No Black had ever been elected to Burke County's Commissioners Court although 60 percent of the por ulation is Black. The Supreme Court ordered the county to be divided into five districts.

Lubbock Mayor Bill McAlister told the Lubbook Digest that he believes that the at-large system is the best way to elect the city council.

Black Voting Age Increases

The number of voting age blacks rose 44 percent from 12 million in 1970 to 17 million in 1980, with four states reporting a black electorate of one million or more, according to a new report from the Commerce Department's Bureau. Census

New York in 1980 had the largest number of voting age blacks (1.6 million) followed by California, Texas and Illinois. The increase reflects the lowered voting eligibility to 18 years in all states, and growth of the black

population, up 17.5 percent from 1970. Two-thirds of the District of Columbia's electorate is black. States with the highest proportion of voting age blacks are Mississippi (31 per-


cent), South Carolina and Louisiana (27 percent), Georgia (24 percent), Alabama (23 percent), Mary'and (21 percent), North Carolina (20 percent), and Virginia percent).

In 1980, blacks comprised 10.5 percent of the total voting age population nationally, with 53 percent living in the

South In 1980 9 8 million blacks reported being registered while 8.3 million reported voting in

the 1980 election. The black outmigration from the South that began in World War I and which spread settlement of blacks throughout the United States until the mid-70's considerably equalized the regional distribution of blacks. Nevertheless, one in every six persons of voting age in the South

was black in 1980. The Spanish-origin voting age population comprised about 5.5 percent of the total electorate in 1980. California and Texas together contained half of the Spanish-origin electorate (2.8 million and 1.8 million), followed by New York (1.1 million) and Florida (629,000). Nearly 70 percent of the Hispanic voting age population resided in these four states.

The report notes that women are the majority of the voting age population in all states except Alaska, Hawaii, Nevada, and Wyoming. It projects that the nation's voting age population will reach !70 million in November 1982, a 5 million increase over the4 total for the 1980 election and 29 million more than in November. 1972

Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

A widow's right to Social Security benefits depends in part on her age, whether she has children in her care, and whether she remarries.

A widow may receive benefits at any age if she is caring for a child who is under 16 years of age or disable I and entitled to benefits. The benefits would end when the child reaches 16 or is no longer considered disabled.

Even if a widow does not have a child in her care she can receive benefits if she is at least 60 years old. The amount of the monthly 1/2 payments depends on her age when beneilts start and the amount her husband would have been entitled to or was receiving at the time he died. A widow who begins receiving benefits at age 65 gets 100 percent of the amount her husband would have received if he were still alive; at age 60, however, she would get only 71.5 percent of

A disabled widow can get benefits as early as age 50 but the payment is reduced. A widow who remarries at age 60 or older continues to receive benefits with no reduction in their amount

An important feature of Social Security It its Interest in paying the maximum benefit to which a person is entitled. For example, a woman may be entitled to benefits as a widow as well as to retirement benefits on the basis of her own work record. This offers certain opilons. She can either take reduced retirement benefits at age 62 and then get full widow's benefit at 65, or she can do the reverse-that is, take a full widow's benefit at 62 and then yet the full retirement payment at 65;

Social Security personnel are prepared to compute the options to determine which would be more advantageous and to provide any other information desired. Simply phone, write, or visit any Social Security Of-

When benefits were first paid to a surviving mother in 1940, the benefit was viewed as a means of helping the mother stay at home with the young children during their formative years. The labor force participation for married women was 17 percent in 1940, compared with over 47 percent today. And most women are likely to go back to work once the child enters school.

If you have any questions about how the new law may affect your benefits as a parent, you should call the Social Security Office.

Q. If my 16-year-old son earns over the earnings limit for people who receive Social Security benefits, will this affect my benefits as his mother?

A. No. The son's benefit will be reduced \$1 for every \$2 over \$4,440 a year that he earns, but your benefit will not be affected.

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

The only difference is that blacks must work harder to prove their worth. The man who has his thing together and who is strongly motivated, will find work. Only the prepared will be able to board the train going somewhere. You must learn that black doesn't mean beautiful until it becomes synomynous with 'buckle down and work'.

Each step that you take, says G. Cushionberry, reach back and grab another sister or brother's hand, keep on reaching and stepping. You have got a hell of a climb ahead.

OIC Announces Hiting Program - Rev. Leon H. Sullivan, founder and chairman of the Opportunities Industrailization Centers of America, has announced a massive youth employment effort with the goal of hiring one million disadvantaged young people in the

MEETING BLACK HOUSING NEEDS

"Is There A House In Your Future?"

Every year in this country some half-a-million Black families will buy a house, one about every 60 seconds. It is safe to say that another half million will begin thinking about it. If you are among this group you are perhaps already aware that purchasing a home today is not easy. The purchase is complicated, not only by the myriad new types of mortgages involved, but by the importance of a well chosen home to a family's economic will-being and status. This is one time you cannot afford to make a mistake.

