





Plains ISD drops to Class I - A

The long awaited alignment and re-alignment of many UIL school districts around the state was announced the morning of February 4, and as expected, PISD will return to Class I A ranks for sporting and academic activities during 2002 - 2003. In football, the Cowboys will compete in the 6-A district, comprised of Morton, O'Donnell, Plains, Smyer, Sundown and Whiteface.

Basketball action will take place in the 4-A district, comprised of Anton, Morton, Plains, Smyer, Sundown and Whiteface. At press time, volleyball, baseball and track alignments had not been announced. Plains ISD's return to 1A ranks results from a drop in the high school enrollment census this October, when 156 students were enrolled.




We have changed our Pot Luck & Jamborees to every other month. Our next one will be February 14, 2002.


