### Report On Number Of Acres Planted To Be Interpreted

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)-The nation learns towhether its farmers think they will be able to meet the record crop acreage goals needed to help ease critical world wide food shortages.

The agriculture department scheduled for release at 2 p. m. (CST) a report on the total acreage farmers plan to plant this

Based on a nationwide survey, the report may have far-reaching implications for Americans as well

as for hungry people abroad. Should it indicate that plantings will fall far short of agriculture department goals, the result might well be an early return to ration ing of some foods in this country.

At present, only sugar is being rationed in this country. Consumers have been asked, however, to cooperate with a voluntary rationing program on wheat products end food fats and oils.

## Suddenly At One Time Or Another

NEW YORK, March 20 -Spring will be a little late this year in the eastern part of the United States.

In most of the country, it will come around today, March 20, but in the eastern standard time zone that will be the day before spring.

Of course, it might as well be spring—the season is just around the corner. It will be along tomorrow, March 21. In fact, they'll tell you up at Hayden Planetarium, spring

busts out all over at the same time. It's just the clocks that read differently from place to place, explains Associate Curator Robert Spring comes when the sun is at the vernal equinox-standing

over the equator on its way north. When this happens, it's March 20 in most of the United States-9:33 p. m. in San Francisco, 10:30 in Denver and 11:33 in Chicago-but it's March 21 at 12:33 a. m. in the cast.

The season arrives first, by local time, just east of the international date line, which plays around with the 180th meridian in mid-Pacific. It will be spring at 6:33 p. m. March 20 on Midway. In the southern hemisphere, it isn't the spring that comes

with the vernal equinox-it's the fall. This will happen in Buenos Aires at 1:33 a. m. March 21. An equinox-from Latin for "equal night"-is called so because nights and days then are theoretically of the same length,

but for technical reasons, Coles says, this is never quite so. In New York, for example, sunrise, when the sun first cuts the horizon, on March 21 will be at 6:01 a. m. and sunset at 6:07

"Of course," adds Coles, "that is for the true horizon-which nobody ever sees in New York."





### Sgt. Edward Shuck To Receive Discharge



Wilson and his brother, R. G., operate the Wilson Bros. ranch located in the northeastern portion of the district. Soil Conservation Service technicians, "Blackie" Morris and W. H. Bethell, located a site and designed a large stock tank for Wilson Bros.

A terrace system complete with fills made has been installed on Mr. J. W. Denton's farm located in the Midway conservation group and operated by C. A. Denton. The terraces were built to meet minimum district specifications of 24 feet base width, 15 inches settled height and 4 feet top width. Technical assistance in planning, surveying and checking the terrace system was given by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the district.

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



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

improve the operating efficiency of the US army (as it is affected by officer-enlisted man relationship) has been laid by Secretary of War Patterson, with the appointment of a six-man board to examine the army officer system.

Patterson made what appears to be wise selection, in naming men to the board who themselves have seen service as GI's. They are men whose reputation is such that they can be expected to give all testimony an impartial hearing, and report on a fair basis.

This opportunity for former service men to air their views on the army "caste system" should go beyond being merely a sound stage for GI gripes. The trouble with the army setup is more basic than that, and should be considered on fundamentals and with long-term changes in mind.

For it is evident that, regardless of what happens to a proposal to extend the draft temporarily, the army must stake its future size and strength on its ability to recruit high-class, smart and alert young men who can be trained to the highest state of efficiency. And this type of young man is not interested in military service if he has to put up-in time of peace-with a lot of gold braid abuses that he put up with in time of

The government is making a broad appeal for young men to put on uniform, offering much in the way of pay, pensions and other monetary returns. But it has not yet erased the needless sharp line between rank and lowly private that remains one of the biggest objections to military service on the part of young men who were reared and schooled in a democratic way of life.

Direction and discipline must be had, to be sure; but they can be had without the deplorable differentiation between "boss' and "employe" that professional military men seem to think is necessary. The new Patterson committee can get a lot of suggestions that it can be put to good use. This discussion has referred only to hold goods today."



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
