In reading, 56% mastered all objectives, and in math, nine, or 36% mastered all objectives to receive a 'Y+'.

Administrators and staff it. A TAAS class, focusing on test objectives and test taking skills, was also offered this year to help students gear up for the test.

This years exit level scores of Plains sophomores surpassed those scores in other schools across the state as reported last year. In the State of Texas 1994 School Report card, issued by TEA, the percentage of sophomores from across Texas passing the TAAS writing were 82.5%, reading 77.7%, and math 58.4%.

In the sam; report comparing Plains studer ts to students from 100 comparable schools, percentages of sophomores passing writing were 83.9%, reading 77.7%, and math 54.9%.

Once a student has passed any portion of the test, he/she does not have Compared to TAAS scores by sophomores in 1994, the passing percentage in writing jumped almost 20%, as did reading, while almost 23% more passed the mathematics section.

Once A student passes a protion of the test, he does not have to take it again. Only failed portions of the test must be re-tested.


