



Plains sales and use tax collections during March of this year increased from \$1685 in 1994 to \$1931, an increase of 14.5 percent. In contrast, Denver City's tax fell from \$17,338 in 1994 to \$7,055 this year, a startling decline of 59.4 percent. The 36 page report indicated only 6 other communities with a greater percentage drop in tax collections.

The PCG program uses a fall diapause control program, applying malathion within its operational boundaries that, with the help of cold winter weather, reduce the number of boll weevils able to successfully survive as over wintering adults until a new cotton crop is up and squaring in the early summer. Malathion is a proven and safe insecticide which has been used by eradication of the boll the diapause program for 31 years. In the past, CRP grasses were not considered as very good insulators from cold temperatures associated with "normal" winters. However, recent mild temperatures are proving that CRP grasses can provide excellent over wintering habitat during mild winters.

"The bottom line is that the PCG control program was never designed to prevent the westward spread of the boll weevil without some help from winter

weather," notes Leser. "Without this assistance, the program is woefully under funded to address the latest threat."

According to PCG Boll Weevil Steering Committee Chairman Wayne Huffaker, PCG is ready to expand the current program to stop the boll weevil from infesting more acreage and to push the weevil out of High Plains cotton acreage altogether. Under the authority of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation, PCG is proposing an enhanced suppression program that will increase the current program's operational area and pave the way for full weevil beginning in the spring of 1998. gram would continue with a fall diapause treatments







Everyone wants to go to Heaven, but no one wants to die. That old adage is taking on new meaning as Congress considers cutting a variety of federally funded programs and replacing them with block grants that could have a significant effect on the Texas budget.

I strongly support block grants and have called for them since 1991. They would be a useful tool for cutting federal spending and balancing the budget while giving Texas the flexibility to administer our own programs without having to go hat-in-hand to anonymous bureaucrats in Washington for permission.

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

There is a better way for Congress to lower costs. A national cap block grant formula would increase flexibility for the states and treat Texas fairly. Under this formula, the total block grant would be pro-rated to each state according to its share of the population eligible for public assistance. This formula would distribute a larger share of the block grant to Texas as our population grows, while ensuring that states losing population receive less of the total because they have fewer people to serve.



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

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APRIL 14 Deadline For Filing **Property Tax** Renditions

In accordance with state law, Texas businesses must render their property with county appraisal districts by April 14. To render is to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1995.

While state law required business owners and operators to render, any property owner, including home-owners, farmers and ranchers, may render their property with county appraisal districts," State Comptroller John Sharp

said.
If the tax collector cannot be because of an deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect or old address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus late payment penalties, Sharp

State law requires anyone who owns or manages incomeproducing personal property on January 1 to render with the local appraisal district. An exception is a business that receives the freeport exemption for managing cotton stored in a warehouse.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories," furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal dis-tricts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the chief appraiser estimates the

Sharp also announced that property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax The chief


