

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Farm Bureau Says Water **Agreement Too Little Too Late**

The president of Texas' largest farm organization described the recent water agreement between the U.S. and Mexico as "far too" little and much too late."

"Essentially, Mexico has said it will honor the terms of the treaty for the coming year only, and much of it too late for the current growing season," said Kenneth Dierschke, president of the Texas Farm Bureau. "Mexico has repeatedly refused to address the water debt from previous years."

The Associated Press reported Friday that Mexico agreed to provide 350,000 acre feet of water by September 30 of this year and an additional 50,000 acre feet if climate conditions allow it. The agreement calls for 200,000 acre feet to be delivered by January release 350,000 acre feet of water into the Rio Grande annually. The U.S. must allow 1.5 million acre feet of low into Mexico from the Colorado River. The U.S. is in compliance but Mexico now owes a water deficit of more 1.7 million acre feet. Farmers in the Rio Grande Valley charge that the treaty violation has cost them millions in a time of severe drought.

The Texas Farm Bureau has called for actions, including withholding water for use on the U.S. side of the border.

Officials of the Mexican government claim they do not have enough water to honor the treaty. Texas and U.S. officials have charged that the water has been impounded south of the Rio Grande for irrigation in the interior of Mexico.

Dierschke says Farm Bureau has asked for sanctions to encourage Mexico compliance. TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Yoakum County, Texas on February 1, 2003, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court of the County on December 23, 2002, which order reads substantially as follows:

AN ORDER CALLING A CERTIFICATE OF OBLIGATION ELECTION TO BE HELD IN YOAKUM COUNTY, TEXAS; MAKING PROVISION FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE ELECTION; RESOLVING OTHER MATTERS INCIDENT AND RELATED TO SUCH ELECTION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court (the Court) of Yoakum County, Texas (the County) previously adopted a resolution on November 25, 2002 authorizing notice to be given of its intention to issue certificates of obligation in the maximum principal amount of \$2,950,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the payment of contractual obligations of the County to be incurred for (1) constructing, renovating, and equipping the County hospital, (2) the purchase of materials, supplies, equipment, machinery, land, rights-of-way for authorized needs and purposes relating to the County hospital, (3) payment for professional services relating to the construction and financing of the aforementioned project; and

WHEREAS, this notice was duly published in a newspaper hereby found and determined to be of general circulation in the County, once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication of such notice being not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the tentative date stated therein for the passage of the order authorizing the issuance of such certificates of obligation; and

WHEREAS, a petition protesting the issuance of the certificates of obligation described in the notice and requesting an election to be held on the proposed issuance of the certificates of obligation, which was signed by at least 5% of the qualified voters of the County, was presented to or filed with the County Clerk prior to the date set in such notice for the passage of the order authorizing the certificates of obligation as provided by the provisions of the Certificate of Obligation Act of 1971, as amended, Texas Local Government Code Sections 271.041 through 271.063 (the Act); and

WHEREAS, the Court hereby finds and determines that an election should be held to determine whether the Court shall be authorized to issue certificates of obligation of the County in the amount and for the purposes hereinafter identified; and

WHEREAS, the Court hereby finds and determines that the holding of this election on the date set forth below, a uniform election date, is in the public interest; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF YOAKUM COUNTY, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. An election shall be held on the 1st day of February, 2003, a uniform election date, in YOAKUM COUNTY, TEXAS, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of the adoption of this order (the *Order*), for the purposes of submitting the following proposition to the qualified voters of the County:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the Commissioners Court of the Yoakum County, Texas be authorized to issue and sell certificates of obligation of the County in the principal amount of not to exceed \$2,950,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the payment of contractual obligations of the County to be incurred for (1) constructing, renovating, and equipping the County hospital, (2) the purchase of materials, supplies, equipment, machinery, land, rights-of-way for authorized needs and purposes relating to the County hospital, (3) payment for professional services relating to the construction and financing of the aforementioned project; such certificates of obligation to mature serially or otherwise not more than forty (40) years from their date; and any issue or series of said bonds to bear interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as may be determined within the discretion of the Commissioners Court, provided that such rate of interest shall not exceed the maximum rate per annum authorized by law at the time of the issuance of any issue or series of said certificates of obligation; and shall the Commissioners Court of the County be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, within the limitations prescribed by law, on all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?"

SECTION 2. The County election precincts, polling places designated for holding the election, and the Presiding Judges and the Alternate Presiding Judges hereby appointed for holding the election are identified in Exhibit A to this Order, and this exhibit is incorporated by reference for all purposes.

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) resident qualified voters of the County to act as clerks to properly conduct the election. However, if the Presiding Judge appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall serve as one of the clerks. The appointment of such clerks must include a person fluent in the Spanish language to serve as a clerk to render oral aid in the Spanish language to any voter desiring such aid at the polls on the day of the election. In the absence of the Presiding Judge named above, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall perform the duties of the Presiding Judge.

