No students will be allowed to enroll in the Lubbock Public Schools next year without satisfying the state immunization law. How to be Fair

You are shopping one Saturday morning. Suddenly, you hear a scuffle and notice that a private store guard has arrested a young man and accused him of shoplifting. The young man says that he purchased the item from another store but has lost his sales ticket. The guard says that the item was stolen today from the store. Whom do you believe? Why?

It is Saturday morning and you are enjoying a pleasant day downtown shopping. You go from store to store window-shopping. You buy a wallet from a department store, tell the salesclerk not to wrap it because you want to use it right now. You toss the receipt into a trash can and continue your shopping. Just as you attempt to leave the store the guard asks you if you paid for the wallet that you are holding in your hand. You say that you paid for it earlier. The guard asks for your receipt - which you threw away. The salesclerk does not remember selling it to you. You are placed under arrest. Does your situation make you re-evaluate your feelings about the young man who was arrested for shoplifting?

How frequently do we jump to conclusions? How often do we make assumptions about the personality of other individuals? We judge them to be bad, inferior, dishonest or wrong. However, when we are placed in the similar kind of situation, we tend to want the same kind of sympathy and understanding that we are reluctant to give to others.

It is a common practice for people to dispose of their receipts before leaving a store and once this is done, there is little evidence that they purchased rather than stole the item. Usually, there is little more than an inconvenience but even the loss of time is quite a price to pay when one has committed no wrong. We should give others the same respect and understanding that we desire.

The fact is that most judgments that we make, most decisions that we arrive at, are based on a very limited amount of information. In some cases, we have decided that a particular person is guilty regardless of the crime of which he is accused and regardless of whether or not he is guilty. Most people will judge a person who is poorly-dressed and dirty as the guilty party.

The person who is poorly-educated is often the first to be arrested in a confrontation with a person who is well-dressed and well-educated. And, no questions are asked because we assume that we have all of the answers. We assume that we "know exactly what happened" without having seen it happen.

It is important to remember that if we were to be placed in the position of those whom we prejudice, those whom we consider to be inferior, we would plead for fairness and understanding.

In any situation in which we must make a determination, we might be more righteous and just in our decision if we would conduct the simple procedure of psychologically putting ourselves in the other person's place. And then, understand how it feels to be treated unfairly.

Bentsen Vows To Fight For Vital Programs

Washington, D.C. - Senator Lloyd Bentsen last week said he has assured members of the Black Caucus at the Texas State Legislature in Austin that, while he supports substantial cuts in federal spending, he will fight to maintain a number of federal programs.

"I recently had lunch with members of the Black Caucus in Austin. It was a productive session, with all of us giving our views straight from the shoulder. I told the black lawmakers that I'm voting for substantial cuts in the federal budget, but I also made the point that there are some programs it would be a tragedy to wipe out and I assured them that I'll fight to keep these programs working."

Bentsen noted that he is opposed, for example, to efforts to eliminate minimum Social Security benefits. "There are a lot of older Americans out there - black and white alike - who will really be left in the lurch if this program is eliminated."

"I'm also opposed to cuts in such things as medical care for veterans who defended this country in time of war;

and vocational education, which teaches young Americans a skill so they can get worthwhile work that gives them some sense of satisfaction," Bentsen said.

"I voted against cuts in child nutrition - I think we have to make sure hungry children have food. There are plenty of areas to cut in the federal budget without axing these and other vital programs and I assured members of the Black Caucus in Austin that I will fight for those

programs I believe are needed," Senator Bentsen said.

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Saviour's Day 1981 Recalls Nation of Islam's Glory

Black people of America should not miss the historical significance of the two-day Saviour's Day observance of the Nation of Islam held in Chicago during February.

Thousands of Black Muslims journeyed to this city to participate in what might be called the rebirth of the Nation of Islam. This once powerful symbol of Blackness underwent enormous changes following the death of the Hon. Elijah Muhammad in 1975 and for a time the actual existence of the old Nation of Islam was in jeopardy.

However, after a few months of seeking to adjust to the new directions of the Nation under Wallace D. Muhammad, Minister Louis Farrakhan pulled away and went into seclusion in preparation for revival of the Nation as conceived by the Hon. Elijah Muhammad.

Min. Farrakhan's years of study, mediation and organizing came into focus as the old days of the Nation, including the Fruit of Islam, sprang to life again.

