## HEAVY TRUCKS

 IN SENATE PASSING LANEA bill to get counties more funds to offset the cost of heavy trucks traveling on county roads was passed by the Texas Senate Thursday, March 16.

SB 438 by Senator Frank Madla of San Antonio requíres permit applicants to designate counties in which overweight vehicles will operate and allots additional funds to those counties. Additional fees range from $\$ 125$ for 1 to 20 counties to $\$ 2,000$ for 101 or more counties. These funds are in addition to the current $\$ 75$ fee
As part of SB 438, an amendment by Sen. Bill Ratliff prohibits overweight vehicles from crossing bridges if the truck's weigh exceeds the posted ca pacity of the bridge. This amendment was based on the argument that through repetition, the excessive weight of a heavy truck will eventually wear away bridge and road supports. ## IT'S WAR ON THE **WEEVIL **

## Almost one hundred county Several events have led

 cotton producers and the resurgence of the bo andlords attended a meeting weevil and its march north March 30, addressing the hreatening spread of the cotton boll weevil on the exas High Plains, the rations largest cotton producing rea.The meeting was sponsored by the Lubbock based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., with participation from the Texas Agriculture extension Service.
The main focus of the meeting was to inform grovers of the serious north ward movement of the long dreaded insect and to explain the proposed Ref erendum to raise funds to combat and eradicate the veevil
Dr. Jim Leser, Extension Entomologist with the Tech Agriculture Experiment Station at Lubbock, painted grim picture of how the weevil could bring economic disaster for both growers and the entire twenty county area being considered or the proposed control and eradication program He explained if the weevil expansion goes unchecked the area could be facing the loss of at least $\$ 5$ billion at the end of one years impacted production.
The boll weevil made its first known earliest appearance in 1892 at Brownsville, Texas. By the year 1920, it continent through out the contton belt to the out the cotton belt, to the eastern seaboard, knocking out
millions of acres of cotton production. The devastation caused a shitt in production areas, further north and westward, leading to the present huge cotton producing area here on the Plains.

program, including monitoring infestation areas, installing Pheromone traps for accurate census counts of weevils in gridded zones and in the fall, spraying of infested acres with a Marathion solution when the weevils have hatched. Hopefully, costs for 1996 \& 1997 will be lower, and the fourth year will see an all out total eradication effort. The High Plains Eradication program assessment rate is much lower than other zones to the south. Local assessment rates are $\$ 1.25$ per acre of cotton planted, and . 0075 cents per pound of established yield. If the referendum as expected passes in the April 3 to April 15 election, producers must pay the assessment at their Consolidated Farm Services office at the time they certify their crop. Results of the election will be anno inced May 1.
