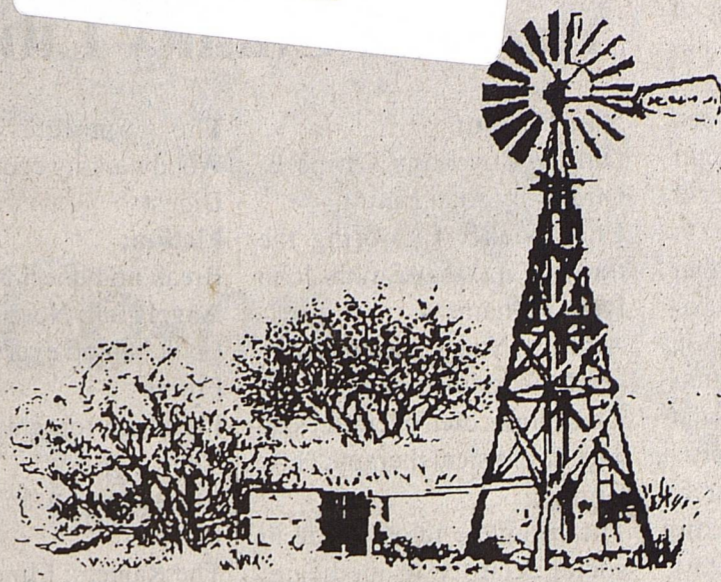

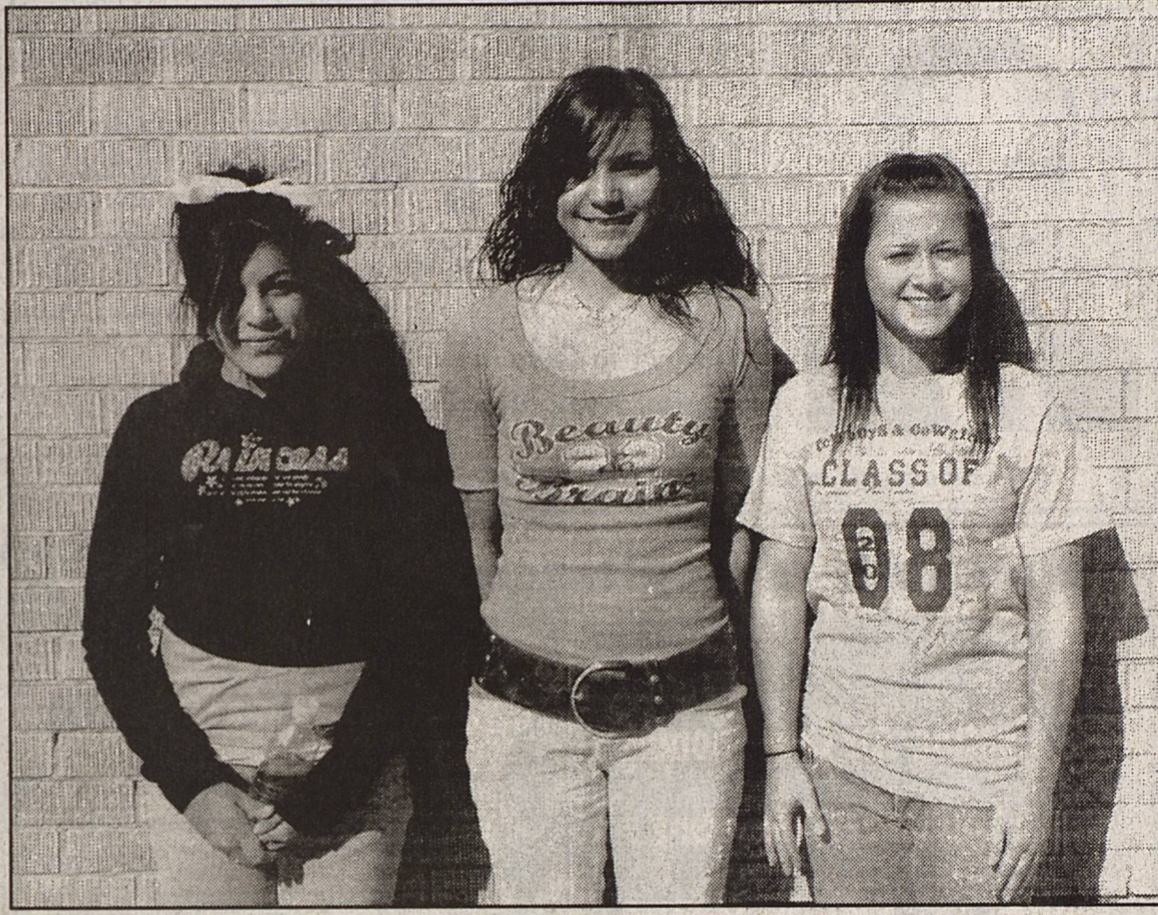

### Conservation Reserve Program payments to be issued October 2

CED Gary Six, Yoakum County Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency today announced that on October 2, 2006, FSA will begin issuing some \$142 million in Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) payments to eligible producers in Texas. More than \$1.7 billion in CRP payments are being made on 36 million acres across the country.

"The Conservation Reserve Program is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year of working cooperatively with America's farmers and ranchers to conserve and preserve the soil and water we, and numerous wildlife species, depend on for survival," said Six. "These payments represent an investment in the nation's land that will pay dividends in the form of a cleaner environment today

and for generations to come." The payments announced today are annual rental payments earned on the 4.0 million acres enrolled in fiscal year 2007. Producers holding 25,399 contracts on 18,334 farms will receive an average of \$7,764 per farm or \$35.12 per acre. The number of contracts is higher than the number of farms because producers may have multiple contracts on a single farm.

This payment announcement does not include rental payments for 1 million acres recently enrolled under CRP general sign-up 33, held from March 27 to April 28, 2006. Payments for new CRP acreage will be issued starting in October 2007.

Other CRP payments are made throughout the year, including a 50-percent reimbursement of expenses for establishing cover

and incentive programs and incentive payments for enrolling eligible conservation practices, such as wetland restorations and conservation buffers. In fiscal year 2007, these payments are anticipated to total about \$195 million nationwide.

Under CRP, producers voluntarily retire environmentally sensitive cropland for 10 to 15 years. Land to be enrolled must be either highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem, provide important wildlife or provide substantial environmental benefits if devoted to certain specific conservation uses.

### Routine business for Commissioners

It was business as usual in the September 25 session of Commissioners Court. Vicky Delgado, driver of the Senior Citizen bus, had requested substitute drivers be assigned to the position to cover times when she would be unable to be on the job. Mrs. Martin Flores and Nikki Jimenez were approved for the substitute driver position.

