


#### Legal Notice\*




Districts located within the City of Plains;







The Task Force currently faces a projected shortfall of \$68,000 as of the May 31 fiscal year end. Yoakum county's .0108% share of the shortfall would be \$734.40.

Both Clark and Judge Brewer concurred in commending the Task Force for their continuing war on drug trafficers. Clark feels they have had a real impact on drug crimes in the county, and their efforts throughout the Permian Basin have had a major, positive effect on the illegal drug trade.



didn't take long to figure out it wasn't a bass." The fish weighed a hefty 40 pounds, a pretty good load for a bass rig.









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



#### District Criminal Court

Three criminal cases were heard in 121st District Ray Fargason. Court, with Judge Felix Klein presiding in the absence of Judge Kelly Moore. Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark represented the State. Steven Carl Caldwell, 42, pled guilty to a subsequent DWI offense occurring November 15, 1995.
