The Plains School were about to experience an unprecedented growth. A being built being buit to accommodate the first four grades. We dia not have Kindergarten until several years later. The Junior High building became the home for the fifth through the eighth grades. This growth with new building necessi tated another principal for the Junior High School.

Additional rooms and building were needed for the extra growth of pupils espe cially in the first eight grades Elementary and Junior High The new auditorium was of great interest to the district The Junior High building was being renovated to accom modate more classrooms The Elementary at first con sisted of eight classrooms new office space with a com ortable teachers lounge, arge play room for P.E classes and the new and spacious cafeteria. A few years later eight more class rooms were added on the north wing.

Thi was the span for our association with the Plains Schools. Perhaps you noticed I referred to our school as the Plains Common School This was the correct title in 1951. Later this was changed to Plains Independent Schools. This was authorized under the leader ship of Mr. G.D. Kennedy and the school board. W moved from eleven grades in high school to twelve grades

There were many inter esting events during our stay with you. There were many new teachers and adminis trators employed in 1951 We were treated to a well attended and fun filled excitement at the Luna Ranch that first year. Mr. kennedy and Mr. Coffman were called to a meeting at Ropesville for U.I.L. election of officers for the upcoming year. Mr Kennedy suggested I give the response to our welcome. I was about as nervous as a tree full of owls. In that response I remember stating that in most instances of our moving into a new situation and meeting many new riends we are filled with some apprehensions and perhaps some regrets. This is my regret in moving to Plains. "The only regret have after 16 years of previous teaching I am just now getting to be a part of such a vonderful people. We do appreciate the kindness ex tended to us at this first re ception.

Academics were al ways stressed there, but w had some outstanding athletic events. I believe ou volleyball girls teams won more district, regional, and state tournaments than any other time in the history of the school. Our boys toam placed second in the State ournament at Austin under the coaching of the one and only Rip Sewell.

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Some things happened which we had no control--a snow storm that paralyzed our activities for a few days. We had damaging hai storms and a fierce tornado that destroyed buildings and caused considerable dam age to our building program the school plant

Some of us well re member the silly Negro minstrel staged in the audito rium. Some of those fellows acted with hilarity. Our big, olly Dr. Bill who was in the middle of the whole thing was at his best. Some of the other characters were Odus Walser Punk Culwell Walser, Punk Culwell ohnnie Fitzgerald and myself. Here is a hint of some of the conversation between Johnnie and me. He was Rowdy and I was Sugar Daddy.

His greeting was, "How are you doing Sugar My reply, "I'm not feelgo good."