The election shall be held in the County as prescribed by any applicable law and on the day of the election, the polls shall be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Early voting shall be conducted at the Main Early Voting Location, located at the Yoakum County Clerk's Office, Avenue G and Cowboy Way, Plains, Texas 79355 and at the Branch Early Voting Location located at the Yoakum County Branch Tax Office, 122 West 4th Street, Denver City, Texas 79355. With the exception of Saturdays, Sundays, and official State holidays, these offices or places shall remain open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 5:00 o'clock p.m. for early voting. Deborah Rushing, the County Clerk (whose mailing address is the Post Office Box 309, Plains, Texas 79355) is hereby appointed as the Early Voting Clerk. Donna Givens is hereby appointed as a Deputy Early Voting Clerk. The County Clerk will appoint any other Deputy Early Voting Clerks. Early voting shall commence on the 17th day before the election

and continue through the 4th preceding the date of the election all as provided by the provisions of the Texas Election Code.

An Early Voting Ballot Board is hereby established for the purpose of processing early voting results. Hazel Lowrey is appointed the Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board. The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) resident qualified voters of the County to serve as members of the Early Voting Ballot Board. In addition, the Commissioners Court establishes the rate of pay for judges and clerks to be \$6.00 per hour as established in the Texas Election Code. The presiding judge or alternate presiding judge shall be compensated an additional \$25.00.

SECTION 3. Voting machines may be used in holding and conducting the election on election day; provided, however, that if the use of voting machines is not practicable, then in that event, electronic voting devices may be used in conducting the election on election day; provided, however, in the event the use of such electronic voting devices is not practicable, the election may be conducted on election day by the use of paper ballots. Paper ballots may be used for early voting by personal appearance and by mail.

SECTION 4. The official ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code, as amended, so as to permit electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid propositions which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION

"THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$2,950,000 OF YOAKUM COUNTY, TEXAS CERTIFICATES OF OBLIGATION AND THE LEVYING OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

SECTION 5. All resident qualified voters of the County shall be permitted to vote at the election and on the day of the election, such electors shall vote at the designated polling place. The election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, and the provisions of Chapter 1251, as amended, Texas Government Code and the Act, and as may be required by any other law. All election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 6. A substantial copy of this Order shall serve as a proper notice of the election. This notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted at three (3) public places within the County and at the County Courthouse not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date the election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the County, the first of these publications to appear in such newspaper not more than thirty (30) days, and not less than fifteen (15) full days prior to the day of the election.

SECTION 7. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Order for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the Commissioners Court.

SECTION 8. All orders and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Order are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Order shall be and remain controlling as to the matters ordered herein.

SECTION 9. This Order shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.

SECTION 10. If any provision of this Order or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Order and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and this Commissioners Court hereby declares that this Order would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

SECTION 11. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Order is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Order, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, as amended, Texas Government Code.

SECTION 12. This Order shall be in force and effect from and after its final passage and it is so ordered.





Texas ALLTEL, Inc. (Texas ALLTEL) has filed a petition with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish a surcharge to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) petitions for several Texas ALLTEL exchanges. The submission of this petition is based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221, a measure established in Senate Bill 632 in the 73rd session of the Texas State Legislature

ELCS permits an exchange to expand its local calling scope to include one or more exchanges if customers approve by ballot the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues recoverable through a surcharge are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee, and are to be recovered from all access lines within the company. Because the ELCS surcharge that Texas ALLTEL customers are currently paying on the ELCS routes implemented prior to September 1, 1996 and in the year 2000 was only approved by the Commission for two years, that portion of the surcharge customers are currently paying will expire in February 2003. The breakout of the surcharge customers are currently paying is:

\$1.60	\$.80 (Expires October 2005)
\$1.22	\$.61 (Expires February 2003)
\$2.82	\$1.41 Total customers are currently paying

The costs and lost revenues for which recovery is sought in this petition are for ELCS routes implemented prior to September 1, 1996 and those implemented in the years 2000 and 2002. If the Texas ALLTEL petition is approved, the surcharge that customers will pay will be:

\$2.20	\$1.10 (Requested in this Petition–Includes add'l routes implemented in the year 2002)
\$3.80	\$1.90 Total customers would pay, if petition is approved

Customers will see no change in their monthly bill until and unless the Commission approves a surcharge different from the surcharge currently being charged. When a final rate is approved by the Commission, customer bills will be changed to reflect the new approved monthly surcharge with an effective date of February 20, 2003, with appropriate retroactive adjustments made as needed.

The net annual effect on the revenues of Texas ALLTEL will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses Texas ALLTEL for the increased direct cost of service associated with all ELCS petitions placed in service prior to September 1, 1996 and after January 1, 2000. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs Texas ALLTEL seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$41,250 monthly.
