

Groundwater Awareness Week

Texas' municipal systems and about 75 percent earth's surface. It is extremely important for of the water used in irrigation. Groundwater Awareness Week encourages homeowners to schedule their annual water well checkups.

Groundwater is the water which soaks into the storm drains and wells. downward to fill cracks and other openings in beds of rock and sand. It is a renewable resource, although renewal rates vary greatly according to environmental conditions.

It also is an abundant natural resource. Of all the fresh water in the world (excluding polar ice caps), 90 percent is groundwater. Surface water, such as lakes and rivers, only make up three percent of our fresh water. Scientists estimate U.S. groundwater reserves to be at least 33 trillion gallons - roughly equal to the amount of water discharged into the Gulf of Mexico by the Mississippi River over the past 200 years. Groundwater is naturally filtered by the earth

Groundwater supplies about 41 percent of by pollutants coming into contact with the Texans to pay close attention to what they release into the earth, whether directly into lakes and streams, or even more importantly, into

soil from rain or other precipitation and moves More than 15 million households in the U.S. have their own water well. The owners of these wells have control of, and responsibility for, their water supply. An annual checkup conducted by a licensed or certified ground water contractor is an important step they can take to ensure the proper operation of the well and to prolong its years of service, as well as monitor water quality.

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, consisting of 216 Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs), is actively involved as a member of the Texas Groundwater Protection Committee. 8th Wranglers win Whiteface track meet



Proposed House budget cuts pose threat to ag producers

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said last Friday that drastic cuts in farm bill funding by the House Budget Committee would be a "stunning setback" for the severely depressed U.S. farm economy. The committee approved a budget resolution with \$ 894 million in cuts to the 2002 Farm Bill. The cuts Sheriff David Bryant and Diswould come in three program areas - conservation funding, farm program payments to farmers and nutrition programs.

Kenneth Dierschke, a grain and cotton farmer from San Angelo, and leader of Texas' largest farm organization, said, "Agriculture is not in a strong enough financial position to absorb these cuts as proposed."

The American Farm Bureau Federation Board of Directors voted Thursday to oppose the budget resolution. Dierschke is a member of the AFBF Board.

"We are urging our Texas Congressional Delegation to vote against the resolution," he said. The vote is likely to come this week.

In a letter to members of Congress from Texas, Dierschke said, We appreciate the recent passage of the economic assistance package for 2000 and 2001, but would argue that it makes little sense to provide assistance in one month and reduce the safety net in the next.'

The Department of Defense and the VA have taken important steps in this regard, and must continue to acknowledge, treat and protect our ailing veterans. 
Cowboy Baseball Recap

Speaking on public policy and initiatives and issues, Mrs. Jones explained public policy is "our right as citizens to promote legislation." She listed the various initiatives supported by the Democratic and Republican parties and encouraged members to look up these initiatives and promote the issues of their choice.

Mrs. Rushing gave club members insight on how to identify and contact public officials. She gave an internet web site, Jones.

TSA MO GA club members www.capitol.state.tx.us, that is useful in tracking information on bills that have been introduced in the legislature. By entering a county name or zip code, browsers can also use this site to obtain a list of government officials. Mrs. Rushing also has a copy of the Texas State Directory in the district clerk's office which lists addresses and phone numbers of officials. Community members who are in need of names and addresses can contact her office in the Yoakum County Court House for help.

Mrs. Rushing noted one of the problems that legislators are facing this year is the \$9.9 billion dollar shortfall reported by Carol Keaton Rylander-Strahorn, state comptroller. Now Strahorn is predicting that the amount could rise to \$13.3 billion.

Rushing told the group the budget woes will probably be felt in ways other than new taxes. In her office alone she mentioned possible increases in fees, licenses, certificates and filing fees. "You will definitely feel an increase in the things you will be paying for." She suggested that members who are concerned with the budget and bills, such as those that affect school finance can use the capitol web site to get informa-

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