Under the Hon. Elijah Muhammad, the Nation of Islam became an awesome force in the Black Community. This frail and wise man brought to thousands of Blacks a message which miraculously changed lives and gave hope to an oppressed people.

He was able to so inspire drug addicts and alcoholics and criminals that they forsook their crippling ways and gave themselves to the work of the Nation. The Messenger forged a mix of both low income and professional-class Blacks into a movement which, aside from its religious teachings, was based on the philosophy that Blacks must "Do for self."

The Hon. Elijah Muhammad was so successful in developing a strict discipline among his followers that members of the Nation were seen at

once as inordinately polite but fearsome in their beliefs. Many believed that the Nation was a "into the white man" movement. Others saw it as rigidly "pro-Black."

Thousands of Black men and women joined the Nation of Islam and countless others, while non members of the Islamic movement were supporters of The Messengers teachings.

In 1974, Booker Griffin of the Los Angeles Sentinel wrote: "The Nation of Islam is a power that has come. It's appeal is racial and not racist and it has the strength of independence and pride that is lacking in so-called practical movements."

A manifestation of independence and pride was the enormous economic base which the Nation of Islam developed over the years, a base which disappeared after the Hon. Elijah Muhammad died.

Nation-owned businesses dotted Black communities. Food and clothing stores and bakeries prospered. The Nation's entry into the fish business and spectacular. Importing Whiting H and G fish import business was soon putting three million pounds of fish on dinner tables at prices far below normal market levels.

Brothers selling the Nation's newspaper, Muhammad Speaks, were familiar sights in Black communities across the land. The Hon. Elijah Muhammad's messages, reports on activities of the Nation and general news of interest to Black people.

Muhammad Speaks was printed in the Nation's own modern plant, undoubtedly one of the most modern production facilities ever owned by Blacks.

The Nation purchased vast tracts of land in both the North and the South. It built its own school and a 1973 build a \$2 million office building on

Cottage Grove Avenue. At the time that Wallace Muhammad succeeded his father as the leader of the Nation of Islam, he announced that the Black Muslims has assets of \$46 million, including about \$14.5 million in Chicago real estate.

However, Wallace Muhammad pointed the Nation of Islam into different directions through those chartered by his father. Turning the Nation into a strictly spiritual and more orthodox Islamic movement, Wallace Muhammad changed the name of the Nation.

changed his own name and has carried what was once the Nation of Islam into more mainstream channels.

In the process, the economic development base was eliminated and what was once a shining symbol of Blackness faded into apparent oblivion.

However, Minister Louis Farrakhan, who made an effort to adjust to the new directions, found that he could not. Too imbued with the spirit and visions of the Hon. Elijah Muhammad, Min. Farrakhan left the Muslim movement headed by Wallace

Muhammad and began the slow and arduous task of preparing himself to restore the work of The Messenger.

What happened in Chicago was the culmination of years of study and meditation, planning and consultation, organizing meeting with many people across the world. Minister Farrakhan had let it be known publicly that the Message of the Hon. Elijah Muhammad is too precious to die.

Min. Farrakhan gave himself the challenge of carrying on that message. Saviour's Day 1981 was a remarkable successful public beginning.

The Poor Win Right To Lawyer In Child Custody Case

The poor have won an important victory in their continuing fight to keep the government from interfering in their family life.

The 5th Circuit Court of Appeals on March 23, 1981 ruled in the Florida case, Davis v. Page that when the government threatens to take children away from their parents for an extended period of time, then the government is required by the due process clause of the United States Constitution to offer a lawyer to a poor person and that the lawyer be provided unless the poor person knowingly and intelligently gives up his/her right to a lawyer.

West Texas Legal Services a non-profit organization that had represented many of Lubbock's poor in such

cases informally notified the District Attorney's office of the ruling in Davis v. Page. "I expect a modification will be made in their procedures when they represent Lubbock County Children's Protective Services, a unit of Texas Depart-

ment of Human Resources in child custody cases." Legal Services staff attorney Stephen McIntyre said.

West Texas Legal Services is a non-profit organization that provides free legal representation to the poor.

Social Security Cutbacks

Members of the House social security subcommittee, on April 11, changed the date of the annual social security cost-of-living increase from July 3 to October 3, to help achieve budget

savings. The change, which would reduce payments by \$700 million in fiscal 1982 will be implemented in two stages. Instead of receiving a single cost-of-living adjustment on July 3, social security beneficiaries will get half the COLA on May 3, and the other half on October 3. This system will apply to 1982 only. After the date, COLA's will be paid once a year in October. The panel also voted to round down monthly payment checks to the nearest dollar estimating that this would save about \$45 million in 1982 and around \$500 million by 1986.