County Clerk Deborah Rushing requested the Court's approval of the purchase of a new scanner. She reported the current scanner was obsolete and unable to perform needed functions. She told the Court CTSI offered a suitable scanner for \$3,804, including installation and warranty. Her request was approved.

County Treasurer Barbara Wright sought approval to purchase needed furniture items for her office. She reported Hester-McGlaun had the needed items on sale for the delivery price of \$1885. The request was approved.

Clay Taylor, Yoakum County Hospital Administrator, requested approval to advertise for bids for C-Arm equipment, a device used in many surgical x-ray procedures. He also requested approval for a contract for lease of a Coagulation Analyzer and Chemistry System needed for the Dialysis Center. He suggested the lease would be around \$12,000 per year for use of the equipment. The Center will soon have 24 stations in operation for dialysis patients treatment.

### Residents learn success tips on economic development



B.A. Donaldson, long term resident and supporter of the Panhandle town of Stratford, told Plains locals at a September 19 community building meeting, "There are no shortcuts to effective economic development efforts in small communities".

Donaldson, a member and supporter of Stratford's team striving for successful economic effort ventures in his hometown, said the Stratford Area Foundation has been the guiding force responsible for some \$700,000 investments in the town and area, boosting developments, major repairs to the local community center, Boy Scout headquarters, a

\$11,000 improvement in equipment for the EMT unit, refurbishing of the Senior Citizen Center, improvements to the Main Street Park and many more projects in the town and area.

He acknowledged all small towns must strive for local projects with a force of volunteers. "It's only after you gain some knowledge and expertise and success you realize you will need a salaried person with some financial experience to actually run the show".

The Area Foundation in Stratford, a town of some 2,000, recently thought they had been successful in recruiting an Alco Variety Store for their

city, but the deal fell through at a late moment in the process. Donaldson said he was pleased to report the Foundation was close to seeing a local citizen near the final signing of documents which would create a Ben Franklin Group store for the town.

