

Elderly Persons May Apply For Financial Aid

Some elderly Texans will receive the cooling assistance automatically. These are people already receiving benefits from Aid to, Families with Dependent Children, Food Stamps, or Supplemental Security Income.

Other low-income households which do not receive the automatic payment will be required to apply for HEAP benefits during an application period from August 3 through August 31. A face-to-face interview is required for certification, as is verification of household income.

Johnston said the following guidelines can be used in determining if an elderly member of a household is eligible for the federally-funded cooling assistance: A household's resources cannot exceen \$1.800 for one person or \$3,000 for more than one one person. The value of the homested, cars, personal and household belongings will not be considered as resources. Household gross monthly income cannot be more than the following figures for eligibility:

Numbers of people in household, in parenthescs, precede income limits: (1 person)--\$296.49; (2 persons)-\$446.49; (3 persons)-\$613.49; (4 persons)--\$756.49; (5 persons)--\$893.49; (6 persons)--\$1044.49; (7 persons)--\$1195.49.

Each county in Texas will have a designated location for households to apply for energy assistance. These locations may be determined by calling the local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources. If there is not a local TDHR office in a particular county, an applicant should contact the nearest TDHR office or any local organization serving the elderly to inquire about the arrangements for that particular county. If certified as eligible for the assistance, applicants should receive their payments within 20 to 30 days.

representing the Labbook Digest , told the commissioners that he agreed with Plan B, "I believe Plan B will be most appropriate, because it gives an opportunity for blacks and other minorities to elect their representative. If ever there was a time it's now for black. folk to have a catalyst to become a part of the political process." Also supporting Chatman was Eddie P. Richardson, Jr., presi-dent of the Lubbock Black Chamber of Commerce. He told the court that he wanted to go on record as supporting Plan B. "We need representation on the County Commissioners Court, and now is the time."

Rolando Rios, representing the Soutwest Voter Registration Project, also appeared before the commissioners court, and pointed out legal requirements of reapportioning the district.

He told the commissioners that plans to be submitted minority groups at this hearing showed the county's 30 percent minority population packed into one or two commissioners precincts. Although noting that gerrymandering is illegal, he said placing the minority population into one or two precincts does not fall in this category. After looking at past history, according to Rios, gerrymandering has been used to exclude minorities from control

of some precincts. Rios said he has advised minority citizens to shoot for a 65 percent minority precinct in order to allow them to elect candidates of their choice.

Roger Settler, the last one to appear at the hearing, brought out the fact that Plans A & B would not allow a black or brown to be chosen. He presented a plan, he believes, would allow better representation. "In order for total representation of blacks and browns, a plan would have to be implemented to include Slaton and other rural areas for this to happen," he said. A. map of his plan was given

to the court. Every ten years, lines are drawn after the U.S. Census Bureau population figures become available. It will be November before the final lines will be declared, according to Judge Rod Shaw, He also made know that the Lubbock County Commissioners Court will decide their plan at the next meeting. "It will be an open meeting and we want anyone who has something to say to be present," concluded Judge Shaw.



We'll Miss You, Mae Simmons

It was last fall when Mrs. Mae D. Simmons was in Lubbock to attend the class reunion of the Classes of 1930 to 1949. While here, she stopped by the Lubbock Digest office. At that time, she had commented that she will perhaps never come this way again. This became true. Last Wednesday, our friend, Mrs. Mae D. Simmons died in Houston.

At this time, we'll just say: "We'll miss you, Mae D. Simmons." You were, without any doubt, a great citizen! You helped mold the lives of many boys and girls in Lubbock. Your participation in various civic organizations has helped too. But, most of all, Mae D. Simmons, we'll miss you because you were a Christian woman who gave what you had and didn't mind it. We'll miss you Mae D. Simmons!!!

Who Will Be Next

"We must pay as well as pray for civil rights progress.'

Those are the words of a black businessman who exemplifies black pinlanthropy at its best. Don King, boxing promoter extraordinaire, is known as a selfeducated and very glib speaker. Put him behind a microphone or in front of some listeners and he can entertain, charm, and overwhelm you with his eloguece. But he also believes in puttig his money where his mouth is.

Don King practices what he preaches - not forgetting from whene you've come; returning something significant to the community which helped make you; sharing caring, and giving in support of your own people; doing all you can to help support the strength of the black community, the black family, and using power and money intelligently and effectively to support our cause.

In February, King, during a visit to Howard University to speak to students, handed out checks totalling \$130,000 to 10 black organizations including the NAACP, the National Urban League, United Negro College Fund, and the National Newspaper Publishers association. Significantly, King presented a \$10,000 check to Dr. LaSalle Leffall, a black physician then the President of the American Cancer Society, for a national campaign to reduce the high incidence of cancer deaths among black men.



Why Not!! The Time Is Now!!

Of enormous concern in the educational field is the fact that well over 40% of Black Youth at age eight.en (18) are still considered "functional illiterate." These are largely unempioyable persons whose reading skills tragically do not equal or surpass fourth grade levels. The Lubbock Digest as well as over 200 Black newspapers across America which belong to B.M.I. and NNPA are working diligently with Dr. Reggie Powe and C.C.I. Ciricolum Concept, Inc. to turn this catastrophic situation around. The Lubbook Digest is working with our local school system to try to get the program in our local schools.

The negative impact of this condition upon our young people and occiety as a whole, in part, is reflected in increasing and devasting crime rates, enormously high unemployment levels, demeaning forms of welfare, non-productivity degrees that spawn inflation, etc.