"Scoop - The Handle"

The Lubbock Digest is part of a national "Assault on Illiteracy." The program is Scoop which was featured on national TV, ABC. This program is distributed by Black Media newspapers across America. It would be beautiful to see this success story in our Lubbock schools.

A consortium of business, civic and fraternal groups has begun to enlist broad support for a unified approach to the serious problem of black youth illiteracy.

H. Naylor Fitzhugh, a former vice president of, and presently a consultant to, Pepsi-Cola, who is an organizer of the "Assault On Illiteracy" program, stressed that neither black nor white employers will be able to hire nearly one half of the black youth who are leaving our high schools each year unable to read at an adult level.

The federal government has announced that some 44 percent of black young people 18 years of age or older who are leaving our high schools each year cannot read beyond the fourth grade level. This means that they cannot read and understand simple labels. With automation performing many jobs previously held by illiterates, this also means that nearly one half of the nation's black youth are creating a young adult and an older adult population consigned to welfare, idleness, drugs and crime. This represents perhaps the most serious emerging social and economic crisis which black people and America as a whole will have to face," according to Reginald Powe, president of Curriculum Concepts, Inc., originators of the "Assault On Illiteracy" program. He adds: "It is crucial that black organizations and black leadership take the

major initiative in the salvaging of our urban youth. We have been left out of the process in a determinative way for the past twenty years during which time the problem of urban functional illiteracy has grown to crisis proportions."

Mr. Powe's organization, the nation's largest developer of basic reading programs - including four of the five "better sellers" - has produced an "at cost" version of its reading development approach which is being offered at or below cost specifically for black-oriented and urban school needs. The basic weekly reader, entitled "Scoop," (handle on illiteracy) is in use in 15 urban school systems and focuses on the fourth through the eighth grades. The attractive black-oriented reader is supplemented by a "fool-proof" Teacher's Guide, a Teacher's Newsletter, a national version of a positive-focused black new digest, called "Greater News," and a monthly family and community-building supplement called "The New National Black MONITOR" which is designed for high school youth and others who are adults sharing in the program.

Groups are being sought on a local and national level to serve as sponsors of the "Assault On Illiteracy" program. Budget Bumps Black Off Bus

Spare change. Has anybody got about \$50 billion to loan the President? Ronald Reagan recently projected a cut in the federal budget for around that amount. Anyone interested in finding a job in government or being trained for a job by government is in big trouble. Fact is, budget cuts proposed by the President might put people on the streets working in bread lines since public transportation and food stamp programs are to be sliced by the Reagan knife.

David Stockman is in charge of preparing the execution for Mr. Reagan. Stockman's expertise apparently is not too far above California Judge Dwight Clark's, whose name was withdrawn for consideration as the number two man in the State Department. Does Mr. Stockman realize the three billion dollars he "lost" in preparing his initial tax cut plans is equal cuts in Medicaid to be made by him for the next three years? Probably not. People who are the innocent seldom see similarities between their conservative actions and human consequences.

Defense spending proposals by President Reagan are to jump 50% while food, education, job training and even transportation support will be slashed by almost 40% by 1984.

Destroying family life and old folks medicare is not what the American people hoped for with the election of a new president. Putting more people under the poverty line places a greater danger to the community at large. Teen-age unemployment remains unconsciously high and needs help to bring it into reason.

Even the sensuous sophisticated San Francisco is succumbing to a growing "unsafe society" due to the unemployed and untrained beginning a life of crime. A 50% Black American young adult unemployment contributes all across the country to a galloping national crime rate. In San Francisco last year, a shocking statistic revealed that 64% of the violent crimes in San Francisco are committed by juveniles under the age of 18.

In the meantime, industry has indicated its lack of charitableness by failing to have given to the established arts. The Business Committee for the Arts says about one percent of the nation's corporations account for more than half the total corporate support for the arts.

President Reagan wants a 50% cut in the poets and writers ragged pocketbooks. But at least artists are used to walking, playing, begging or boasting. Black Americans and other low income workers are going to have to walk to work too if they use public transportation users. Unless people are prepared to pay more for the bus or subways some change in the mode of making it to work will be required because the President's proposed phase out of transit subsidies.

Federal subsidies now support 16% of the cost of public transportation. Take state aid and local assistance out and a 50% increase in bus fares is not impossible.

