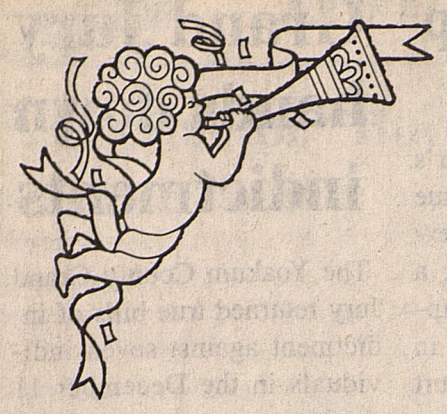


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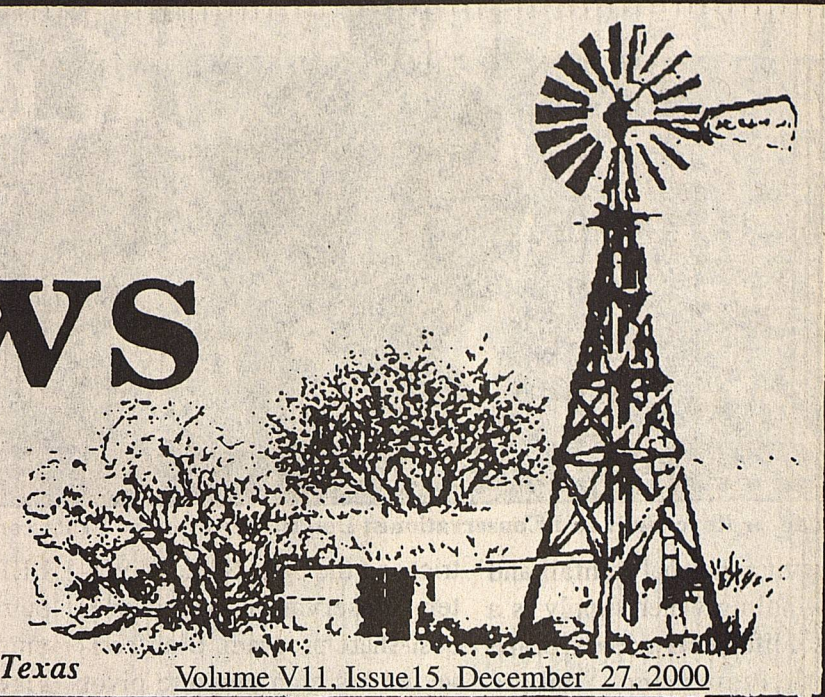

State Senator Bivins speaks here Upcoming Legislation topics reviewed in town hall meeting last Tuesday



Over three dozen citizens of Yoakum County attended a town hall meeting and heard Senator Teel Bivins, R, outline upcoming topics facing legislators when the 77th Texas Legislative session opens January 9. A resident of Amarillo, Sen. Bivins represents the 31st Senate District of Texas.

He told the audience his hat was in the ring, along with a number of other state senators for the office of Lieutenant Governor. Present Lt. Governor Rick Perry will automatically move into the Governor's office when President-Elect George W. Bush resigns. The 31 State Senators will then elect a new Lt. Governor from within

their ranks. Bivins is Chairman of the Senate Education Committee, Vice-Chair of the Subcommittee on Agriculture, and serves on the Natural Resources, Border Affairs and Electric Utility Restructuring Committees. He said Texas' rapidly growing population would present redistricting challenges in both the Senate and House of Representatives when the legislators receive the Census Bureau official population figures. The state's population is expected to go over 20 million, and each senate district would represent approximately 650,000 residents. He also

Criminal cases in County Court

Three criminal cases were heard in County Court December 20, with Judge Dallas Brewer presiding and Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark representing the state.

Armando Antonio Nunez pled guilty to theft of more than \$50, but less than \$500. He was fined \$100, and must pay \$210 court costs.

