Huge Bass Excites Parks And Wildlife Officials

Recently CCN ran an article featuring Bobbie Gayle's angling prowess in landing a 13.05 bass on Lake O.H. Ivie. The headline read, "Bobbie Beats Butch... Again". The header for THIS article should possibly read, "Butch Finally Beats Bobbie"

On February 9, just six days after Bobbie caught her big bass, husband Butch tied into a monstrous 14.59 pound bass, same lake, same area, same fishing method.

Texas Parks and Wildlife employees certified the bass' weight, and it caused quite a stir in the Department.

Since 1984, TPWD has sponsored the "Share a Lunker" program, assisted by the Budweiser Corporation. The program asks bass anglers fortunate enough to land trophy bass over 13 pounds to donate them to their project. Most fish of this weight and larger are females of the Florida strain, introduced into Texas years ago. The purpose of the program is to use donated larger Florida bred female bass in an effort to create "Super Texas Bass", by taking eggs from the female and fertilizing them with sperm from male Florida strain bass.

Campaign Signs Not Allowed In Highway Right Of Way

Such signs are not allowed on tion. state highway right of way, which is reserved for official traffic control signs. Campaign signs erected on highway right of way will be removed by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the owner can be charged for removal

In addition, a person placing an unauthorized sign in highway right of way can be fined up to \$500 per sign.

"The law is intended to keep highway right of way clean and uncluttered so that official traffic control signs are clearly visible for the safety of the traveling public," said Carl Utley, Lubbock district engineer. "It means you can't place signs on trees, utility poles, traffic signs or other objects in the highway right of way."

Campaign signs can be placed on private property with the landowner's permission if they meet certain restrictions. Signs must be made of lightweight


County updated on **EMS** organization

Charla Mitchell, Regional Coordinator for South Plains **Emergency Medical Services** (SPEMS), reviewed that agencies services in Monday's session of Commissioners Court. Yoakum County is one of 24 counties which make up SPEMS. The county contributes \$3500 annualy to SPEMS, coordinator for emergency regional medical units in Plains and Denver City.

Mitchell told the court SPEMS is one of only two service organizations in the state to have a state approved trauma treatment program.

Funding for SPEMS, a nonprofit organization, has long been a problem, but in the last legislative session a \$100 million endowment fund was established for similar organizations throughout the state.

Mitchell said finding volunteers to train for EMS service in small, rural communities has always been difficult. SPEMS worked to get the State Health

Department to approve lowering training hours and CEU hours for Emergency Medical Technicians and Paramedics in an effort to find more volunteers for the important service. SPEMS is also lobbying in Austin to eliminate now mandatory testing of certified personnel every four years. The organization thinks annual CEU classes make the testing unnecessary, and a hardship on volunteer EMS personnel.

Mitchell congratulated the

court for both community's EMS organizations, stating they continue to beoutstanding in their services.

The Treasurer's monthly report showed an ending balance of \$18,174,775 for January. The court approved a request for the disinterment of Mr. Ralph R. Dry, Jr. from the Plains Cemetery. The remains will be relocated in another site in the state.