Almost all of our communities are torn apart ... and some extremely damaged by the often helpful but also sometimes deeply distressing circumstances of bussing our young people (White and Black) long distances from their homes. In many areas, studies have shown that merely sitting next to a white youngster does not insure increased learning skills. Teacher-caring and a security of environment after are admittedly the most productive considerations. The average results of operating under the extremely salutory intentions of the "school integration" umbrella, that has a 40% or better functional illiteracy level, surely indicates that ... at this point other avenues need exploring for the good of both Black and White Americans, We all know that we need "desegration" Getting bogged down in integration as a helpful assist to education often effectively has sidetracked us. We need to get back on track and back to basics.

One of the secondary and quite important intents of school "integration" always has been to assist white Americans by inculcating a better and more realistic image among White Americans of Black Americans and of Black America as a whole. While there is evidence that for greater understanding has been achieved in this regard during this trial much. bitterness and resentment also has been engendered in this process. Many (including this newspaper and writer) believe this aspect now can be achieved in a far better way and that some alternatives should be explored.

A widely-accepted reading skill and image enhancing program ... with proven effectiveness .. has been developed by Circulum Concepts, Inc.

In just two short years time, adherence to this quitesimple program (that is designed to be coupled with a newspaper reading agenda) has raised the reading levels of some youngsters by more than four grade levels.

Curriculum Concepts, Inc. is by far the largest company in its field that provides the editorial, design and production services for such leading text book 医子宫输出 医上颌 publishers as Random House, SRA, McGraw-Hill, Scott Foreman, Ginn, Holt-Rinehart-Winston, American Book Company and many others. Dr. Reggie Powe's staff has over 95 people with over 55 of them being earned PHD's. Curriculm Concepts; Inc. recognizes that one of the dominant means of producing images and developing reading skills is the community newspaper. However, they have found that white oriented newspapers in most instances have proven a poor means of developing wholesome and/or realistic images of Black Americans. Further, some Black-oriented newspapers are extremely poor for developing either reading skills (via their writings or images) because of their emphasis on crimes and on other negatives. The Lubbock Digest was one of more than 200 Black oriented newspapers across America authorized to carry The Assault On Illiteracy program by C.C.L. Black Resources and B.M.I. because of the image the Lubbock Digest portrays and the positive editorials.

In the past several years, King has contributed more than half a million dollars to black causes.

At the PUSH convention in Chicago recently, King, not only contributed another \$10,000 in support of Project Excel and other PUSH programs, but brought with him four of his boxing champions, each inspired to contribute \$1,00C each.

Says King, "Some of our successful blacks, who are products of the black community, the black ghetto, like myself, are so quick to forget who helped make them, the origin of their black roots. As soon as the wrinkles ge, out of their bellies, they proclaim they have done it alone ... made it to the top by themselves."

Added King, "We must deal with the fact that we are our black brothers keeper, whether we want to be or not, and our plight, as blacks struggling for parity in the economic market place, will not be changed, until we help ourselves."

As a boxing promoter who brought the "big purse" to the fighters, King has had a phenomenalgs to riches" saga-from an ex-convict to the "P.T. Barnum of Boxing." But when you reach the mountaintop, as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. discovered, there are many forces out to knock you down, to discredit you to put "the nigger" back in his place.

So, it is true with King. The same FBI that investigated Dr. King, and passed along vicious and malicious rumors to discredit him; the smae FBI that helped destroy the life the woman being impregnated by a member of the Black Panthers, and this same FBI is now allegedly looking into criminal violations in boxing, but, up to now, the focus has been on one person, Don King.

King's No.1 competitior, Bob Arum, who is white, has not been a subject of what the FBI agent in New York described as "comprehensive intestigations." Of course, we know that when a black man moves near the top, whether in politics or the private sector, racism raises its ugly head in many sophisticated forms.

We remember very clearly how the Federal Trade Commission instituted an investigation against Johnson Products regarding the safety of one of its products and refused to make similar checks on Avon and the other major white cosmetic firms. The FTC claim and subquent publicity critically hurt Ceorge Johnson, president of Johnson Products, in the marketplace.

So, Black America, let u, not be so naive to believe that every investigation by federal authorities against blacks in power is justified and the black is not guilty until proven guilty.


In the meantime, we should call upon the Reagan Administration and Attorney General William Smith to explain why one person, Don King, is being penned against the wall, and is the only subject of a prolonged investigation. Either public charges should be filed against King, or we all will believe its part of a racial persecution pict.



For the past few months Hilltop Learning Service Center, 1808 N. Travis, has been faced with finance increases from the local city utilities for facilities not used by the center.

The high utility cost has put the center through budget cuts; in one instance the center shut off one wing and turned the lights off during the day on other wings, according to Jessie Triggs, coordinator of Hilltop Learning Service Center (HLSC).

"These high utility cost

may bring the center and its activities to a close if the situation doesn't get better," Triggs said. HLSC is a community outreach center that aids blacks of the North Heights Amarillo Community and those who need help with clothing, employment, educational training (G.E.D. and tutoring) and basic on the

job training work experience. HLSC is non-profit, a branch of the Texas Panhandle Community -Action Cooperation (T.P.C.A.C.), Argus

pays the utilities for the center. In this instance, the corporation is paying more than the centers share of utilities because the bills of an adjacent park has been added to the centers water and electricity bill causing them to rise out of the budget of T.P.C.A.C. The corporation, T.P.C. A.C., will no longer pay the cost of the centers. utilities and the parks water and light system since the center is priced for the utilities it uses and for the parks utilities it doesen't use; therefore, the center will be closed down to the black community in Amarillo since ther is no sponsor to pky its operating cost. 