William Ferrell Bennett pled guilty to assault causing bodily injury. A 90 day jail sentence was suspended and probated 12 months. He must pay \$225 court costs, serve 80 hours community service, and complete the batterer's treatment program. Investigating officer in the case was Officer William Gardner, Denver City Police.

Jeremy Jason Gonzales' conditions of community supervision from an assault causing bodily injury were extended, to remain in the managed care center at Lubbock for a term of 30 days to 6 months. All community service fees will be waived while he is confined

Country Treasurer Toni Jones, who for many years has headed up the annual program, told CCN, "We've had so much support and help this year it will be difficult to thank everyone, and I certainly don't want to leave anyone out. The high school students did a great job collecting both food and toys, and the Junior High classes competed against one another in their canned food drive. We had a number of very generous money donors, the courthouse and county employees pitched in with food, gifts and cash. 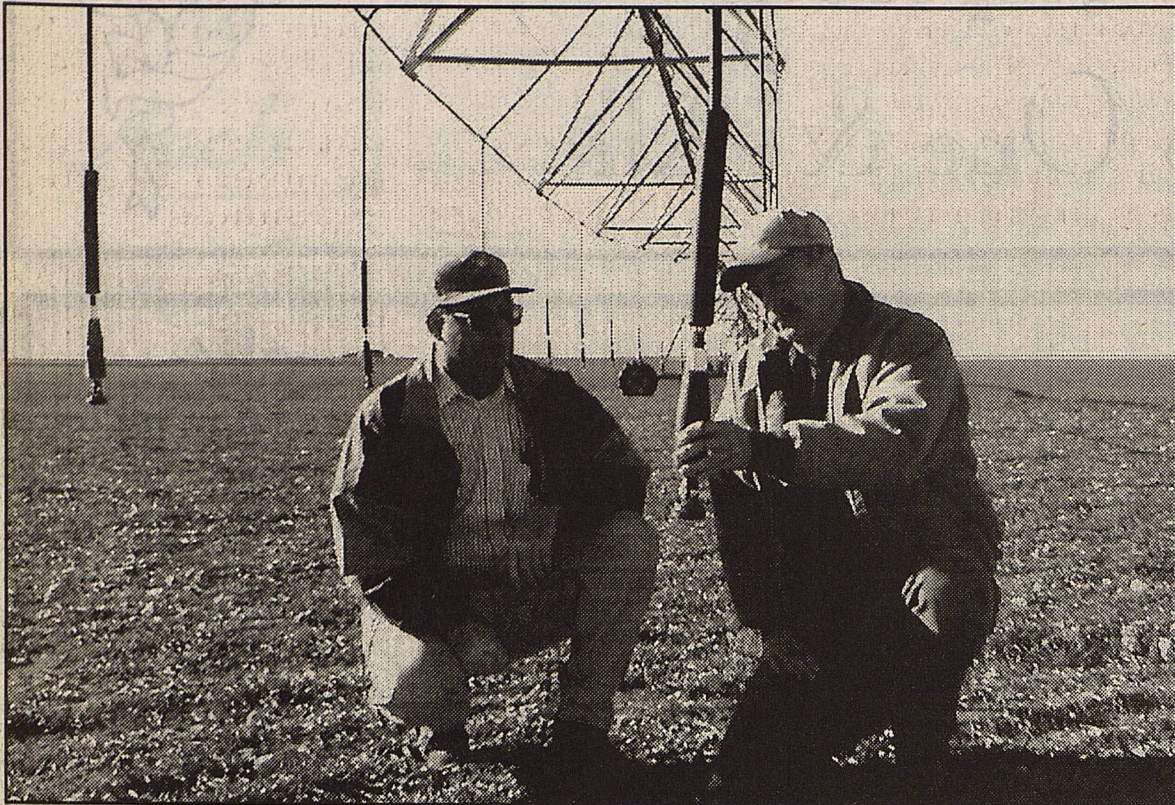

Cost-Share funds available to produces here for LEPA conversions

Less than normal rainfall and a dwindling water supply is a fact of life in many parts of the South Plains and Yoakum County. If you make a living producing irrigated crops, it is an expensive fact if the crop cannot get the moisture it needs.