Donaldson told the almost three dozen citizens at the meeting "It is absolutely imperative your economic development volunteers enlist the full support of all your government entities, City Hall, the school district, and the elected county officials. "If they don't get on the job with you, you're

 in for trouble'. He cautioned listeners, "You're going to need a constant supply of money, even if we're not talking huge amounts. You need small projects to act as seed money to attract larger amounts of funds for bigger projects".

## 121st District Court Case

In the September 22 session of District Court, David Longoria entered a plea bargain to the state's motion to revoke supervision from a prior conviction of transporting chemicals with intent to manufacture methamphetamine, a second degree felony. 121st District Judge Kelly G. Moore ordered modified probation terms including intensive supervision for six months by reporting weekly to supervision officer; defendant shall pay delinquent court costs totaling \$368 by October 22; Must pay appointed attorney fee of \$250, fine balance of \$1500 and original \$525 attorney fees with \$25 monthly payments; pay delinquent supervision fees of \$683 in monthly installments of \$10 starting October 22; pay restitution balance of \$193.55 (joint and several liability of \$387.10) with \$10 monthly payments starting October 22. All provision of original judgement of July 22, 2004 will remain in effect. Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark represented the State.

## Important Change In Motor Vehicle Sales Tax Law

Beginning October 1 if you buy a vehicle from an individual, you will be charged tax on either 80 percent of the retail value or on actual price paid, whichever is more. This applies to cars, trucks, trailers, campers, motor homes, motorcycles, dollies, etc. that are less than 25 years old, with certain exceptions.

As part of the education tax reform package passed by the Legislature this spring, House Bill 4 changes the way sales tax is charged for sales of most motor vehicles between private parties (non-dealer sales). A taxable value will be determined called a "standard presumptive value" (SPV). The Comptroller defines this SPV as 'The third party transaction value of a motor vehicle as determined by the Texas Dept. of Transportation based on an appropriate regional guidebook of a nationally recognized motor vehicle value guide service, or based on another motor motor vehicle guide publication the department determines is appropriate if a private party transaction value for the vehicle is not

available from a regional guidebook."

The new law requires county tax offices to determine the tax due by using one of two methods, and calculating tax on the greater of:

- (1) The amount paid for the vehicle, or
- (2) 80% of the standard presumptive value.

If the amount paid is less than 80% of the SPV, the buyer may establish a lower value by obtaining a certified appraisal on a form prescribed by the Comptroller office from a licensed vehicle dealer or an insurance adjuster. Insurance adjusters are not limited to the amount charged for their appraisal.

A licensed vehicle dealer can appraise only the types of vehicle they are licensed to sell, such as passenger car/truck, trailer, motorcycle or travel trailer. The dealers must charge no less than \$100 up to \$300 (motorcycles start at \$40) or a travel trailer appraisal may be up to \$500.

