This issue, Number fifty-two, marks the first year anniversary of publishing C.C.N. for you, our neighbors, subscribers, advertisers and over the counter buyers.

Our first issue appeared August 31, 1994, and we had several people ask if we had taken leave of our senses, starting a second newspaper in a town the size of Plains, challenging an existing paper which had been in business some ten years. To be honest, we were very nervous the week prior to the first printing, realizing the creation of a newspaper was a venture we had never experienced before.

The first run was a four pager, with just a few advertisers, and absolutely no subscribers backing us. Unbelievably, in less than thirty days, 191 good people had signed aboard for our paper, and we had ad commitments from many good and faithful advertisers, most of them to this day. Our thanks go to every subscriber, every advertiser, but our SPECIAL THANKS go to Milton Bayer, the very first advertiser, and Virginia and L.J. Sanders, the first subscribers, and both are still with us today.

The last 52 weeks have been fun (Sometimes), full of goofs on our part, hectic at times, very interesting, and all of them a learning experience. We have come into close contact with people we've known forever, yet really didn't know. We have reported on many items of interest, many fun things, and some sad events. We readily admit, whether it's believed or not, we have worked considerably harder than we'd ever anticipated (or wanted), but that's the

Lots of memorable events have occurred this first year. I once wrote an obituary, and was ready to send it to press, when one of our tiny staff spotted the fact I had the party dying before he was born. We prepared a page one week with the picture of a young man, captioned with the name of an obvious girl, a mistake discovered by our printer. Another week, we sent a six page issue to the printer, with all pages labeled 'Page Two'. I once reported a PHS Cowboy football game, with the immortal words, "With the ball on the 56 yard line, the Cowboys......" Perfect, we're not, nor ever will be.

There are a number of things we've experienced this first year we're grateful for. One of our more "Seasoned Citizens" told me once, "You just have no idea how nice it is to have a real, live newspaper here again!" Another faithful advertiser, Jack Spears, told us the first time we contacted him for an ad, he would support us, for he believed in buying at home whenever he could. INFLUENZA PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Influenza continues to be a significant cause of mortality (death) and morbidity (illness) among the elderly, those with cardiopulmonary disease, immunosuppression, or other serious chronic conditions. The incidence of influenza related deaths in the United states ranges from about 10,000 in years with low influenza activity to more than 40,000 in severe influenza epidemics. What is important here is that, unlike most other viral illnesses, influenza is preventable through use of the influenza vaccine; however, it continues to be underutilized.

In years past influenza epidemics, which occur every year, were caused by single viruses; however, during recent epidemics two or even three types of viruses have circulated simultaneously. Fortunately the Influenza vaccine covers all of the viruses expected to appear in the up-coming season. In every season influenza attack rates are always highest among school age children and adolescents and, while they are quite ill, they tolerate the illness better than the very young, elderly, and chronically ill. The risk for hospitalization is very high among patients 65 and older and those 45 and older with significant lung disease.

Who Should Receive A Flu Shot?

Anyone age 65 and older, Adults and Children with Chronic Cardiac and/or Pulmonary Disease Including Asthma, Adults and Children with illness requiring frequent followup or hospitalization during the previous year, Adults and Children in chronic care facilaspirin therapy, Immunocompromised adults and Children, Household contacts of persons in the above mentioned (no exceptions), anyone who does not want to catch the Flu!

When To Vaccinate Immunizations must be repeated each year. October and November are generally considered to be the optimal months for receiving flu shots and the vaccination is generally not available until September:

The vaccination significantly reduces the risk of infection and reduces the severity of illness in those who become happiness".

in 10 who receive the shot have soreness, swelling and redness at the site of injection. It does not cause a respiratory "flu-like" illness. Most of the confusion with this is that the vaccine is usually administered in a clinic with people who are already ill and circulating other respiratory viruses. Fever and muscle aches may occur in 10% of adults and 20-40% in children. Again, the flu shot will not cause the flu. It consists of 100% inactivated virus and is not capable of causing any infection.

If you don't get a flu shot and you inevitably catch the flu we have some medications with activity against Influenza A which usually help tremendously and we can also treat your symptoms with antihistamine decongestants and analgesics; however, if you don't get a flu shot and you catch a bug other than Influenza A such as Influenza B the medicines will be of marginal benefit. Hummingbird Cake

3 cups floure no 2 cups sugar

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. cinnamon 3 beaten eggs

1-1/2 cup salad oil




