Accordingto startling new data released recently by the U.S. Census Bur eau, the number of uninsured children from birth through age 18 rose for the second year ina row. In the last year alone, anot her 707,000 children have been added to bring the total to more than 9.4 million uninsured children in America. This

These new census numbers clearly indicates that the six years of improvement in the rate of health coverage for children that began in 1999 - largely dust to the success of the state Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) - have ended, and the number of uninsure children is once again on the rise. T he release of these numbers follows closely on the heels of the President's threat veto SCHIP legislation passed by Congress and the issuance of harsh new rules by the BushAdministration that will substantially increase.