There are many ways to apply irrigation water, but some are more efficient than others. It makes sense water applied directly to the soil surface is more efficient than water applied and susceptible to wind, evaporation, etc. In other words, more water getting to the crop in exchange for the expense it takes to get it there.

Local producer Royce Blair realized wasting water in his operation was neither cost effective nor a good conservation method for future generations. Working with the Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation Dis-

trict and the State Soil and Water Conservation Board in a cost-share program, Blair converted his high pressure pivot system to a low pressure LEPA system (low energy precision application).

Using quad sprays (bubblers) within eight inches of the soil surface, irrigation water is delivered accurately and efficiently. For pre-planting or getting a crop started, the bubblers can be 'popped up' for an energy efficient, low level spray application.

Blair converted an old high pressure Zimmatic system to the LEPA system, and will recover about half the expense of the conversion from the two conservation entity's cost-share program. Blair is using the LEPA system on a half circle of wheat, and irrigated another half circle of solid row cotton planted in circular rows. "The

LEPA system cut my water pumping from 500 gallons per minute to 400, and I am convinced I am using the water much more efficiently," Blair told CCN. In a year which has been rather disastrous for many cotton producers, Royce harvested 80 bales of cotton from 60 acres.

He reported he was very skeptical about planting cotton in a circle pattern, "But I came to like it very much. At stripping time, you're not faced with running your machinery over all the deep tracks left by the pivot system.

State Soil and Water Conservationist Don Haley said additional cost-share funds are available for similar conversions for producers agreeing to a water quality plan, and the deadline for application for the program is February 1.

feels it is possible West Texas could lose representation in the House because of dwindling rural populations, and dramatic growth around the state's major cities and in the Rio Grande Valley.

Sen. Bivins said the state's most precious natural resource, water in adequate supply, would be a continuing problem for the 77th Legislature. An audience member asked if the lawmakers could address the problem of a shortage of teachers in public education, and rapid turn over of teachers. Sen. Bivins said in the last legislative session a "Teach For Texas" grant program had been approved, making millions of dollars available to new teachers who agree to teach at a public school for a specified time, and who continue their educations and hone their teaching skills. Another topic of major concern

facing the 77th Legislature is the serious deterioration of the state's highway system. Sen. Bivins said the amount of money available now to repair and upgrade the once vaunted Texas highways system leaves the roads in worse condition each year. "Our booming population surge, and greatly increased trade with Mexico has put great strains on our highways, and we will have to seek other methods of financing this vital infrastructure," the Senator said.

The Senator fielded other questions from the audience concerning public education funding, problems with the TAAS test, and agricultural policy. He said Texas and other agricultural states would continue to play a secondary role to federal policies governing agriculture production and prices, but the state would continue to promote Texas ag products.

New Judge to Help Speed Up Court System for Kids

Abused and neglected children will be closer to finding a safe and permanent home when Kevin Mart is sworn in as the Associate Judge for the South Plains Cluster Court. The Honorable Kelly G. Moore, Administrative Judge for the 9th Judicial Region, will administer the oath for the new associate judge. The swearing in will take place at the Lubbock County Courthouse, 72nd District Courtroom on Monday, December 18, 2000 at 1:30 pm. As associate judge, Kevin Mart's responsibility will be to hear the abuse and neglect cases involving children in Child Protective Services' (CPS) custody. This project allows for judicial specialization and more court time in Lubbock and surrounding counties. The concept has proven successful in clearing the backlog of Child Protective Services' cases.

The Supreme Court Task Force on Foster Care piloted two projects in 1997 that became known as the "Cluster Courts". These courts handle CPS cases exclusively, and utilize a traveling judge that hears cases in a cluster of counties, which individually would not otherwise have enough children in CPS care to constitute a full caseload. Each cluster court is designed to meet local needs and utilize local resources.