On a slow day, pull out your life insurance policy, or the bank note on your car, or your apartment lease, and just for the heck of it, see if you can figure out what it says.

"Party of the first part, individually and severally, does assign, transfer and convey unto the aforementioned retainer of the unsecured collateral ... of the whereof, wherebefore and, oh, why not?" You know when you sign one of these contracts that there's trouble lurking in such gobbledeyook somewhere, but if you are like me there is little you can do but shut your eyes, sign and hope for the best. Why can't they speak English? Or Spanish? Or at least Texas, so all us poor Parties, Of The First Part can know what we're getting into and who's getting to us?

Consider this auto-purchase contract from an Austin bank: "Upon failure of Customer to perform any of his obligations hereunder or if Creditor in good faith believes that the prospect of payment of the Obligation or performance of the Contract is impaired, the amount of this Contract legally collectible shall become immediately due and payable at the election of the holder hereof, without notice, and in such event the owner and holder of this Contract may exercise any of the rights of a secured party after default."

That reads like it was drawn up by the firm of Dewey, Cheatum and Howe. What does all that hocus-pocus mean? Simple: "If you miss a single payment on that little 4-wheeled beauty, the banker can make you pay the whole tab, plus take the car back."

So why don't they just say so?

Sen. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi and Rep. Paul Elizondo of San Antonio think that banks, apartment owners, insurance companies and other contract-writing corporations ought

National Society of Pentecostal Studies Elect Black President

The demand by Black Pentecostals for "equal recognition" echoed across the otherwise placid campus of Oral Roberts University recently during the annual meeting of the National Society for Pentecostal Studies (SPS). The society, an annual gathering of scholars representing scores of Pentecostal denominations and charismatic fellowships throughout North America, responded by electing a Black clergyman as its president for 1981: The Rt. Rev. Ithiel Clemmms of Brooklyn, N. Y., a bishop in the Church of God in Christ.

It also heard another Black scholar as a major speaker: Dr. James S. Tinney professor of journalism and political science at Howard University. The Rev. James C. Richardson of Martinsville, Va. was appointed to a committee mandated with bringing a recommendation to the next SPS meeting on how to more fully open the society's membership to Blacks, Hispanics, and others from smaller non-Trinitarian churches, as well as charismatic who cannot subscribe to the SPS "statement of faith." Another participant was the Rev. Mr. Donald R. Heelock, president of Saints Academy, a Church of God in Christ related school in Lexington, Miss.

Dr. James A. Forbes, Jr., a black professor at Union Theological Seminary in New York City, served as keynote speaker for the opening of the SPS conference. He spoke from the subject: "Don't Put God in a Box."

Many of the 250 Black students attending Oral Roberts University were in this opinion: "I didn't realize there were so many Black Pentecostal scholars in the U. S. It makes us proud." For further information contact: Dr. James S. Tinney, P. O. Box 346, Howard University, Washington, D. C. 20059.

Chimes: More blacks are dying from cancer than whites. One black American dies from cancer every 12 minutes. If this trend continues, 6.5 million black Americans will develop cancer - one out of every 4 black people in America. Dr. R. L. Fletcher, M.D. states: "Black people are exposed to more cancer-causing factors. Jobs with the greatest industrial exposure hazards are too often occupied by blacks."

Social Security Notes

Marriage, Divorce May Stop Most Benefits

Most social security benefits to dependents or survivors of retired disabled, or deceased workers end if the person divorces or marries. But benefits to widows and widowers who remarry at age 60 or older are not affected and will continue unchanged.

Benefits to a child getting checks because he or she is under 18, disabled, or under 22 if a full-time student will end if the child marries. Checks to a spouse getting benefits on the record of a retired or disabled worker will end if the marriage ends in divorce unless the spouse is 62 or older and the marriage lasted 10 years or more.

Checks for a widowed mother or father getting benefits because she or he is caring for an entitled child will stop if she or he remarries.

There is an exception to these general rules. If an otherwise eligible person receiving benefits as a widow, widower, or adult disabled in childhood marries a person also receiving one of these kinds of benefits, he or she can continue to receive benefits.

Benefits will also continue if a person receiving benefits as a widowed mother or father or adult disabled in childhood marries a person receiving benefits as a retired or disabled worker. A retired or disabled worker's benefits are never affected if he or she marries or divorces.

