
## SERVICE REMEMBERED

Two important anniversaries occurred in 1995: World War II ended 50 years ago, and it has been 20 years since the U.S. withdrew from Vietnam.

More than 1.5 million Texans participated in these wars, as well as World War I and the Korean War. All told, more than 21,000 Texans died in major wars this century. Nationwide, the war fatalities reached almost 430,000.

Not all soldiers who died during wartime were in combat. In World War I, almost 2,000 Texas soldiers died on U.S. soil, many during the 1918 influenza epidemic.

Women too served in wartime, primarily as nurses. Some 20,000 women served their nation in these war years.





#### GERM WARFARE

Infectious diseases are on the rebound, eluding the weapons of modern medicine

times lethal diseases are common throughout the U.S. When an outbreak occurs, public health departments spring into action, track down through genetic mutation, the source and alert the medical community about symptoms and treatment. Locating raising funds for the state's partnerships and sole microbe quickly can impede the spread of the disease and the chances of its harming, even killing people.

Texas is no stranger to emerging diseases. In some towns along the Texas-Mexico border, hepatitis A infects one in three children by age 8, and nine out of 10 Other critics of the current adults by age 35. Texas has one of the highest rates of tuberculosis (TB) in the U.S. Rabies, cholera and even some areas of Texas.

> inarians and chiropractors must report to the state any patient suspected of having a disease deemed "reportable" under state law. If a disease outbreak occurs, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) -and sometimes federal health officials -- sends epidemiologists to the scene to help local health departments.

> In fiscal 1994, TDH investigated almost 40 incidents of suspected or confirmed outbreaks of infectious diseases. The investigations ranged from a human rabies death to a TB outbreak in an East Texas prison. Meanto monitor the continuing escalation of AIDS and reemerging diseases such as cholera.

Some of the more dangerous and difficult to control diseases include meningitis, botulism, rabies, tuberculosis, ebola, hepatitis A and B, diphtheria, shigellosis and yellow fever.

In Texas, some of the worst health problems occur along the Texas-Mexico border. Health care workers attribute the proliferation of disease in that region to low immunization rates of children against infectious diseases and the unsanitary conditions that are typical of poverty.

With increasing frequency, e World Health Organization, CDC and public health systems are being called on to track down the origin of microbes, determine the risk of infection and keep doctors informed.

Microbes can mutate, play tricks on the body's immune system, outmaneuver drugs and jump species. Sometimes a microbe will trick doctors by producing a new set of

Many infectious and some- symptoms in its victim, making its detection more difficult.

Mundane diseases can mutate into mass killers. The flu bug's ability to survive causing global pandemics while changing itself over generations, can produce a strain that defies the human immune system. In the 9th century, influenza stopped Charlemagne's army in its conquest of Europe, and it killed millions of people worldwide in World War I-claiming more victims than bullets and bombs.

Widespread immunizations--using medical miracles-caused the decline of many viral diseases and the elimination of smallpox worldwide and polio in the Americans.

But infectious diseases are flaring up again. Not only are Physicians, dentists, veter- new diseases emerging, but older ones are reappearing-some, like TB and pertussis, in new and more deadly strains. New forms of TB, malaria and pneumococci can resist modern medicine's most formidable weapons. Mutating microbes can out pace the human immune system and the scientists working to defeat them.

In 1952, penicillin was almost 100 percent effective against clinical staphylococcus; by 1982, the cure rate had dropped below 10 percent. The microbe conquered several other antibiotics, and by 1993 health experts could while, the state also continues use only one antibiotic with certainty against most strains of the disease.

CDC has warned that the U.S. public health infrastructure "is poorly prepared for the emerging disease problems of a rapidly changing world." In fact, the CDC itself is admittedly understaffed in some critical areas.

Many public health facilities are failing to alert the worldwide medical community of outbreaks of dangerous diseases.

Ideally, a reporting system links key hospitals and public health facilities across the globe, but CDC has discovered that of the 34 laboratories throughout the world designed to alert the medical community of a dangerous outbreak, only half are able to diagnose yellow

Combating new and old diseases involves the efforts of local and state health departments working with CDC, the World Health Organization, hospitals, scientists and physicians from universities and research institutions.
