
## 'Detective Dogs' Find Junior High Clean




## Student of the Week





## **Area Drug Presence Made Evident Again**

In last week's issue, we featured an article on the growing threat of methamphetamine drugs throughout the Southwest. In the predawn hours on January 20, a year long narcotics operation in neighboring Lea County, New Mexico culminated in a large drug raid there, resulting in the arrest of 55 individuals.

They were mass booked and arraigned by three Lea County magistrates in the National Guard Armory in Hobbs, charged with over 125 felonies for the sale, distribution and trafficking of Marijuana, cocaine, crack cocaine, methamphetamine and heroin.

The raid and arrests were carried out by almost 200 law officers, including the New Mexico State Police, several drug task force units, Lea County Sheriffs Department, police from Hobbs, Lovington, Jal, Tatum, Carlsbad, Artesia, Roswell, Portales, Clovis, and Seminole, Texas, and many other agencies, including the FBI

Officials expect other arrests to be made as a result of the raid. While most of those arrested were from Hobbs, it is likely charges will be filed against others from surrounding area towns, including Texas.

They were selected because of their academic standing in the class, and their leadership and citizenship characteristics.
