Public Awarness Mail Fraud Increases

Fraud and misrepresentation of products and services sold by mail left the American consumer millions to consumer millions of dollars poorer again last year but public awareness, reflected by the number of complaints, increased for the second year in a

Postmaster General William F. Bolger, in a continuing effort to heighten the preventive aspects of consumer education, has designated April 25 -May 1, the sixth annual Postal Consumer

Protection Week. "Complaints about mail fraud climbed past 200,000 again during the last fiscal year; Postmaster Elmer J. Reed, Jr. said, "so we know our message about knowing when to say no to ridiculous claims is being heard by more people."

He said the overwhelming majority of companies who are part of the \$89 billion mail-order industry are honest and dedicated to customer satisfaction.

"Even'so," Reed said, "public losses are probably in the billions of dollars when you. consider that mailorder fraud is only one type of scheme that uses the mans." He said charity and rest estate schemes add significantly to public losses.



Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

Students 18 to 22 yetting Social Security checks are reminded about important changes that will reduce or eliminate future benefits. How students are affected will depend primarly on the type of school they are in and when bene'its

1. If you attend college (or other postsecondary school) -- Payments can continue until you firish school, reach age 22, marry or through April 1985, whichever comes first, provided you meet both of these conditions: You were entitled to a Social Security sheck for August 1981 when the law was changed, and you were attending (not just enrolled in) a postsecondary school full time before May 1982. However, be aware of these changes:

* You will receive no checks for May, June, July and August even if in school full time. 'You aren't eligible for cost-of-living increases that are given most Social Security beneficiaries. each summer

Your benefit will be reduced 25 percent each year, starting with the September 1982 check (due October 3).

If you attend post-secondary school and first became entitled to a Social Security check for a month after Augus, 1981, benefits can be paid only for months of full-time attendance through July 1982 (including May, June, and July If you are in school or intend to return to school). You are not eligible after that

2. If you attend high school - Starting August 1982, payments generally can continue only up to the month you are 19 or until the end of the semester cr quarter in which you reach 19, if later. If your school is not on a semester or quarter basis, checks will be paid until you complete the course or for 2 months after the month you are 19. Whichever is first.

By now, you should have received an end-ofschool-year report from the Social Security Administration, if you have not already completed the top of the form, do so right away. Then ask your school registrar or other officials to complete the bottom and return the form. If the form is not promptly returned, benefits will stop.

If you have any questions about changes in student benefits or about completing the form, contact the Social Security office. The number is 762-7381. The people there will be glad to help

Adolescent pregnamuy is a crisis affecting our present and future. One million teens Leconie pregnent each year in the United States Sary one involved may be affected: the young mother, her unborn child, her parents, her partner and his family. in the last five years, nearly three million bables have been born to girls under 20 years of age. Over eight hundred bables were born to girls under 19 years of age in Lubbock last year.

In addition to the social and economical hurdles accompanying unwanted early pregancy, there is a considerable nealth risk to the adolescent and her baby during pregnancy. The death rate caused by complications of pregnancy is much higher for girls who become prganant

before age 15. Toxemia is a specific danger of young pregnancy. The cause 's unknown but contributing factors may be the immaturity of the mother's endocrine system, mainutrition and inadequate prenatal care. Nearly half of all pregnant teens receive no pre-natal



"If you cannot dazzle them with brillance then baffle them with bullshit," read the sign on the front dor of a 3rd Street store in San Francisco's Black and beautiful Hunter's Point community. Congregations of colored men and women of every minority ethnic groups grather in greater numbers as the unemployment rolls rage upward. One out of every six jobs in the United States is affected by the American automobile industry. Now clearly 25 percent of what new car sales there are, go to Japanese importers. This translates into taking away about 300,000 directly realted auto industry jobs.

Jobs in other non-auto relaied areas are also being threatened if not already taken by Japanese manufactured products. Policies to revitalize and protect America's lead in electronic technology are being placed before Congress. Considering Japan graduates four times the number of electronic engineers per capita as the U.S., it may be useless in the long run. In the short run, Reagan's administration has to address the question of open and "fair" trade

Japan's economy will grow at an average inflation-adjustment pace of 4.5 percent a year between fiscal 1983 and 1987, according to the Japan Economic Research Center, For fiscal 1933, beginning in April, the economy will grow 35 percent with the pace accelerating to 4.7 percent in fiscal 1984 and 5.3 percent in fiscal 1985 and 1986. By contrast U. S. economic projections are so dismal as not it be discussed. exceet by a President's political pipe dream.

Americans' personal income fell in Docember for the first time in nearly seven years. Dangerously close to the "severe recession of

Japan which enjoys a \$18 billion trade surplus with the U.S. last year has sent up a trail balloon to divert the attention of the depressed group.

