

Criminal Court Cases Heard

One criminal case was heard last week in District Court, presided over by Judge Ray Anderson. stemming from a drive-by shooting in Denver City in April of 1995, pled guilty to violating terms of his prowas arrested for possession of marijuana. He also pled charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

He was sentenced to serve eight years in the Institution Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for the motion to revoke probation, and ten years for the second offense, both sentences to run concur-

Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark represented the state, and the defendant was represented by Attorney Bonnie Ericson.

In County Criminal Court, presided over by Judge Dallas Brewer, Jimmy Kent Savage, 47, pled guilty to driving while license suspended. He was sentenced to 30 days in jail. He was fined \$600 and ordered to pay \$157 Court Costs, which will be laid out in jail.





General Election Information To Fill Unexpired Term In Office

The office of COUNTY CLERK, UNEXPIRED TERM must be placed on the ballot for the General Election to be held on November 5, 1996, due to vacancy in the office created by resignation for retirement.


The following applies to candidates for the unexpired term. (All section numbers refer to the TEXAS ELECTION CODE.)

1) Nomination by political party: A person must receive a favorable vote of a majority of the executive committee members present at the meeting. Party must file the Certificate of Nomination by 5:00 PM, September 6, 1996, in

2) An independent candidate must file an application for a place on the ballot with the county judge not later than 5:00 PM on the 30th day after vacancy occurs (Sec. 201.023) accompanied by a petition that satisfies requirements prescribed by Section 141.062. (Number of petition signatures required = 104 (Sec. 142.007)

3) Write-in candidate must file a declaration of write-in candidacy which satisfies the requirements of Section 141.031 with the county judge not later than 5:00 PM on September 6, and not earlier than 30th day before (August 7). The declaration must be accompanied by a \$600.00 filing fee. (or petition that satisfies requirements prescribed by Subchapter C Chapter 141. Number of signatures for pe-

May 11 Is **Bad Date In Texas For Tornados**

Historical records indicate Texas may have been lucky this past May 11, when no tornados were... reported across the Lone Star State.

On May 11, 1953, a savage tornado devastated Waco, killing 114 and injuring 597 people and causing \$41 million in damage.

That very same day, the same violent storm system over much of the state created another killer tornado at San Angelo, where another 11 people died, and injured 159. creating over \$3 million in damages.

On May 11, 1970, another storm system most South Plains residents remember well produced the twister which hit Lubbock. Another 26 people would die there, with scores of injuries, and come \$250 million in damages.

Attention Producers All county agricultural producers and landowners are urged to use caution when planning a controlled burn of CRP acreage, and asked to notify either the Denver City or Plains Volunteer Fire Departments in advance of any rural CRP burn.

Both fire departments have reported instances of producers burning their CRP acreage, without notifying the departments. In a number of cases, the fires were reported by neighbors or passers by unaware of the controlled nature of the burn, resulting in the fire ghters being dispatched to the scene needlessly. If the fire department is deployed on a wasted trip, a fire in the city during their absence could be a potential disaster, and results in unnecessary expense and wasted volunteer man hours

Hood's Texas Brigade



In 1861, many Texas communities and counties organized local militia units, following the state's secession from the Union and alignment with the Confederacy. When the Civil war erupted, the outmanned south needed every volunteer it could raise to man its army, and Texans responded admirably. In late summer of 1861, some 32 companies of Texas volunteers from 24 different counties were assembled in Virginia, and organized into the First, Fourth and Fifth Texas Volunteer Infantry Regiment, the at first named Texas Brigade.

It would gain its first fame and glory, and a new name, on June 27, 1862, in the crucial Gaine's Mill battle near Richmond Virginia. Gen. Robert E. When darkness finally fell, the Texans were firmly in control, but not without fearsome costs. The Fourth Texas Regiment, led by Hood, had one of every two enlisted men in it's ranks killed or wounded, half it's company grade officers and ALL of the field grade officers were casualties. The Texas Brigade would have 570 less men after it's first major battle. From that point on, it would be known as 'Hood's Brigade'.

John Bell Hood was a West Point graduate in 1853. He served in the U.S. Cavalry on the Texas frontier from 1856 to 1861. resigned commission in the U.S. Army, and commissioned a 1st Lt. in the Confederate Army in early 1861. He was one of those rare officers who earned the admiration and respect of both superiors, and the men under his command. Hood was badly wounded twice during the war. At Gettysburg, his left arm was shattered by shrapnel and remained useless the rest of his life. At the Battle of Chicamauga, a Minie ball mangled his right leg so badly it had to be amputated. He refused to be sent home, and would have to be strapped to his horse' saddle the rest of the war. He would be promoted to full General in 1864, and given command of a full Division. His Brigade would carry his name until Lee Surrendered his army at Appomatox Court House in 1865.

Estimates show about 4.500 men fought under the battle flags of the three Texas Regiments in Hood's Brigade. At Appomatox, only 476 were left to surrender.