In conjunction with the new South Plains Cluster Court, CASA of Lubbock has received

a grant from the Governor's Office to expand into the same counties. This collaborative expansion will provide for a CASA volunteer to be appointed to all the children in CPS care in the Cluster Court area. Judge Kelly G. Moore stated, "When I learned that a court had been approved for eleven counties in this area, my first thought was that we might be able to facilitate the expansion of CASA into all eleven counties in the cluster. I cannot stress enough the importance of the CASA program to the children."

Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) is a nationwide program that provides volunteers to advocate for the best interests of abused and neglected children in the court system. CASA volunteers conduct interviews and do research regarding their cases and then make written and verbal recommendations to the judge. They help ensure that the children are put in the best situation possible.

The eleven counties in the cluster include Lubbock, Crosby, Hale, Garza, Dawson, Lynn, Terry, Yoakum, Hale, Swisher, and Castro.

Cameras will be allowed in the courtroom for the swearing in.

Grand Jury hands down indictments

The Yoakum County Grand Jury returned true bills of indictment against seven individuals in the December 11 session.

Felipe A. Rodriguez was indicted for a third or more DWI offense, a third degree felony. A \$2,500 bond was set.

Michael Lee Stafford was indicted on a possession of methamphetamine in a drug free zone charge, a third degree felony. His bond was set at \$2,500.

Sherry Williams Cleveland was indicted on a third or more DWI charge, also a third degree felony. Bond was \$2,500.

Cayetano Anthony Gonzales was also indicted on a third or more DWI charge. His bond was set at \$2,500.

Kenneth Owen Gatewood was indicted for a third or more DWI, and bond was \$2,500.

Pascual Nava Perez was indicted for assault causes bodily injury, a third degree felony enhanced by a prior cause of assault causes injury to a family member.

Carol Marroquin Perez was indicted for possession of cocaine, another third degree felony. Bond was set at \$3,500.

All bonds for felony indictments are set by District Judge Kelly G. Moore, and Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark represented the state.

Legislators face full plate of perplexing issues

When the 77th Texas Legislature convenes in Austin January 9, the thorny issue of senate and house redistricting will undoubtedly be one of the major hurdles the solons must clear. There are dozens of other issues and topics to be wrestled with also. The Senate Research Center issued a publication this month offering brief overviews of a broad range of categories and topics sure to be addressed by the 77th session, including; Formula funding for higher education; the Higher Education Coordinating Board has recommended a \$925 million increase in funding for all institutions of higher learning.

Health and Human Services; Medical information privacy, a close look at long term care in the state, child health topics including immunization, revising Medicaid for children, investigating the foster home system, possible revising rules governing restraints, seclusions and psychoactive medications used by health facilities, and the issue of implementing procedures ensuring people with disabilities residing in institutions have full access to information about the full range of care options available to them.

Border affairs; How to facilitate economic development and trade in the Texas-Mexico bor-

der area, possible development of socialized education and training in NAFTA related industries, Environmental concerns in the Border region, including adequate water and wastewater systems are topics