A Japanese-American businessman told the National Governor's Association that Japanese businessmen with the backing of their country's ruling establishment including government leaders are preparing to set up a \$10 billion "recovery fund" to finance job-creating projects in the United States. See second paragraph for possibility. Pretending to over-look the real cause of the Japanese-American trade imbalance is ridiculous.

Japan does not practice fair trade with the United States, Automobile restrictions on U.S. made cars make it verily impossible for U.S. auto manufacturers to sell cars in Japan while it is open season here on U.S. manufactures and jobs. Japan also has "unjustifiable and unfair" import quotas on 27 categories of produces, 22 of them agricultural and marine, according to R. E. Anderson, assistant administrator of international trade policy for the U.S. Agriculture Department. Do you mind passing the salt and pepper, Jan?



Job Training Can Pay Its Own Way

A recent study by a major university on the impact and benefits of Federal job training efforts is indeed timely. Hopefully this data will find its way to open minded individuals within the Reagan administration.

The study strengthens the contention that Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) employees are not on a form of "welfare," as the Reagan administration maintains in fact the report affirms that job training can pay for itself and that such projects are investments in

the future economic growth of our nation. These are among the conclusions reached when the University of Kenser School of Business recently examined the effect of CETA training programs on participants' income. The researchers conducted their study during several three months test periods in 1979 and 1980.

Another conclusion was that the average earned income of persons trained under CETA was 65 percent higher than the income of similar individuals who had failed to secure such training.

In this connection, the study projected that training costs for CETA employees trained in 1980 will be repaid to public treasuries within seven years, as for those trained in 1979, when the nation's economic climate was better, the investment in job training will be repaid in three years. Such quick returns on the job training investment will be realized because of increased tax revenues, lower unemployment insurance outlays, and decreased welfare benefits, all stemming from the trainees improved amployment status.

These findings come at a time what unemployment continues to soar to record levels. Joint House-Senate Labor Subcommittees are grappling with the issue of job training and unemployment. Hearings are being held on the question of jeb training and how to mount assault against joblessness among Blacks and the urban pour.

One method the Reagan administration feels will combat unemployment is the institution of Urban Enterprise Zonen in selected depressed areas. However, this approach will create more ills than it cures, unless efforts are made to humanize the Urban Enterprise Zones concept and broaden the participation of minorities as employees and employers.

As the Urban Enterprise Zones are now proposed, businesses will be allowed to hide under tax shelters until the fiscal plizzard blows over. However, there is no sign that the economic uncertainty is lessening. The Urban Enterprise Zones proposal is receiving opposition in the Biack community because the issue of targarted job training remains a whisper, when the issue should be noted in unmistakable terms.

Without job training, urban centers will become expanding pools of black tension, frustration and discontent. The only way to humanize the Urban Enterprise Zones plan would be to spell out how many jobs will be created for residents who reside within the zones. To further stimpulate econmic development, Black owned businesses must be given a key role. Black enterprise must be allowed to sit on the sidelines while other firms move in to reap all the benefits.

In addition to the creation of jobs within the Urban Enterprise Zones, existing firms outside of these areas should also be encouraged to begin intensified job training programs

It is rather disturbing to note that at a time when Black unemployment stands at 18 percent, many large scale firms are turning to the use of robots instead of residents. From 1979 to the current year, the level of research dollars being allocated towards industrial robots has climbed from \$60. million to \$250 million. Few persons are opposed to automation for its own sake, but automation must be utilized to enhance rather than curtail employment opportunities.

Job training must be woven into any industrial revitilization thrust, so that when expansion and modernization result, those persons most in need of jobs will be prepared to accept them.

The seminary's suit is being morntored closely by religious institutions nationwide as a landmark case involving the issue of the separation of church and state.

WHAT IS A "SMALL BUSINESS"?

What is the true definition of a small business? If one would ask a thousand people, legal and otherwise, no one would give the same answer. From research and statistical reports they normally use as a guideline a gross sale figure to \$200,000 and upward or by the number of employees -- fifty and upward as a frame of reference. The negative effect of the word "small" has put limits on many people in business. They have come to accept this word of limitation and live within its confines, thus lessening the motivation to grow

and expand.

This is the type of negative wording that people write and talk about. There is no room for positive thinking, in other words, subconsciously one blocks out growth. From the sages of all times: "As a man thinketh so is he."

The first thing that should be done with all businesses that are at a point of standstill or decline, the owner(c) should bury the word "small". They should detach this word from their association and refuse to have anyone else give them the title as small business. At no time does the self-employed smart businessperson refer to his business as "small" Big businesses show themseives big and keep getting bigger. They place no limitation as to size on their business nor do thay give others the privilege to do so.





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
