B, PW Club Has Dinner Meet, Spring Decorations

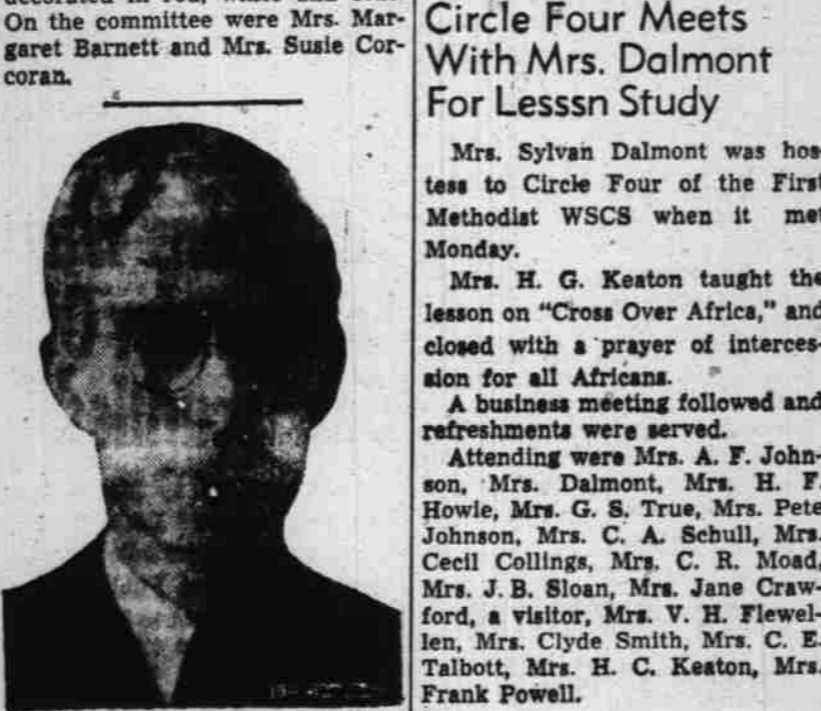
The spring colors were used in decorations for the dinner meeting of the local chapter of the Business and Professional Women's club Tuesday evening in the Settles ballroom.

