Major Earthquake Hits Haiti; **Many Casualties Expected**



Port-Au-Prince, Haiti - A powerful earthquake strucl Haiti's capital on Tuesday, Janu ary 12, 2010, with withering force, toppling everything from simple shacks to the ornate National Palace. The dead and injured lay in the streets even as strong aftershocks rippled through the impoverished Caribbean country.

Associated Press journalists based in Port-au-Prince said the damage from the quake — the most powerful to hit Haiti in more than 200 years — is staggering even in a country accus-2010, with withering

gering even in a country accus-tomed to tragedy and disaster

tomed to tragedy and disaster.
Thousands of people gathered in
public squares late into the night,
singing hymns and weeping.
Many gravely injured people
sat in the streets early Wednesday, pleading for doctors. With
almost no emergency services to
speak of, the surivors had few
other options.

The scope of the disaster remained unclear early Wednesday, and even a rough estimate of the number of casualties was impossible. But it was clear from a tour of the capital that tens of thousands of people had lost their homes and that many had perished. Many buildings in Haiti are flimsy and dangerous even under normal conditions.

"The hospitals cannot handle

Gerard Gilles, a doctor and for-mer senator, as he helped survivors. "Haiti needs to pray. We all need to pray together." An Associated Press videog-rapher saw a wrecked hospital where people screamed for help in Petionville, a hillside Port-au-Prince district that is home to many diplomats and wealthy Haitians as well as many poor people. people.

member Haiti peacekeeping mission and other U.N. installa-tions were seriously damaged, according to Alain Le Roy, the U.N. peacekeeping chief in New

ground have been severely hampered," Le Ray said in a statement, adding: "For the moment, a large number of personnel remain unaccounted for."

Despite the destruction, the capital was largely peaceful.

The 7.0-magnitude quake struck at 4:53 p.m. Tuesday, leaving large numbers of people unaccounted for, including many of the United Nations personnel who have been keeping the peace in the country since a 2004 rebellion ousted the president.

President Rene Preval and his wife survived the earthquake, according to Robert Manuel, Haiti's ambassador to Mexico. He said he had no other details. Karel Zelenka, a Catholic Re-

lief Services representative in Port-au-Prince, told U.S. col-leagues before phone service failed that "there must be thou-sands of people dead," according

failed that "there must be thousands of people dead," according to a spokeswoman for the aid group, Sara Fajardo.

"He reported that it was just total disaster and chaos, that there were clouds of dust surrounding Port-au-Prince," Fajardo said from the group's offices in Maryland.

State Department spokesman P.J. Crowley said in Washington that U.S. Embassy personnel were "literally in the dark" after power failed.

"They reported a tructures down. They reported a lot of walls down. They did see a number of bodies in the street and on the sidewalk that had been hit by debris. So clearly, there's going to be serious loss of life in this," he said.





In today's text, Jesus prays to his Father. As many times as I have read this passage, I hardly

ever thought about this text as a prayer. I thought this passage was one of Jesus' teaching mo-

As I read these verses again, through the lens of prayer, Jesus' words began to teach me. In his prayer, it seems Jesus touches upon what we can offer in our prayers. What can we offer in prayer? We can offer ...

A Prayer of Praise (Matthew

This verse begins, "At that time . . ." (v. 25). Jesus prays at the right moment. Jesus doesn't wait until a specific time to pray. In that moment, at an opportune time, Jesus offers a prayer of

praise, "I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth" (v. 25). Throughout his earthly ministry, Jesus teaches his disciples, his followers, to pray.

Jesus' words continue to teach us today. When was the last time you offered a prayer of praise? It is easy for us to be thankful and appreciative for what others may have done for us, but in reality, how often do we stop and realize how often do we stop and realize an opportune moment to simply offer a prayer of praise? (What is praise? What does it mean to praise the Father? Why

should we praise the Father
