Motivational speaker Johnson attracts and inspires hundreds here

The two day program featuring motivational speaker Ron Johnson attracted almost 2,000 adults and youth in appearances here and in Denver City recently. Kathy Clark, Director of Yoakum County Even Start, was enthusiastic about both communities response and attendance at the programs. Her organization, along with both schools, churches and other organizations, jointly sponsored Johnson's "Rites Of Passage" presentations.

Mrs. Clark reported some of the comments she noted in the 'Men Only' and 'Women Only' sessions; "It challenged me to be a more active and concerned father, and to be a mentor for young men." "I am the mother of four daughters. He gave me goals and principles I need to teach them to be successful and happy women." And from a youth, "I'm 15 - he helped me

take a plane back to the real world." A total of 1,034 Plains and Denver City students attended sessions at both schools. 328 males attended their presentation, and women only sessions drew 506. Another 130 people heard Johnson at an Even Start and community leaders meeting, for a total attendance of 1,998.

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
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Lea County Electric Names **Scholarship Recipients**

The Lea County Electric Education Foundation currently provides scholarships for fifty students. According to Dreyspring "Eight openings for the Fall 1999 semester became available primarily through the graduation of prior recipients during this Spring semester. Lea County Electric is able to fund the program through individual donations to the Foundation as well as

undeliverable capital credits that would otherwise be absorbed into the treasuries of the states of New Mexico and Texas." Since 1988, the Foundation has provided over \$230,000.00 in scholarships to 203 students whose families are members of the Cooperative. Recipients may use the scholarships to attend any accredited institution of higher learning in New Mexico or Texas for up to a maximum of eight semesters provided they maintain a cumulative 2.50 grade point average, and are enrolled as a full time student. In addition, Bradley Bishop has been named this year's recipient of the Jackie C. Noack Memorial Scholarship. This award provides \$375 per semester for up to four semesters at the New Mexico Junior College in Hobbs, New Mexico

This week was an abbreviated one, to give our families time to get together once more before the crunch time hits and we don't see each other at all. My colleagues are really looking forward to the long weekend, and we'll be back on Tuesday, April 6.

Testimony in Land and Resource Management went to a new record; 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., with a break for the House session. We heard a total of fifteen bills, with the largest amount of time being spent on condemnation issues. We are expecting to hear the annexation bill that has passed the Senate sometime after the Easter break. It should be an interesting discussion.

We heard a few bills on the House floor this week that might be of interest to rural West Texans. HB 436 would help; law enforcement officials appropriately charge trespassers who have wandered inadvertently onto agricultural land. HB 690 would increase from a misdemeanor to a state jail felony the criminal mischief offence of damaging a fence used in the production of livestock or game animals if the monetary loss was less than \$1,500. Both bills passed the House and are on their way to the Senate.

We've gotten letters from constituents who are concerned about their phone service. There are a lot of telecommunications bills out there, and each one has its supporters, Most of the bills are in a state of change, they are being amended and substituted in committee. Once they reach the full House for debate, it will be easier to predict how each one will help or hurt our area. West Texas representatives continue to push for money to keep

our schools open this fall. Preliminary estimates show that our area will need approximately \$145 million in additional funding for the 1999-2000 school year.

The number of visitors to legislative offices is starting to decline as the work picks up. When members are always on the House floor or in committee, it's hard to find time for a good visit. However, we did have visitors from Pecos, Lenorah, Andrews, and Kermit this week.
