A drive around the County this weekend found most of the area gins running, but a number of cotton strippers were sitting idle, with producers waiting for weather or sprayed chemicals to halt the growth process and dry the plants out
Most of the irrigated cotton crop has already been sprayed with defoliant, but the unseasonally warm fall is not allowing the chemicals to work as effectively as it should.
Most producers agree a heavy frost, even a freeze, would greatly help in gathering the better than expected crop. The dryland producers whose crops survived the dry growing period don't want to spend additional money on chemicals to kill their cotton, most of them realizing their yields will be down from previous years because of the drought.
As of Tuesday morning, the four area gins reported the following number of ginned bales; Circle 12, 422, Tokio Co-Op, 3600 , Yoakum County Co-Op, 5493 and New Tex. 5476
If the projected freeze occurs late this week, the stripping process should be 'Full Speed Ahead' a few days later.

## mendment 1

The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of $\$ 300$ million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students.

Summary: The proposed amendment permits the legislature to authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed $\$ 300$ million. Under a related statutory provision, the coor dinating board may not issue more than $\$ 100$ million of the authorized $\$ 300$ million of bonds in a single fiscal year The proceeds of the bonds will be used to provide edu cational loans to students.

Arguments For: Col lege attendance, producing a well-educated, productive workforce, contributes to the growth of the state's economy. The state thus has a direct interest in promoting college attendance by ensur ing that adequate studen loans are available at the favorable interest rates acces sible to the state. The need for student loans is increasing because of tuition and fee increases designed to require a student to bear a greater percentage of the actual cost of a higher education. Authorizing additiona bonds for student loans is a reasonable method of moderating the effect of these tuition and fee increases so that higher education remains accessible to all Tex ans.

Arguments Against: Providing student loans is properly a function of the private financial sector. For the in competition with to provide public vate sector at favorable in terest rates available only to the state is inappropriate in the absence of a clear indiation that the private secto is unable to meet loan demand. Although the student loan program has historically been self-supporting, there is no guarantee that it will remain so.••••••••••••••••
