He described his outlook on guiding student athletes as a 3-D approach; There must be Discipline - Our kids must want to win, but win without regret for any of their actions in the contest. In other words, winning with honor. Winning requires Dedication - there must be maximum effort in all contests, but also in each hour and day of practice. There must be sincere Desire - a burning desire to be a champion in a championship effort, on and off the field or court",
Williams placed special emphasis on student athletes earning respect in their contests, and especially respect for their efforts in the classroom, and neither aspect of respect could be earned without pride in their individual efforts.
