The public school building, at which the meetings were held included Alderson Junior High: Atkins Junior High; Dunbar High School: Evans Junior High: Hardwick Elementary: Hatchinson Junior High; Matthews Junior High; Thompson Junior High and Wilson Junior High. The meetings were held at 7:30 p. m., and all of the meetings were

The Committee 80 members have been working on goals for Lubbock for more than a year now. They have proposed certain goals and have researched the need for each individual goal.

The floor at the meetings was opened for discussion and residents were given the opportunity to

examine the goals Also, everyone that attended the meetings was given a questionnaire which asked for a ranking of the goals that they Jelt were the most important.

Committee 80 will take the public's input and finalize the city's goals for the 1980's. W. M. Pearce. coordinator of Committee 80, said the program had its beginning in the first decade when Commit-

during the 1970's. It was in the early days of Committee 70 that a massive tornado struck Lubbock and laid to waste much of the downtown area.

The goals for the 80's are divided into nine areas - agriculture. cuitoral affairs. economy of the city, education, government and taxation, municipal facilities and services, recreation and entertainment, spirit of Lubbock, and trans-



From its founding in 1915 by the "Father of Black History," Dr. Carter O. Woodson, the Association Afro-American Life and History has been a bulwark organization with the strongest bent toward historical relevance and historical scholarly excellence. If there has been an overriding concern within this organization for the past sixty-four years, it has been participation in, involvement with, and acceptance by historians of America and some other sections of

the world, according to J. Rupert Picott. The question now posed is how can ASLAH become the historical representative of the Elks, the Masons, the Links, the Alpha's and the Zetas, the elderly, and the welfarers? Who writes the history of the Black American? Who puts down on paper for posterity the contributions to the initiation and development of the United States nation. States secretary Picott: the clarion call is for the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History to get on with being the historical organization for the black people of America as well as maintaining the old and for

In spite of the fact that one month will be used in Black History Appreciation Month this year, what is really needed is an ongoing program the year-around that will keep Black life, Black culture, Black inventions, Black discoveries and Black contributions before the American nation each of the 365 days a year. What you think bellringers?

To get back on one of my old soap boxes, it is that Blacks who are in position, places or where ever they are, must remember one thing: Their first priority is their community, no matter what commission, board or committee they may serve on. Your first duty is for your community, noornood or kind. So when you are show cased, you are not greater than, but still a part of and don't you never forget it. No matter how different they tell you that you are not like the rest of them. Remember you

Blacks must make Blacks accountable once they get appointments or positions. If they are not accountable, Blacks must remove them even if the establishment wants them. We must make them accountable. A nigger being a fly in buttermilk does not help the communi-ty, it only amuse white folks. It a nigger gets to a top position, appointment, job, etc. and is not accountable to Black folks, we MUST remove him or her on the spot! NUFF SED!!

This year looks like it may be a two party system with Blacks. If Blacks are not on an ego trip, this can be good, because when you look at it, neither party has done us any special favors. One ignored us and the other took us for granted. Now with a functioning two party system a reality here, we can keep both parties' feet to the fire.

AMERICAN LEADERSHIP AND WORLD ORDER

The initial prolonged reluctance of the United Nations. Security Consell to take embargo initiatives against the government of Iran for fran's failure to comply with the Security Council's mandates has caused many Americans to doubt he effectiveness of the largely Third World international

The Security Council, as we know, had unanimously supported the United States in its demands that the hostages be released-and that the U.S. embassy property be held inviolate. Then the leadership of the United Nations, spearheaded by the Secretary General, Kurt Waldheim, set out on an intensive diplomatic campaign to enforce its directives.

What some representatives of the United States government repeatedly stated was that they would have liked for the United Nations tohave declared a worldwide embargo of Iran, If that failed to bring compliance, then the U.S. would have hoped for Ivan to be expelled from the world body, with the way created for either unilateral military action by the U.S. or cooperative U.N. sponsored military action against Iran. Immediately after these ideas concerning Iran were suggested by the USA, Russia's reaction was instant, and little more was heard on this score.

Furthermore, no such follow-up on its own mandates was forthcoming from the United Nations, Let's examine the situation to see if we may discarn why.

One explanation is that Europe is far too dependent

world trade embargo of Iran. Still, there were strong infiestions that most of the European nations would bow to U.S. pressure for such an embargo. The longer range interests of West Europe, excluding perhaps Portugal, have been tied heavily to the United States.

A similar line of recroning was held that many nonaligned nations have been dependent upon a solidarity of Third World political interests which opposes United States policy. From an American viewpoint, this explanation of non-support for a United Nations trade embargo of Iran has had some plausibility-in that the United States and most of the Third World nations have had opposite voting records on many central issues before

the world body. What the American government has ignor d totally, and the nation's press has noted as though only of minor significance, is at least the possibility that the United States-by its own past actions in the United Nationsmay have done the most to predetermine the recent United Nations tendency toward

The United States government, in this regard, has overlooked the devastating fact that when Security Council sanctions and embargoes have been voted in the past, it has been principally United States' non-cooperation which has countermanded the force of the United Nations' sanctions.

This was the case when the United Nations sought to bring sanctions to bear upon Iranian oil for any against Israel for alleged European nation to join illegal occupation of Arab readily in voting to impose a lands. In this situation,

American ties to Israel were and still are para-nount; and the United States retains its non-acceptance of the world body's will and its attempt to bring about compliance with


Similarly, when sanctions were urged against Rhodesla and South Africa, De United States stood squarely against -and negated-world opinion. Whether right or not in principle in terms of our own perceived self-interests, the United States government, in each of these cases, served to undermine the effectiveness of the United Nations in backing up its mandates through trade embargoes. It also has raised the ire of many of the U.N. member nations, who do not view the U.S. as being either cooperative with or respectful to the U.N. body.

The United States, in the eyes of most of the membership of the United Nations, appeared to enter and remain in the world body more as its patron than as a participant. Much has been made of the fac:-at least in the United States-that the dollar amounts which we give to the United Nations seem disproportionately large. However, in relation to our Gross National Product, we give far less than some other nations. In the United Nations itself; and in most of its subsidiary bodies, the equitable share which the United States should give has not been generally provided.

We still ask "why"-perhaps principally because it has not been altogether easy for Americans, who unhappily-ard impolitelycall themselves publicly "the most powerful nation in the
