## Remember <br> 'Parity' Topic ? <br> A few years back, parity price for farm growers

 and livestock producers was one of the hottest topics in Ag production areas, as well as on Capitol Hill. Parity price, defined simply as what a producer should get for his commodity, based on the cost of production at current cost levels, compared to what he actually receives in the day to day market. The Chart below reflects the ongoing difficulty in achieving this goal of everyone involved in agriculture, a goal which may never again be reached.(Figures from USDA Market Prices Index)

## Texas Tomorrow Fund On

 Track For January Kick-OffState Comptroller John Sharp announced that the state's new prepaid college tuition plan that allows Texas families to lock in the future costs of their children's education at today's prices will go into effect on January 2 , 1996.

The Texas Tomorrow Fund was created to let parents or grandparents purchase college tuition and mandatory fees at any Texas community college or state university well in advance of a student-to-be's enrollment.
"This pay now, learn later plan will help families make sure they're ready for college when their kids are," Sharp said.

Sharp noted that the average tuition at a public college in Texas has risen by more than 14 percent a year over the past decade.
"When Sir Isaac Newton proclaimed that what goes up must come down, he obviously wasn't talking about college tuition rates," Sharp said. "That's why we will soon offer Texans a head start on those rising costs-and the peace of mind of knowing exactly what those costs will be."