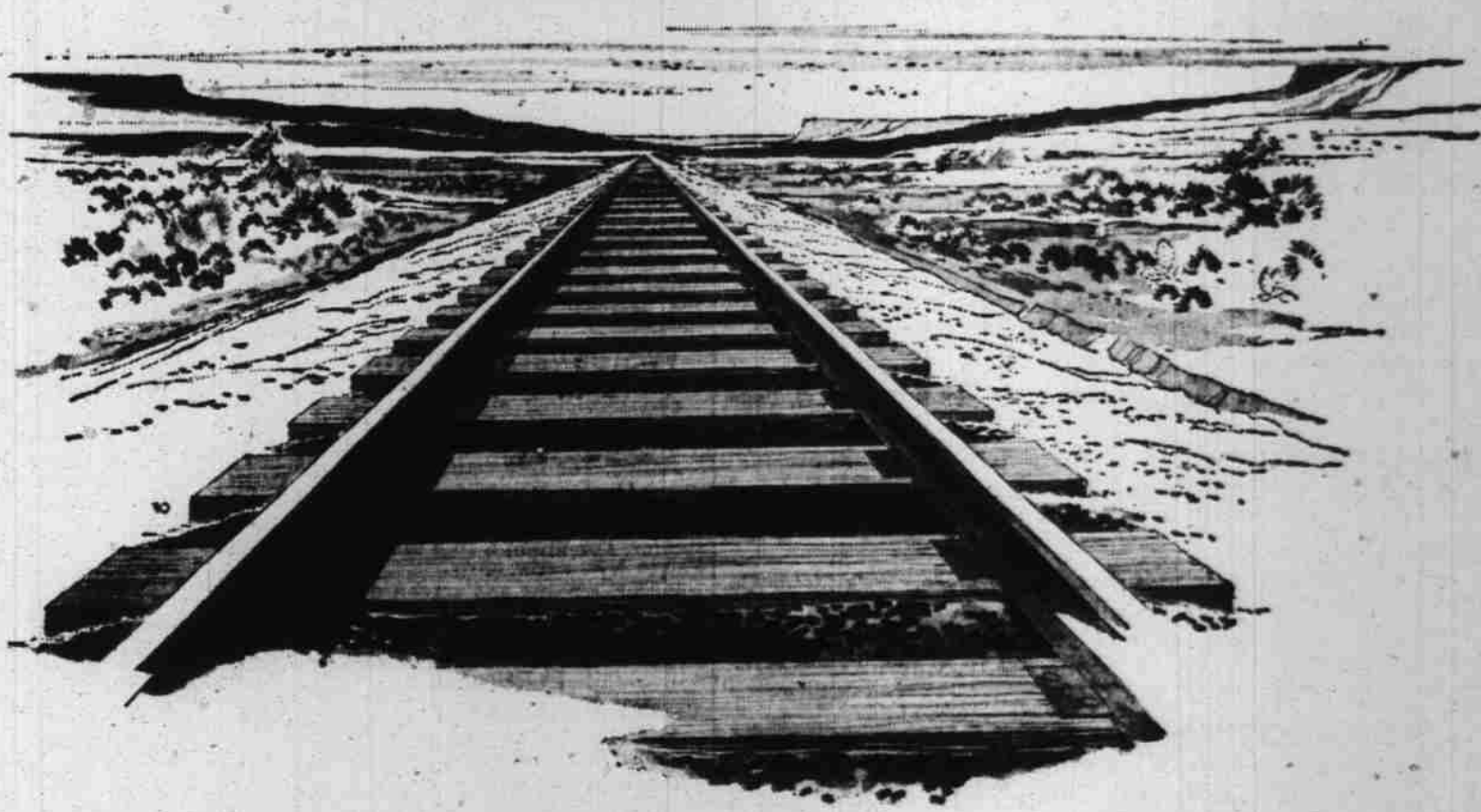

The Nation Today—
Marshall's Straight Thinking, Speaking Outstanding In Capital

By JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall is a standout in Washington where phony charm and doubletalk sometimes substitute for straight thinking and speaking.

He has a simple dignity which comes from his inner sureness and balance. He is not on the defensive and he's not trying to sell anything, even himself.

It is clear that he does what he can, the best he can, and is willing to be judged on that.

When he retired as army chief of staff a few months ago he had completed one of the most distinguished military careers in history. Immediately President Truman asked him to go to China as American ambassador.

He was to do a special job which badly needed doing: to try to restore peace in China.

In taking this job the general, who had earned his retirement, was doing his country an extra favor. He went to China, got the nationalists and communists together and laid the groundwork for peace.

He has returned to confer with American officials here and then will return to China to continue his job there.

After talking with President Truman and Secretary of State Byrnes General Marshall held a news conference Saturday in the state department.

In plain army battle dress, he walked into the roomful of newsmen, said he would first explain what had been done in China, and then would answer questions.

When the newsmen later tried to explain to themselves the impression which Marshall had made upon them, one of them summed it up this way:
"He's a man of good will and it's easy to see he is."

USDA Council Plans Saving Of Wheat, Oil

A plan for conserving foods and fats to be recommended to both rural and urban residents was outlined Tuesday afternoon at a meeting of the Howard County USDA council in the county agent's office.

One of the first major projects the group plans to impress on the public is the need for family vegetable gardens. A resolution was adopted urging everyone in the county to plant spring vegetables, even if in a frame or tub. It is hoped that the gardens will lessen the amounts of food purchased and make more non-perishable items available for shipment overseas.

The council also announced that if the nation-wide food conservation goal is reached it will be necessary to save 40 per cent of the nation's wheat and 20 per cent of the fats and oils.

Each farmer in the county is being asked to plant a small plot of corn for eating purposes this year and to enlarge their fall gardens.
