County voters OK bond issue for hospital plans more than 2 - 1

The county wide election determining the fate of Yoakum County Hospital's expansion and improvement plans with a \$2.95 million bond issue undoubtedly must have surprised many voters, as well as pleasing and displeasing many.

According to numbers released by County Clerk Debbie Rushing the Saturday evening after all polling places had closed, and her office had tabulated the results, county residents cast a total of 643 votes for the passage of the bond issue, with 310 voters against the issue. Mrs. Rushing reminded all residents, "These vote totals will not be official until they are formally certified by the Commissioners Court."

The county hospital's proposal included plans for a dialysis center, expanded emergency room, new birthing facilities, a physical therapy center including an aquatic pool for therapy, and a community meeting room. A new heliport would also be built adjacent to the hospital.

Early after the hospital announced the planned expansion plans, a group of both Denver City and Plains citizens circulated a county wide petition calling for a formal election to determine the fate of the hospital's proposal. Enough signatures were ob-Please Turn To Page 2, "Election Results"



Criminal cases in County Court

In a recent session of County Court, Judge Dallas Brewer presiding, Saul Licon Montana pled guilty to evading arrest/ detention. He was sentenced to spend 35 days in jail, with credit for 35 days served, and was held for the U.S. Border Patrol. Bill Helwig served as his attorney, and Officer Joe Ramos, Denver City Police, was the investigating officer.

In the January 27 session of court, Josefina Jordan Carrillo received a sentence of adjudication of guilt deferred for possession of less than two ounces marijuana. She will be under community supervision one year, pay \$211 court costs, \$140 restitution to Texas DPS, and \$200 court appointed attorney fees. She must attend weekly AA (narcotics) meetings, serve 24 hours community service and complete the 'TAIP program (Texas Alternative Incarceration Program). A cause of cocaine possession was dismissed. 



Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish a surcharge to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) petitions for several Texas ALLTEL exchanges. The submission of this petition is based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221, a measure established in Senate Bill 632 in the 73rd session of the

ELCS permits an exchange to expand its local calling scope to include one or more exchanges if customers approve by ballot the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues recoverable through a surcharge are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee, and are to be recovered from all access lines within the company. Because the ELCS surcharge that Texas ALLTEL customers are currently paying on the ELCS routes implemented prior to September 1, 1996 and in the year 2000 was only approved by the Commission for two years, that portion of the surcharge customers are currently paying will expire in February 2003. Customers will see no change in their monthly bill until and unless the Commission approves a surcharge different from the surcharge currently being charged. When a final rate is approved by the Commission, customer bills will be changed to reflect the new approved monthly surcharge with an effective date of February 20, 2003, with appropriate retroactive adjustments made as needed.

The net annual effect on the revenues of Texas ALLTEL will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses Texas ALLTEL for the increased direct cost of service associated with all ELCS petitions placed in service prior to September 1, 1996 and after January 1, 2000. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs Texas ALLTEL seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$41,250 monthly.



Taxpayer Info Available From Appraisal District

Saundra Stephens, chief appraiser for Yoakum County Appraisal District, offers property owners a 2003 pamphlet called Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies & Responsibilities to help them save on their property taxes. Stephens noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, school districts and special districts (such as municipal utility, junior college, water districts and hospital districts.)

"Home owners may file for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on homesteads," residence Stephens said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet explains each exemption and how to apply for

"A tax freeze, or ceiling, for school taxes is a benefit for home owners once they become 65 years old," Stephens said. "New law provides that home owners who turn 65 may apply during the year, rather than waiting until January 1.

"An elderly home owner's taxes that pay for public schools cannot increase above the total school tax amount on that home in the first year that the home owner receives the over 65 home owner exemption," Stephens continued. "But it may increase if the home owner improves or adds to the house, such as adding a pool or patio."

The law provides an additional is a citizen board that hears taxschool tax benefit for certain home owners. If the surviving spouse of an over 65 home owner is at least 55 years old at the time of the older spouse's death, then he or she can keep the school tax ceiling. The tax ceiling, however, does not apply for other taxing units such as the county and city.

The surviving spouse also may retain the over 65 home owner's exemptions offered by the local taxing units, if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of the older

The chief appraiser pointed out a notice this year. that home owners 65 or older do not need to reapply for the exment in UIL and is usually the emption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Home owners turning 65 during the year may file for the District Office in Plains.

over 65 exemption up to one year from the date they turn 65, owned the home, and lived in it as their principal residence. Only those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling, such as the surviving spouse age 55 or older, must apply in 2003.

Home owners are also eligible for a \$3,000 general exemption because the county levies a tax for farm to market roads.

Stephens added that any taxing unit may offer a local option exemption that allows a percentage reduction in each residence homestead's appraisal value. In 2003, a taxing unit may exempt up to 20 percent of each qualified home's appraised value. Plains ISD is the only taxing unit that offers the 20 percent exemp-

"1-d-1" productivity appraisal is another type of tax relief available to agricultural owners. The landowner must file a signed, sworn application with the chief appraiser by April 30. The owners do not need to reapply each year, unless the chief appraiser requests in writing that they do so or if they purchase new land. The application must be in the name of the current owner. However, if the land's use changes to a non-agriculture one, the period for recapturing lost taxes is five

"Appraisal district staff can offer more information about special land appraisal, tax renditions and exemptions," Stephens said. She said the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about protesting to the appraisal review board (ARB). The ARB payers protests to ensure that property values are fair and uni-

"I urge all property owners in the Yoakum County Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and learn about the property tax system and all possible property tax relief," Stephens said.

"Remember, taxpayers must file exemption applications with the appraisal office by April 30 and must file all protest at the appraisal office within 30 days after the appraisal notices are mailed. Since this is not a reapspouse's death and owns and praisal year, not all property owner in the county will receive