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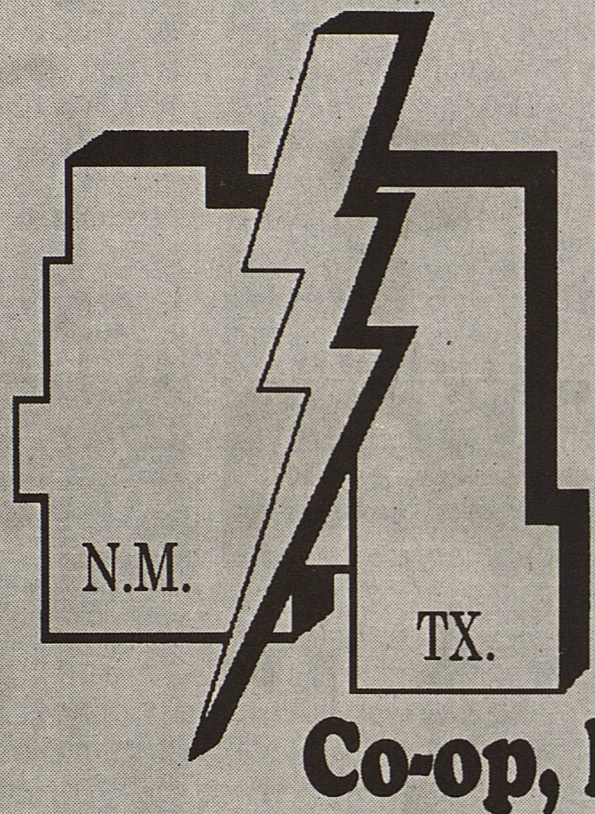
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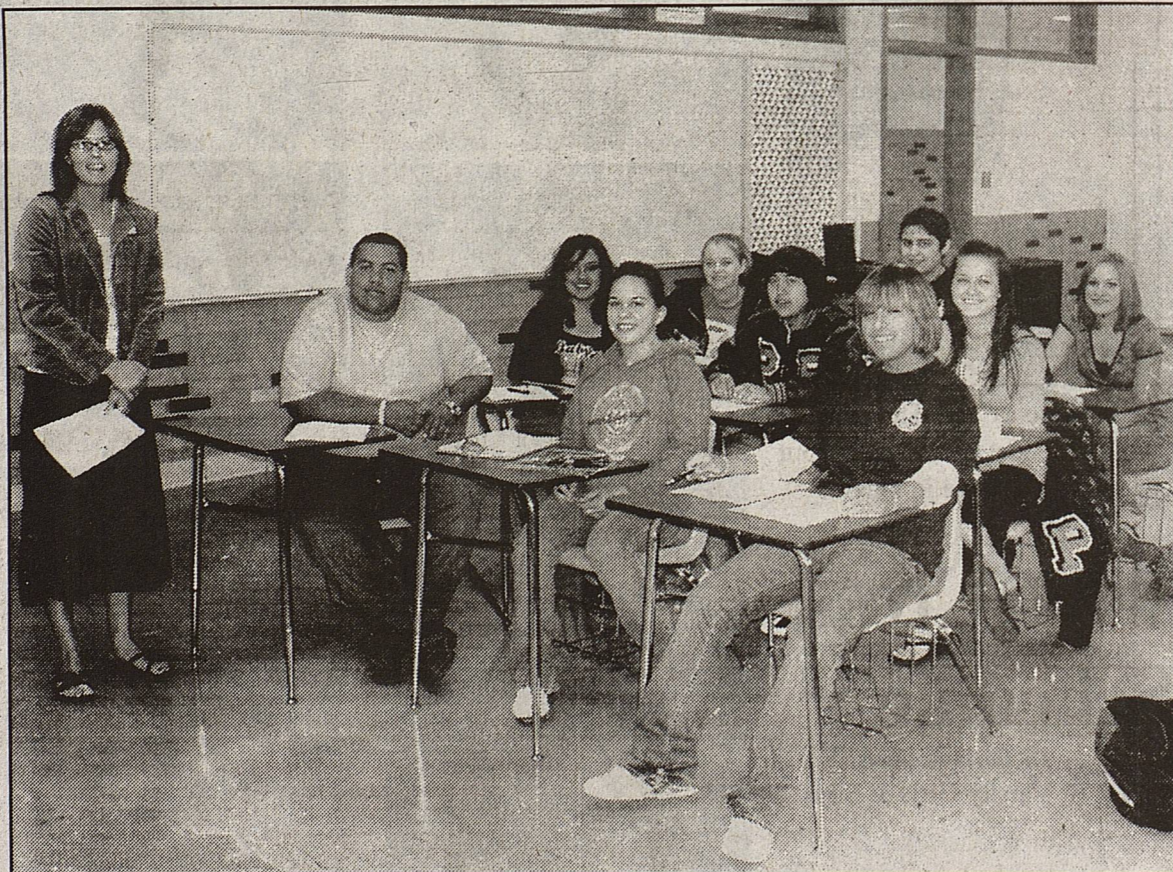

**Think Texas**  
 Agriculture Commissioner

When it comes to agriculture production, many important jobs extend beyond farming and ranching. Those who work in marketing, transportation, warehousing and distribution also have significant and essential responsibilities that factor into the logistics of moving Texas farm goods to foreign markets. Thankfully, we have all been very busy, and Texas currently ranks third in U.S. agricultural exports with a value of \$3.5 billion.

Texas regained its third-place position, closely following number-two Iowa and California at the top spot, accounting for about 7 percent of the total U.S. agricultural income. Overall, U.S. agricultural exports reached a new record in fiscal 2005 at \$62.4 billion.

Texas continues to rank first in exports of cotton and cottonseeds; second in feeds, fodders and peanuts; third in animal fats, hides and skins; fourth in tree nuts; fifth in sunflower seeds and oil; sixth in wheat, poultry and rice; seventh in live animals, meat and fruits; and ninth in feed grains, dairy products and seeds.