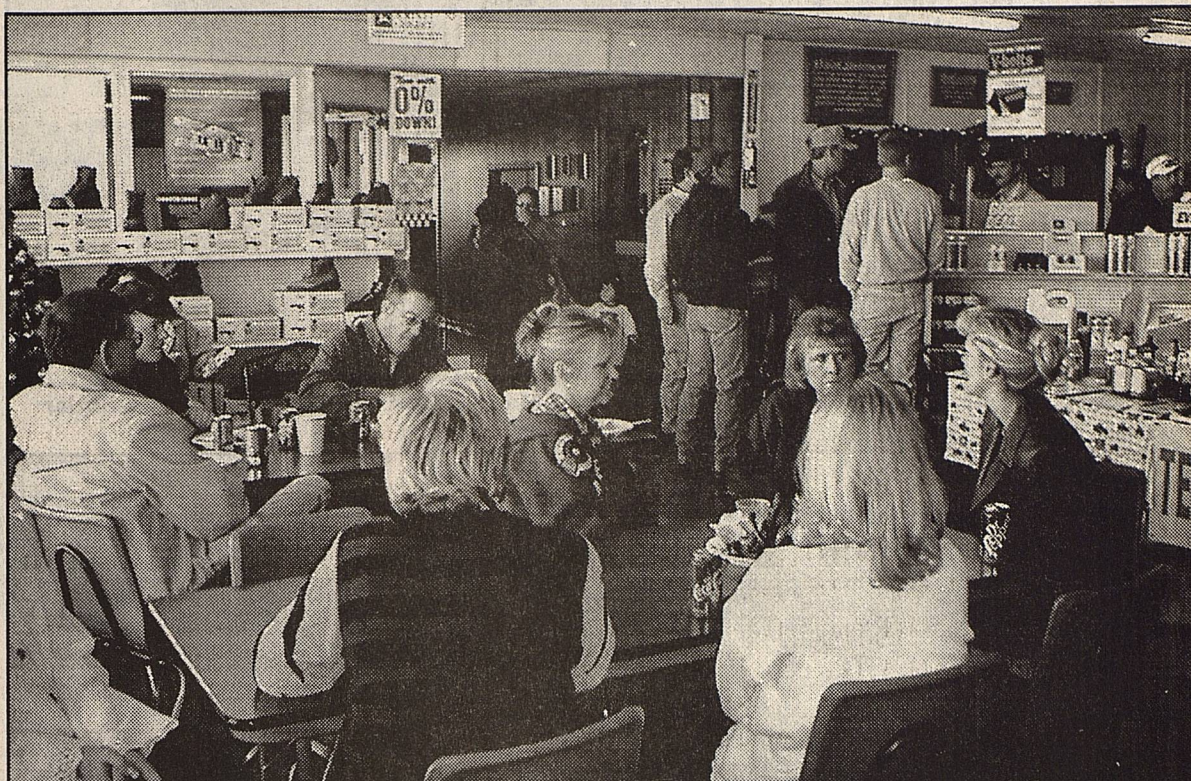
certain to be deliberated.

Budget and Tax items, including possible pay raises for state employees. One recommendation calls for a \$200 per month boost in salaries, still leaving state employees 7 percent below private workers, yet would cost almost \$1 billion.

Criminal Justice; The legislature will assess the placement of individuals identified as or

sidered a risk to public safety in the criminal justice system.

Legislators will address additional protection against hate crimes, life without parole, execution of the mentally retarded, prison capacity concerns, and street gangs. They will closely examine the use of DNA evidence, including extending or removing statutes of limitations on the use of DNA in rape or sexual assault cases.