America is often called a "hatton of homeowners," but for a large majority of Blacks a "nation of home occupiers" would more accurately describe the situation. More than three out of five Black families do not own houses, they rent their dwellings. Of the remainder, about 75 percent live in property that is mortgaged or otherwise financed. Among those who are genuine homeowners, most are old enough to be grandparents and retired, so let the choice in buying a home be a good one or at least a thoughtful one.

There is no end to the grestians one might ask in chroning a home, and in fact the more questions, the better chance you have to make a sound selection. For starters, let's begin with a brief checklist of what the first-time homebuyer needs to know in making good.

Searching for a house: Know what you are looking for in terms of price, type of home, general location, schools and neighborhood. Visit as many

houses as possible. Check real estate brokers, neighborhood residents, community organizations, and city hall (about taxes, schools, etc.)

Purchasing Contracts: Before making an offer to purchase a home, you should know all about the house and its problems, how much you are willing to pay; and whether or not the owner is eager to sell. After agreeing on the price, a formal purchase agreement will spell out the terms and conditions of the sale. Before signing an agreement to buy; obtain a lawyer's advice, negotiate the terms, know exactly what the agreement says and take your time.

Financing the house: Banks, insurance companies, credit unions, mortgage companies and homeseller all make mortgage loans. Check several lenders to find the best terms. Obtaining a loan will probable be expensive. You will probably have to pay mortgate application fees, legal fees, appraisal and inspection fees, a loan origination fee and insurance premiums. The lender must give you an estimate of these costs within three days of your loan application.

vives the transfer of title (ownership) of the property to you. The lender will list what you owe the seller, what the seller owes you; you will sign the nortgage note and will then be loaned the money to pay the seller for the house.

Don't unleash the FBI

Suppose you're Jewish and a strong supporter of civil rights for blacks. Then one day you receive — anonymously — a crudely drawn anti-Semitic comic book supposedly produced by a black group to which you have made sizable contributions.

Or say you're the publisher of a newspaper that has always stood for equal opportunity. Then you are informed by a nameless telephone caller that the most respected figure in black America is meeting a white woman for a sexual tryst at an out-of-town hotel.

Or you're the head of a militant black organization that is trying to arrange a coordinated attack on racism by a number of black groups. Then you receive in the mail a death threat apparently written by the leader of the group that you met with the night before.

met with the night before.

Or you're the leader of a group that is planning a demonstration in front of City Hall. A "member" of the group suggests abandoning non-violence in favor of a bloody confrontation with the police.

Or you're running for public office as a reformer. Suddenly your opponent releases documents that "prove" you belonged to a subversive group as a teen-ager.

These aren't plot lines for the latest Robert Ludlum novel,

but real-life scenarios from the annals of the FBI.

This kind of political harrassment was standard operating procedure for the FBI and many state and local police forces until 1976, when public revulsion at the American adoption of police-state tactics normally associated with totalitarian regimes inspired corrective action by Attorney General Edward Levi.

The Attorney General's Guidelines or Domestic Security Investigations — called the Levi Guidelines — restrict the ability of the FBI to investigate lawful political activity. They insure that the agency's investigations are "designed and conducted so as not to limit the full exercise of rights protected by the Constitution and laws of the United States."

One of the most important protections, of course, is the freedom from government-sponsored disinformation. But before 1978, the FBI frequently engaged in the circulation of

disinformation about political dissidents.

Under its Counterintelligence Program (COINTELPRO), the national police agency consistently engaged in conduct described by a U.S. Senate committee as "a sephisticated vigilante operation aimed squarely at preventing the exercise of First Amendment rights of speech and association."

Now the Levi Guidelines are facing revision, as revealed by FBI Director William Webster in June 24 testimony before the Senate Subcommittee on Security and Terrorism. That subcommittee is chaired by Sen. Jeremiah Denton, R-Ala., who has urged increased surveillance of groups that favor such causes as "civil-rights reform, prison reform or a auclear-weapons freeze."

Webster offered no hint at how the Levi Guidelines might be revised. But he did assure conservative Sen. John East, R-N.C., that he "rill be pretty much pleased" with the revi-

Most civil-liberties organizations believe that the current standards are too weak and fail to provide complete protection against the notorious FBI abuses of past years. Any dilution of Levi's prohibitious against politically

Any dilution of Levi's prohibitions against politically motivated investigations would be a step backy ord, and any revisions that please East and Denton could signal a return to the disinformation, harrassment and disruption techniques used so widely in the past.

niques used so widely in the past.

Significantly, no one at the FBI — including Webster — claims that the Levi Guidelines have hampered federal law enforcement in any way.

So, why must they be revised?

If the only answer is to fit the paranoid political fantasies of the Senate's newly dominant right wing, then you had better be careful what you say and do because the FBI may be listening in once again.