Texans use 80 percent of their land for some form of agricultural production, and individuals or families still run 92 percent of Texas' agricultural operations. However, even though agriculture employs one out of every seven working Texans, less than 2 percent of the population has an involvement in day-to-day farming or ranching.

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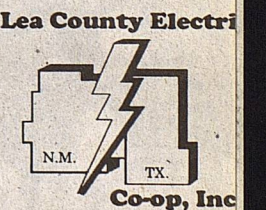

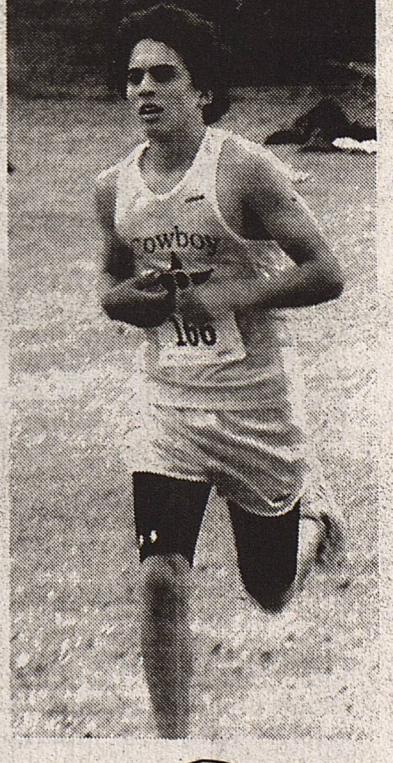
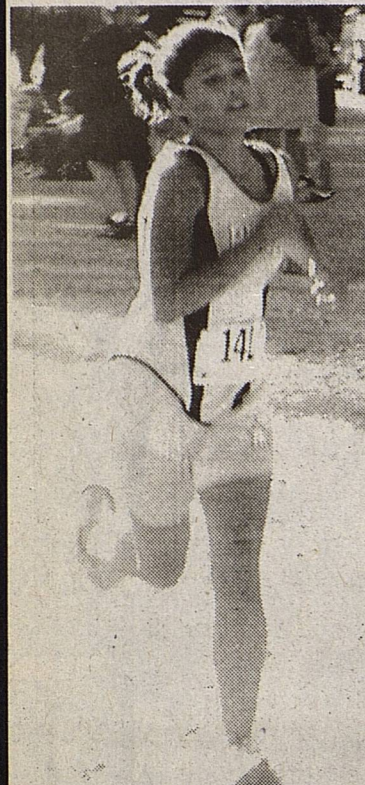

## Retired Teachers Meet

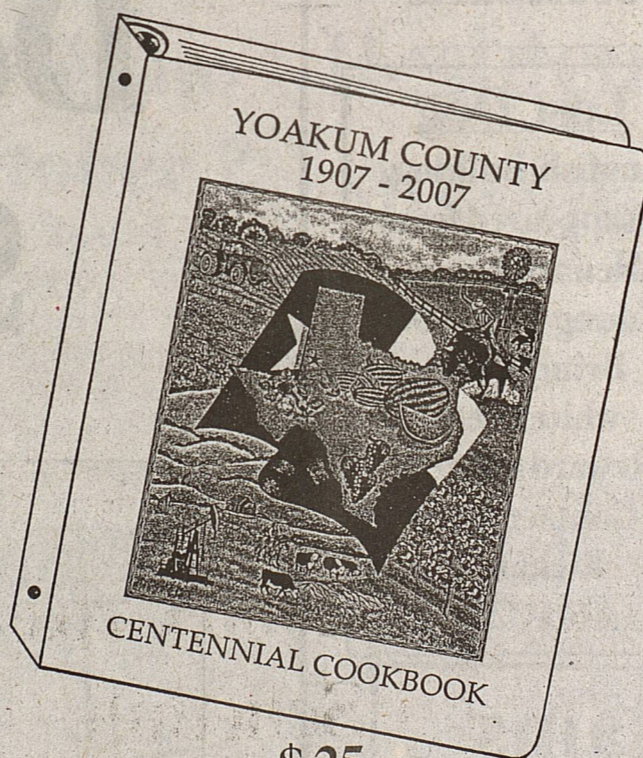

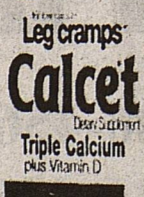