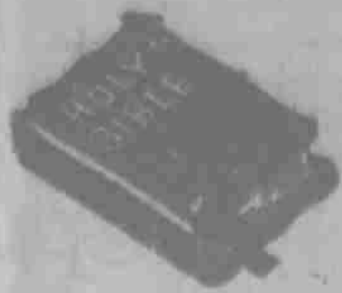

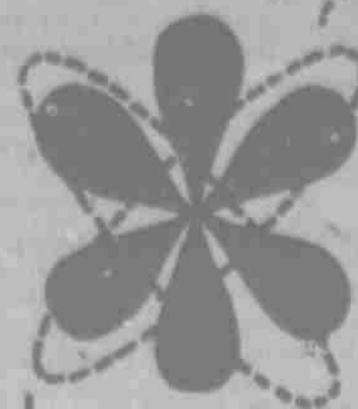

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The KITCHEN BEAT

SAVORY AND TIME-SAVING DEEP-DISH PIE

In today's black American home, cooking is no longer the responsibility of one person. Because of busy and varied schedules, usually every member of the family at some time or another has to prepare personal meals or meals for other members of the family. The Kitchen Beat is designed to meet some needs of the various cooks in the modern black family.

On these spring days, it's more fun to spend time out-of-doors than in the kitchen.

But it's still nice to be able to serve a delicious dinner. Here's an idea for a savory deep-dish pie that really cuts preparation time because it uses canned corned beef, canned potatoes and pie crust mix or sticks, eliminating much of the work.

Just mix the pie crust mix or stick with cornmeal and water, roll out and fill with a mixture of meat, potatoes and cheese. Top with another flaky layer of pie crust and bake. For variety, substitute canned chicken or ham for

the corned beef.

DEEP-DISH CORNED-BEEF PIE

- 1 can (12 ounces) corned beef, cut up (about 2 cups)
- 1 can (16 ounces) whole potatoes, drained and cut up (about 2 cups)
- 2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese (about 8 ounces)
- 1 medium onion, chopped

- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 package (8 ounces) pie crust mix or sticks
- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons water

Heat oven to 375°. Mix corned beef, potatoes, cheese, onion, milk and pepper in bowl. Mix pie crust mix and cornmeal thoroughly. Mix in water, cutting through pastry with fork until pastry loses its stickiness. Roll 1/2 of the pastry into 13-inch square on lightly floured cloth-covered board with floured stockinet-covered rolling pin. Ease into ungreased square pan, 8x8x2 inches. Spoon corned beef mixture into pastry-lined

pan. Roll remaining pastry into 9-inch square. Cut slits in pastry; place over filling. Turn edges under and flute. Cover fluted edges with aluminum foil. Bake 25 minutes; remove aluminum foil. Bake until crust is golden brown, 20 to 25 minutes. Let stand 15 minutes before serving. Cut into 2 1/2-inch squares, 6 servings.

Deep-dish Chicken Pie: Substitute 3 cans (2 1/2 ounces each) chunk chicken (about 2 cups) for the 1 can corned beef.

Deep-dish Ham Pie: Substitute 2 cans (6 1/4 ounces each) chunk ham, cut up (about 2 cups), for the 1 can corned beef.

High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): Heat oven to 400°

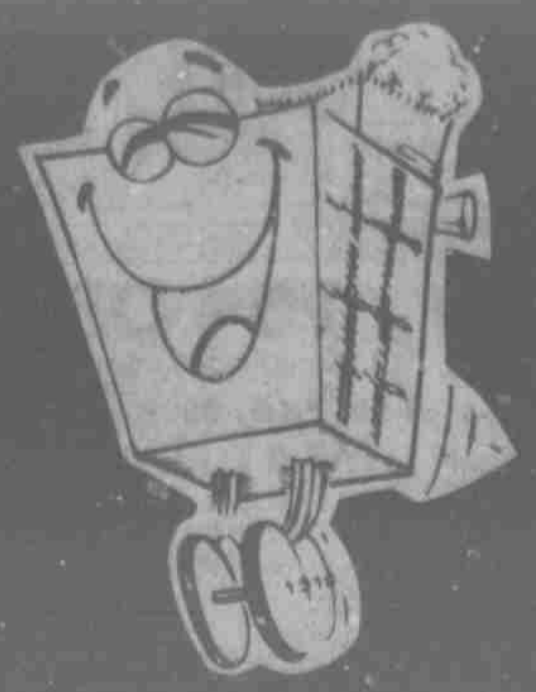
