
In the past few months, I have been fortunate to meet and discuss the issues with many of you. I appreciate all of your comments and I tried to compile a list of things that you told me were important to you. Space limits me in mentioning all of them, but I would like to touch on some of the major points.

- Taxes and Finances- Commissioner's Court has a responsibility to spend your tax dollars wisely. A workable budget must be created and strictly adhered to. Cost overruns and unplanned spending can lead to raising your tax rate.
- Improved Roads and Streets- Agriculture and Oil are the two main industries in our county. They depend heavily on a road system that will adequately meet their needs. Roads in poor repair not only affect productivity but can create an unsafe environment.
- Capital Improvements and Expenditures- New projects must be carefully evaluated to see that their cost does not outweigh their benefit. Most proposals brought to Commissioner's Court have some merit but must compete for a limited amount of funds. Projects must be categorized in order of their impact on the citizens of Yoakum County in relation to their cost.
- County Services- We are very fortunate to live in a county that has a large tax base in proportion to the size of its population. This allows us to maintain an outstanding medical complex as well as a very capable law enforcement agency. We must not allow these services to be interrupted because of a lack of adequate funding. A conservative approach to spending on new projects must be implemented with special attention given to future associated operating costs.

I have lived in Yoakum County for 43 years and have owned and operated my own farm since 1985. My wife, Judi, and I have three children and we attend First Baptist of Plains where I serve as deacon. I have served as President of the Plains ISD Board of Trustees and currently serve as Vice President of Yoakum Co. Farm Bureau. Upon completion of my education at Texas Tech in Economics and Finance, I worked in Denver City at Wells Fargo as a Business Banker. I feel that my experience in banking and running my own business for 21 years has given me a unique perspective of County Government. 





another score and 22-6 lead going into the final quarter. The Eagles pushed their lead The Cowboy ground game to 28-6 early in the final pe-






Rudy Gonzales, Chase Guetersloh atop downed Eagle


#### Student of the Week






Zach Ramos, Rudy Gonzales foil an Eagle pass








