Presidents 2007 budget plan worries NRHA, local and area hospitals

The National Rural Health Association recently expressed deep dismay about devastating cuts included in the President's Fiscal Year 2007 budget proposal. For the third straight year, the Administration has proposed eliminating funding for several successful rural health programs and drastic cutbacks in others. Congress has reversed the cuts proposed by the President in past years. " Congress and the American people want a priority placed on rural health care," said Bill Sexton, NRHA President. "However, the actions of the President disregard the plight

of rural America."

rural health programs are; Rural health flexibility grants hospital improvement program - funding eliminated * Community access program, - funding eliminated.* Rural health network and outreach grants -

National Animal ID System/Premise Number program for stock owners

Premise ID is part of the National Animal Identification System. A Premise ID identifies a location where livestock are handled or comingled. Producers can obtain Prenmise ID numbers free of charge until July 2006. On July 1, premise registration will be compulsory in Texas. All persons who own, manage or are caretakers for locations where livestock, exotic livestock, poultry or exotic poultry are handled must register Ruby Sellers, Robert Canon their premises with the TAHC and submit the \$20 two-year fee. Renewal and fee payment will be required every 24 months there-

> This program is going to affect anyone who owns agricultural animals, whether they have one show pig or 15,000 beef cows. Animal tracking and disease control may be the impetus for the national identification program, but its benefits are not limited to those areas. Some other uses include information transfer and management, performance records, health and herd management, carcass quality tracking, age verification and source verification, to name a few.

Commissioners face lengthy, varied agenda

The February 13 session of Commissioners Court featured an agenda as varied as a can of alphabet soup.

Tax Assessor Jan Parrish reported her office collected a total of \$7,652,763 in county taxes during January. The total of all governmental entity taxes collected last month was \$37,425,773.

Sheriff Don Corzine sought permission to advertise for bids on the purchase of a VHF Project 25 Repeater System which would greatly increase the range of communications in the area. He reported the request would result in no additional costs to the county, but would be part of an earlier grant project to improve communications under the Homeland Security project. His request was approved.

County Clerk Debbie Rushing presented an informative program to a group of two dozen residents on the recently acquired voting machines in a meeting at the Yoakum County Library February 9. Rushing explained the voting process and demonstrated in detail how to use the machines, mandated by the federal Americans with Disabilities Acr (ADA). The machines will be available to voters needing to use them in the country Primary Election March 7. Following the question and answer session those present had the opportunity to vote a fake ballot to become familiar with the machines.


Four Crime Cases In District Court


Four criminal cases were heard in District Court February 9 with Judge Kelly G. Moore presiding, and Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark representing the state.

Reynaldo Acosta Arenivas entered a plea bargain to order modifying terms of a prior convition of methamphetamine, state jail felony. He must pay \$60 court cost and delinquent fees totaling \$509 on plea day, and appointed \$250 attorney fee with \$10 installments sarating March 9, 2006.

Guadalupe Martinez Jr. pled true to modifying conditions of a prior conviction of aggravated assault with deadly weapon. He must pay an additional \$70 court cost. He must pay \$1230 on \$2171 delinquent fees on plea day, and the balance in monthly installments of \$100 beginning March 9. He will remain in Yoakum County jail up to 180 days or until space is available in a substance abuse facility and serve confinement and treatment for not more than one year or less than 90 days. Jimmy Hammons was his attorney.

Andres Lopez Arrellano, AKA El Jockey Arrellano, in a plea bargain judgement revoking supervision from a prior cocaine possession conviction. He was sentenced to two years in State Prison with 33 days credit jail time. Warren New was his attorney. Joshua John Williams entered a plea bargain guilty to Burglary of habitation. A 10 year prison sentence was suspended and probated ten years. He must pay \$700 restitution to Dorothy Hornbeck. He will remain in jail here up to 180 days, or until space is available in the Ray Anderson Community Corrections Facility (CCF) for no less than one month or no more than 24 months. Angela French was his attorney, and investigating officers were Sheriff Deputies Noeoo Valdez and Danny Crutchfield,

The purpose of this grant, or SHIP, is to help small. rural hospitals do any or all of the following: (1) pay for costs related to implementation of prospective payment systems (PPS); (2) Comply with provisions of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA) of 1996; and (3) reduce medical errors and support quality improvement.

