Eight Yoakum County 4-H members participated in the District II Junior Livestock Judging Contest this past Saturday in Lubbock. The team withstood the cold, damp conditions at the Texas Tech **Research Farm and dominated** the opposing competition with a team score of 1,046 out of a possible 1,200, capturing the District Title. Those par-District Title. Those par-ticipating were: Rustin Knight, Chris Leggett, Kelton Mason, Jeremy Humphrey, Jason Swann, Jennifer Coston, Taylor Gray, and Ricky Nevarez.

The contest involved evaluating and placing eight classes of livestock which included market steers, lambs and hogs, breeding heifers, gilts, and ewes. The winning team consisted of Rustin Knight, Kelton Mason, Jeremy Humphrey, and Ashlei Mason. As a team, Yoakum County 4-H won the Beef and Swine Division and placed sixth in Sheep. In the Swine Division,

Kelton Mason placed 1st, and Rustin Knight was 2nd high individual. Kelton Mason also won the Sheep Division giving him the High Point Individual Award overall. Jeremy Humphrey and Ashlei Mason also turned in consistently high scores allowing the team to win the contest. The team of Chris Leggett, Jason Swann, Taylor Gray, Jennifer Coston, and Ricky Nevarez did extremely well, but dropped just
