





Citizens should compel the community Save \$76.6 Billion Using Solar Energy

While strolling through the park one day - actually uid back at a blue's festival in Golden Gate Park in smoking San Francisco, an idea flashed before my eyes. Why not write an article about how poor folk could save on their energy bill by using solar energy?

You see this big dude laying "on the grass" in front of me was wearing a bright yellow t-shirt that asked what's clean, cheap and available? Everybody in front of him could see the answer emblazoned on his belly -solare energy! Think of the savings seven million barrels of oil a day at \$30 per barrel or \$76.6 billion a yearl

Solar Energy Information Data Bank has published a couple of free phamplets entitled "What Your Community Can Do About Energy" and "What Every Community Should Do About Solar Access." Both are available for the asking from Solar Energy Research Institute, 1617 Cole Boulevard, Golden, Colorado 80401. They outline how interested communities encourage the use of renewable energy sources, recycling programs, waste-to-energy

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projects and co-generation projects. Recycling projects are financially sound systems that convert community and individual efforts into a profit. The aluminum and glass industries are active users of recycled materials and many cities and individual citizens have benefited through the sale of SCRAP materials collected separately during regular garbage pick ups. Putting some responsibility on the refuse company to comply with a regular "specials scrap" pick up is a problem for property owners and politicians.

Everyone should favor building waste-to-energy facilities that use municipal solid waste to generate steam, methane gas, or electricity. Such projects cculd include extracting methane gas from old landfalls, burning solid waste to be at buildings and generate electricity, producing a liquid fuel, ethanol from organic garbage or crop wastes.

Cogeneration projects, on the other hand, could capture and use waste heat from electricity generation or energy-intensive manufacturing processes in some places. Saugus, Massachusetts collects its own garbage and garbage from nearby towns to sell to the local General Electric plant for steam production. Probably a good idea for many of the small southern all black towns.

Trenton, New Jersey uses waste heat from an electric generating plant to heat and cool state office buildings in downtown Trenton. This is something any city in the country could give a try and reduce the cost of government to the taxpayers.

Solar space and water heating systems can be more financially attractive in colder, northern parts of teh U. S. than in the "sunbelt" because of higher fuel prices and longer heating seasons in the "frost belt." There are two basic approaches to solar heating and cooling: passive solar and active solar systems. Active systems differ from passive systems in that active systems have moving parts such as fans and pumps. Often active systems use solar collectors. Although it is usually more expensive initially to install a solar collector, fuel for the solar heating system is free and will remain so. Solar collectors are used in all 50 states.

Passive solar systems are normally designed with features such as south facing windows, attached solar greenhouses and Trombe walls that provide a large percentage of their heating, cooling and daytime lighting needs.

Canton, Mississippi has a solar lumber drying kiln. Santa Clara, California has a solar heated and cooled community center. Half Moon, New York has a solar heated and cooled town hall. Reston, Virginia has a solar heated and cooled school. These buildings may have a higher initial construction cost, but they are dramatically less expensive to heat and cool. Passive solar features are usually more effective when incorporated into new construction but additions such as greenhouses can often be addeu to older buildings to help reduce fuel consumption. Communities can cut their fuel bills if the citizens care ennugh to demand a clean, cheap and available energy resource.

Editor Writes on Black Experience: Dear Bob --"We do not begrudge Rev. Jackson's national stature and prominence. He is a national Black leader. We will of course admit that many black citizens will and maybe should support the Republican party. However, we do question the fact that on national television there was the clear impression that the feelings, opinions, and political ideology of Rev. Jesse Jackson was indeed those of the Bluck religious establishment.

"The public at large does not know that Rev. Jesse Jackson, despite his clerical credentials, is not an integral part of the established Black religious community. He does not speak for the millions of Black Baptists, Methodists, Church of God in Christ,

and others throughout the nation. "It seems like White America has always tried to decide who would speak for Black America. This attempt has been a stront element in the rampant racism which permeats this nation. CBS, NBC, and ABC have no right to decide, by picking out whom they will interview, who should be the spokesman for the Ellack religious community.

"The Christian Methodist Episcopal Church does not take partisian stands in political elections. It urges its members to paticipate in the political process as a part of their Christian duty. The Church tries to keep them informed so that they can act intelligently.

"Our church is also sware of the growing conservative mood in this country and that any president must take into account the larger electorate if he is to remain in office ... Yrs, Rev. Jackson, we are of age, we will speak for ourselves. Keep ringing the bell, Bro. Bob. You are doing a good job. Another Black Editor Writes: "Dear Bob -- We cannot believe that Rev. David Abamathy could have made a decision to support Ronald Reagan without a severe search of his soul, as well as consideration of the denunciations which he would be sure to get from friends and foes alike.

"We believe that it represents a growing degree of political sophistication among black leaders who are beginning to react to the American political scene in a more realistic manner.

"Abernathy's deflection deals with two realities: (1) that we cannot allow any administration to come to power in Washington without having representation in that administration no matter how repulsive the administration might appear to be. And (?) we cannot continue to put all of our eggs in our basket. "It has long since been argued that we cannot afford to put all our eggs in one basket. It may be precisely because we have not heeded this warning that the Carter administration has been rather negligent about fulfilling its promises made during the last presidential campaign. Instead of being sent to a person's home, the check is sent directly to his or her financial institution. Some advantages are:

* A person never has to worry about the check being last or stolen.

* A person can leave home on vacation and not worry about the check sitting in a mail box. The money is available in an account.

* A person can save transportation costs and help conserve energy. He or she does not have to go any place and stand in line to cash or deposit the check. * Keeping money in a checking or savings account

is safer than carrying a lot of cash. * A checkbook provides a written record for keeping track of expenses. Checks are often less expensive than money order and cancelled checks

To arrange for direct deposit, a person should complete a direct deposit form, SF-1199. The form can be obtained at any financial institution and the people there will help complete it. A monthly benefit check contains all the information needed for direct deposit.

Completing the form only authorizes deposits into a person's account. Only that person or someone authorized by him or her can make withdrawals.


It is very important for people using direct deposit to keep social security informed of their correct mailing address so they will continue to receive important notices about their social security or SSI checks or about Medicare.
