When the readings are consistently high, your doctor will consider several factors which may be af-

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AERIAL APPLICATION SPECLALISTS style changes do not control the blood pressure, a medicine is usually started. A wide variety of medicines are available and the best one often depends on your age and medical conditions such as diabetes or asthma. Water pills which remove salt and water from the body or beta-blockers which slow the heart are often used first
When the readings are extremely high, there is an immediate risk of a stroke or heart attack until it is controlled. Hospitalization to treat the blood pressure and protect against these complications may be necessary.
A person's blood pres sure may increase with age, so yearly checks ar needed. It is important to treat it early to prevent the complications of heart attacks, strokes and kidney failure.

## SCHOOL PLANS MADE BY CONGRESS

Houston, January 27 President Mirabeau B. Lamar today signed a bill providing for a system of public schools in Texas.
According to the measure each county will receive three leagues of public land for support of an academy the counties may possibly receive additional land later to help in obtaining build ings and equipment for the academies. The bill also sets aside fifty leagues of land as an endowment fund for two universities of the first class.
In his December message to Congress, President Lamar urged that the public lands be used to endow the schools of Texas. One statement from his message has been widely quoted. In it, the President said: "It is admitted by all that the cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy and, while guided and controlled by virtue, it is the noblest attribute of man. It is the only dictator free men acknowledge and the only security free men desire." "THE TEXAS NEWS"

MOISTURE TESTS AT LANDFILL

Personnel at the County landfill have completed installing moisture monitoring blocks in the dump area currently in use. David Bruton, landfill technician, reported a total of sixty of the blocks were placed in a grid pattern in bore holes at one, two, Each block is attached to electronic leads. "On a daily basis, we hook our moisture indicator instrument to the leads, which indicates the degree of moisture at each level," Bruton said.

The purpose of the daily monitoring is to support landfill Manager Gary Walker's contention that a properly maintained fill in arid West Texas poses no threat to ground water at the fill site. His plan received endorsement and approval recently from the Texas National Resource Conservation agency, previously featured in 'CCN'
Kenley Powell, weigh master at the site, stated, "The daily moisture logs will prove Mr. Walker's theory that the very expensive pit lining procedure we were formerly required to use is not necessary to protect our ground water resources in this part of the state. It will save our taxpayers a great deal of money over time."
