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

Any doubt of the **boll weevil presence?**




The above photo of some 500 to 600 dead boll weevils represents three current days of trapping and monitoring the cotton loving pest, according to Joe Barnes, District Manager of the Plains eradication district. " During last week's five days of field work, we trapped a total of some 1,100 weevils in the six work units of the district. We currently have some 1,300 traps deployed, and will add another 3,000 in the district as soon as possible." Barnes explained the boll weevils are actively hatching now, and the daily count of weevils in the traps will rise dramatically each week. When district cotton fields reach a certain cracked boll stage, aerial and ground spraying of malathion will start. Barnes said, "This is the stage when the weevils become very active and start into their breeding ritual. We want them stopped before they produce more weevils." Starting next issue, CCN will feature a weekly recap of the trapped weevil population, enabling readers and producers to better grasp the coming rise in numbers, and hopefully, the sharp decline when eradication spraying starts.



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








