

Expanding In Texas



From 1994 through 1996, Texas ranked second behind Ohio in new corporate facilities and expansions and in new manufacturing plants, according to Site Selection magazine. Corporations built or expanded nearly 2,000 facilities in the Lone Star State during that period, including 523 manufacturing plants.


In 1996, Texas led all other states with 192 new manumagazine's survey found. Among metro areas, Dallas ranked second behind Chiand expansion, while Fort

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Much to do with MULCH

County Extension Agt.-Ag Are you aware of the advantages of using a mulch in your garden? In one stoke, you can reduce weed problems, keep the soil moist, attract beneficial earthworms, keep the soil moist and cool, prevent erosion, and add nutrients to the soil. In short, good gardeners have much to do with mulch.

By depriving developing weed seedlings of light, mulch minimizes weed problems in the garden. This easy weeding is the result of another benefit; moisture retention. Mulch slows moisture evaporation, protecting tender new roots from overheated soil while also lessening the watering chore.

A mulch can consist of inorganic or organic materials. Organic mulches include straw, pine needles or bark. In organic mulches include gravel, stones, even plastic. Availability is one factor to consider in selecting a mulch. Your choice depends on vour personal preferences as to what looks the best and will be readily available. Of the materials listed, sawdust is probably the least desirable because of its ability to rob nitrogen from the garden. The key is to find well rotted and aged saw dust or shavings. If you are tired of seeing weeds in your garden doing better than the plants, or if you want to reduce your water chores and your bill, give mulch a try in you garden.

Below is a list of mulching materials, with their advantages and disadvantages.;

Ground Bark- inexpensive, attractive. long lasting

Peat Moss-Expensive, difficult to prepare. Attractive, but can

Straw- One of the best. Long lasting, reduces moisture loss as much as 70%. Replace lost nitrogen with fertilizer.

Plastic Film- Black film is excellent, but can be unattractive. Punch holes to allow for moisture penetration.

Newspaper- Builds humus. Can be used shredded or in sheets with soil on top.
