This impressive field of cotton just east of town on the Joe Ancinec farm, adjoining the PISD livestock sheds, is being watered by the Drip Irrigation System Joe and son Brad Ancinec installed last year. When the drip concept was first experimented with for commercial row crops such as cotton, the idea was met with general skepticism by most producers. It's success in different High Plains areas has brought about much revised thinking. The drip system may never replace the prevalent pivot irrigation systems, but it has demonstrated its feasibility for smaller, irregular and difficult to water plots such as the Ancinec field

Toddler's outbursts and other disciplinary issues eed to be studied from the child's point of view. When oddlers lose control, they need adult help to recover.

Typically, toddlers exert themselves in "temper tantrums \({ }^{\circ}\) by about 15 months. These displays of the struggle for independence usually peak in the second and third years (Brazelton, 1992). To help avoid such outbursts, caregivers need to:
- Try to encourage some physical outlets for the child's frustration such as water play, outdoor play, umping, hammering, running, or pounding a pillow.
- Recognize the developmental readiness for understanding and behaving in certain situations.
- Be aware of the emotions the child is exhibiting...anger, frustration, fatigue, resentment, illness, fear. Acknowledge the feelings of the child.

Avoid putting the child in situations that he may not be ready to handle
- Prepare for situations by giving simple rules the child can understand.

ELIMINATE KITCHEN HAZARDS
The kitchen can be a dangerous place for children. For the safety of your children follow these procedures:
- Keep counters free of knives and glassware
- Turn pot handles away from the front of the
stove
- Do not let appliance cords dangle over counter edges

Put child proof locks on drawers and covers on stove knobs
- Set your water heater at 120 degrees to
prevent scalding