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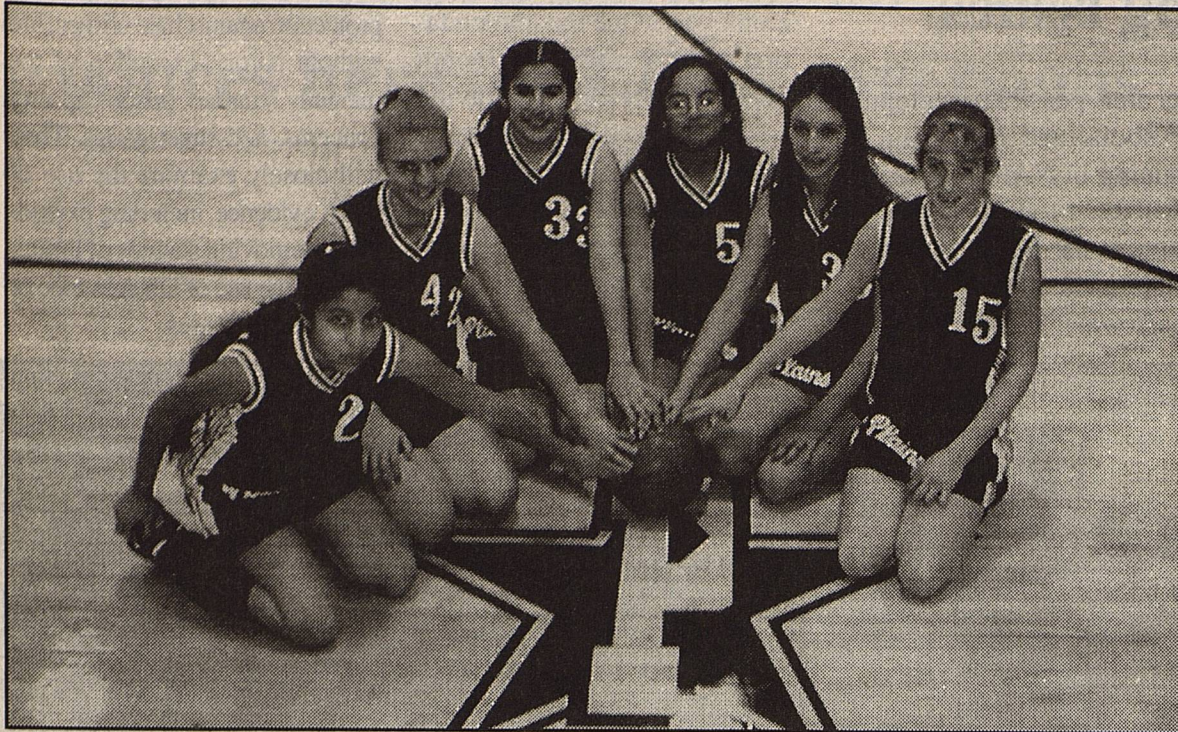
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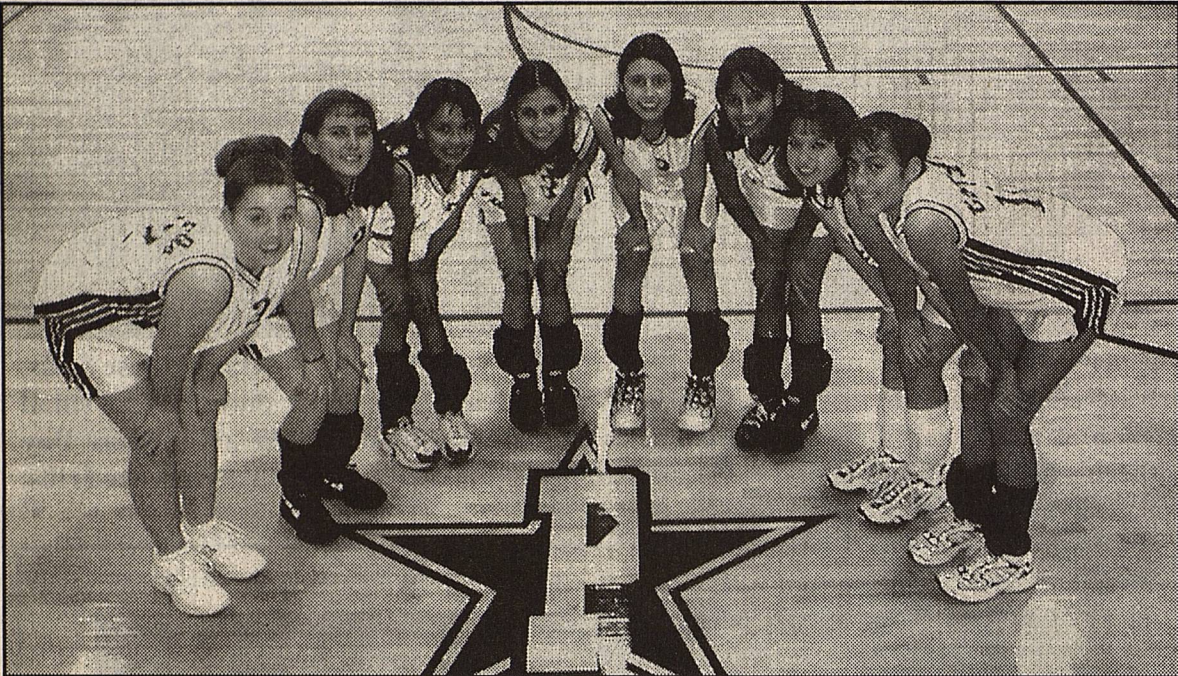

