EATING RIGHT DURING PREGNANCY comes pregnant she usually decides that it is time to "improve" her diet. This is important because she truly is "eating for two," but it is even better to begin a nutritious diet long before The baby is conceived. The health of the baby depends on the nutrition he or she receives before birth and also on the health of the mother. Good nutrition will help the mother fend off infections and othe illnesses during pregnancy. Good nutrition during pregnancy requires eating proper amounts of food
from the four groups of from the four groups o
foods--milk, and dairy meats, fruits and veget ables, and grains and cereals.
To get the most nutrition out of the extra 300 cal ories per day a pregnant woman needs, she mus eliminate foods with empty calories such as cookies and soft drinks. Alcoho should also be avoided. Increased amounts o vitamins and protein are needed during pregnancy but they can be obtained in a balanced diet. Calcium must also be increased t about 1500 mg . per day his can be obtained by milk (milk is also a very good source of protein).
Only a couple nutrients need to be supplemented dúring pregnancy. A woman's blood volume increases significantly during pregnancy so extra iron is useful in preventing anemia. The vitamin that is most important to supplement is folic acid. Researchers now know that this vitamin prevents birth defects of the brain and spinal cord. Almost all other vitamins and minerals are abundant in a balanced diet.
