


'Yoakum County Watermelon Roundup'


> She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Plains and a lifelong Texan, living in Plains for 33 years.

Marte Pierce is a junior and is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Joe Pierce.







Applications must be received sixty (60) days before the session date giving time for processing and notifying all parties concerned.



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
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
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
