial support of Yoakum County and other counties and towns in the region.


She said EMS officials from around the state have been very active in Austin, lobbying for state financial funds and protecting the interests of rural areas like ours. She said when the next legislative session opens, there will be a concerted effort to press for more support of EMS programs throughout the state

She told of the hardships faced by volunteers training to become Emergency Medical Technicians and Para-Medics. An approved Para-Medic now must take a minimum of 160 hours of continuing education in EMS courses each year

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
