

Plains EMS lends helping hand to community - now we can help them

Plains' Emergency Medical Services unit will soon be receiving a new state-of-the-art ambulance, purchased with grant funding, and sorely needed for the city and county. Local EMS President Curtis Coffman reported to CCN the new truck will be fully equipped for emergency runs, with the exception of vital two way radio communication gear. He and his fellow volunteers now need a financial boost from city and county residents.

Coffman is organizing a fund raising event to purchase new radio equipment. " It is virtually impossible for us to function quickly and efficiently on emergency runs if we can't communicate. We often must work with the Sheriff Department, The DPS, the County Hospital emergency room, sometimes a Physician on duty, and a good radio system is a must. We are hoping our local residents recognize the need for our EMS volunteers,

and will help us purchase this equipment." Coffman said donations can be made to Plains EMS, and given

Santa gives reindeer rest for Christmas Eve, arrives here by fire truck