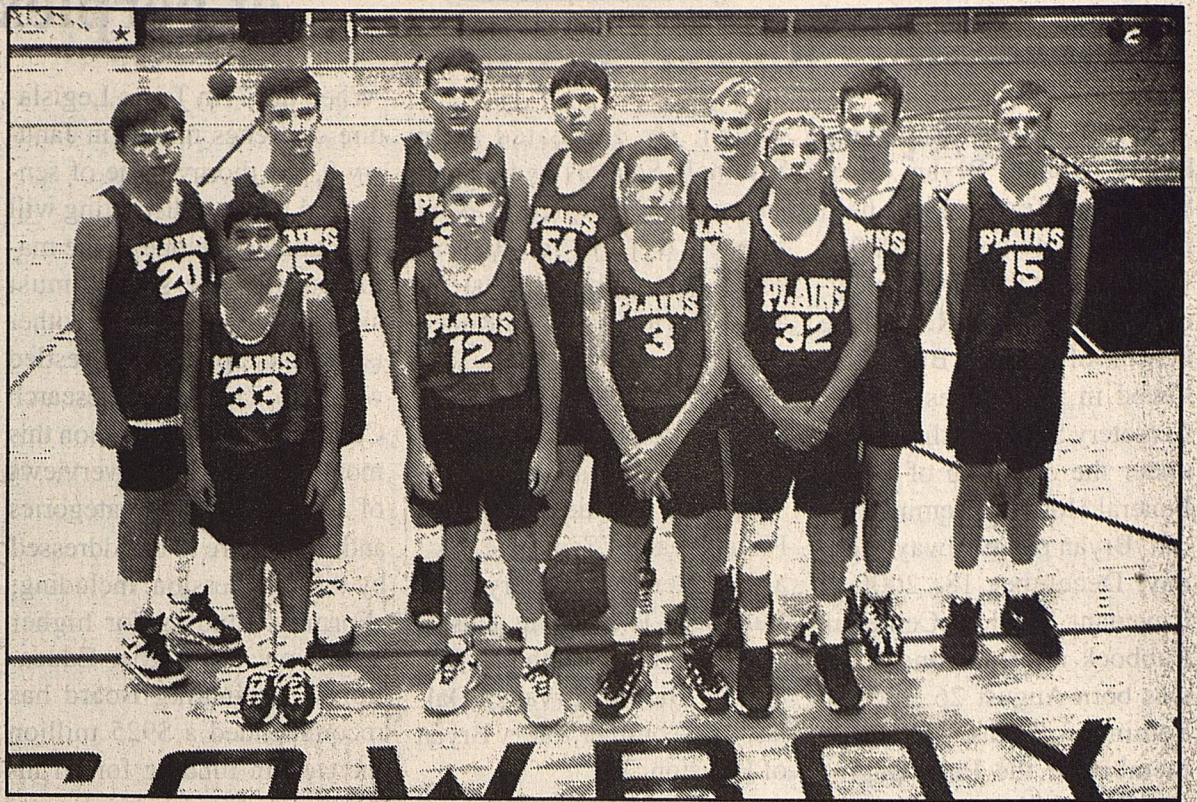