Yoakum County Hospital has received through SHIP grants a total of \$37,480 over the past four years to assist with HIPPA compliance and quality improvement initiatives. While these funds have not covered the entire cost of these initiatives they have certainly been very beneficial and have helped reduce the tax burden on the citizens of Yoakum County."

Texas celebrates Presidents' Day each year on the third Monday in February. Our first president, George Washington, was born February 22, 1732. and many states celebrate his birthday with a holiday bearing his name. In fact, the federal government officially recognizes the third Monday in February as Washington's Birthday. Individual states, however, observe their own holidays and since 1971, Texas has honored all presidents by celebrating Presidents' Day.

I have a deep respect for George Washington, who led our Revolutionary Army against the British in rthe fight for America's independence. His leadership in the formative years of our country paved the way for America to emerge as the bright, shining star it is today.

He also had unparalled self-restraint. At the end of the Revolutionary War, even though he controlled a powerful army, General Washington rebuked those who urged him to become king of the new country. Instead, he resigned his post as commander in chief and dissolved the army, allowing for peaceful transfer of power.

Six years later, the country unanimously elected Washingtom as our first president. 
General William T. Sherman perhaps summed up who Abraham Lincoln was when he said, "Of all the men I ever met, he seemed to possess more of the elemenst of greatness, combined with goodness, than any other," To this day the Republican Party is often referred to as the "Party of Lincoln.

In addition to Presidents Washington and Lincoln, I am happy to recognize all our other presidents on this holiday. Their sacrifice and service contributes to the distinguished reputation the presidenct has today in our country and throughout the world. Thomas Jefferson, our third president, greatly affected the early years of our country, championing of the idea of government by the people. He drafter the Declaration of Independence in 1776, at the young age of 33, before being elected 20 years later. President Roosevelt, a hero of the Spanish-American War, led the United States' emergence as a world power. Believing in diplomatic persuasion backed up by military might, he was known for quoting the West African proverb, "Speak softly and carry a big stick."

Texas has sent its share of leaders to the White House. Dwight Eisenhower, who served two terms as the 34th president, was born in Dennison. Lyndon Johnson, the 36th president, was born in Stonewall. More recently, George HW Bush, the country's 41st president, began his political career in 1969 by representing Texas in the US House, before eventually becoming president. Of course we also have George W. Bush today; our 43rd and current president, former Texas Governor George W. Bush. Our president has valiantly kept his word to defend America in the war on terror.



Kathy Clark, Chief Administrator of the Learning Center in Denver City, brought written messages from a number of families and students attending the school. She requested a T1electronic line to enhance distance communications for students enrolled in the Center's programs, and would be shared with the Denver City School, District. The line would cost \$320 per month, which possibly could be shared by the Center and District. Clark also reported it could be possible Plains ISD could choose to share the rental cost.

to share ther rental costs. D.C. Hospital Administrator Clay Taylor reported on plans for the hospital and South Plains College to offer RN Nurse training over the internet in 2007. He indicated the hospital could also be involved in sharing costs of the T1 line, required in the RN program. No action was taken until more information is available. Mrs. Clark told the court the Learning Center now

is serving over 90 adults and 60 children.

CEO Clay Taylor reported hospital approval of a n agreement

between the hospital and Covenant Medical Group Professional Coverage would actually lower cost of coverage by approximately \$100,000, from \$920,000 annually to \$820,000. The new plan was approved. Taylor also reported the Board would soon interview a physician for possible staff employment as the fifth physician. The Court heard a request from

the Denver City Fire Department for the county to furnish a 10 percent matching grant for the purffuchase of a new brush fire fighting truck. The court approved funding \$11,300 for the purchase of the truck.

It makes one feel warm and fuzzy knowing you have friends you can steal from. I have read this tale before, but this more detailed version from Stephen Henry, Mogul of the Levelland & Hockley County News Press, continues to be a classic;
