

Happy Invites Recalcitrant Players To Square Selves

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Odessa high school, a champion at football and a power in District 3AA basketball circles, may come up with one of the strongest track and field contingents in West Texas.

The Broncos won the Comanche Relays at Fort Stockton last weekend and did it by amassing almost twice as many points as the runnerup team—Fort Stockton. The Hosses wound up with 53 points, winning blue ribbons in the 220-yard low hurdles, the 440-yard relay, high jump, shot put and had one entry finish in a three-way tie for first place in the pole vault.

There were no sensational performances at the show but it did serve to prime the 3AA teams—Odessa, Midland and San Angelo—for future competition.

George Taff, Angelo, copped the 100-dash in the very ordinary time of 10.4 seconds. Big Spring's Ernie Ache has been doing better than that in practice at Steer stadium.

Pecos' Brookfield ankled off with first place in the mile run in the time 5:20.2. Our Donald Webb can beat that by several seconds, should be able to better the winning time in the 880-yard run as well. That was 2:10.9, set up by Hanson of Monahans.

J. W. Thompson, the Odessa all-state footballer, was entered in the 220-yard dash, finished third behind two other gridiron notables, Dunny Goode of Midland and John Medanish, Pecos. Goode's time was 23.1.

Thompson also had a leg on the Broncos' 440-yard relay team, which beat Fort Stockton in 47 seconds. He ran in the No. two spot and had as teammates Byron Townsend and Rex Partridge, both standout gridders and Gerald Campbell, high point man of the meet.

Considered generally, tracksters in West Texas high schools don't approach standards of other years, but new emphasis will probably be placed on that oldest of all sports now that conditions are approaching normalcy.

Perhaps the greatest track and field squad ever developed in this section was that fielded by Snyder high school around 1932 or '33.

Star of that squad was Freddy Wolcott, who later attended Rice Institute and broke all kinds of world and national records in the hurdles.

Another standout was Buford McClinton, mercury-footed youngster who might have equalled Wolcott's feats in the short distances had he gone to a major school.

Few Texans know that the capital of Missouri was once Marshall, Texas. The Missouri state capitol and the governor's mansion are both still standing in Marshall for all to see, if you doubt it. Both are still in use.

Today's world with its refugee

governments may find this oddly easier to understand than an earlier generation. It happened during the Civil War. Missouri was a borderline state. But it voted to remain in the Union.
