Only 50% Farm Program Signup In Bailey County

As of Friday, February 17, Bailey County farmers had only signed up about 50 percent of the 1100 farms eligible in the county for the 1984 Farm Program, according to information received from Danny Noble local ASCS Executive Director. With the ASCS office scheduled to be closed on Monday, February 20 in observance of a national holiday, that will leave only four days in which to sign up over 500 farms into the program. "This means that we will have to average about 125 farms a day," Noble said, indicating that many a day would create a tremendous work load.

Noble also said that as of Friday, despite talk to the contrary, there has been no extension on the sign-up period. "It will end at 5 p.m. on Friday, February 24, when our office closes here," he said. Producers are reminded that the signup in the 1984 Program is a binding contract and all producers who

share in the crop must sign the contract and return it to the local ASCS office by March 9 in order for the farm to be eligible. Farmers who sign up will be required to plant a cover crop on their acreage conservation reserve (ACR) land, with the cover being established by the end of the current year planting season for spring seeded crops. No weeds will be tolerated on ACR land, Noble said.

Also of extreme interest to producers is the date of February 29, as that is the final date to take title to corn and grain sorghum PIK entitlements. Warehouse receipts must also be picked up by this same date. If they are not claimed (IPK entitlements) they will be forfeited.

City-Area Directory Work Underway Here

Work has begun this week on a comprehensive city directory covering Muleshoe and surrounding rural area, according to the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce. The directory will be issued at three-year intervals by Johnson Publishing Company of Loveland, Colorado, an old established publisher of quality directories.

Material for the directory will be assembled through a thorough canvass of the city and rural homes. Delivery of the book will be made in about 10 months.

The directory will list every person over 18 years of age, with complete information such as wife's name, occupation and employer of the husband and wife, size of the family, designation of home ownership, street and Rural Delivery numbers and telephones for those who live in a house with a telephone. There will also be a street and highway directory with all householders and phone numbers and a numerical telephone guide. There will be a classified business section and a preface giving complete information about the community with a great

many photos of civic and commercial buildings.

Complete plans for the publication were filed with the Chamber of Commerce before a decision was reached on preparation of the book.

School Board Hears Gifted/Talented Program Reports

The Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District met in a regular meeting on Monday, February 13 at 7 p.m. in the School Administration building.

Several reports were offered to the Board, with the first ones being presented by Mrs. Elizabeth Watson, Curriculum Director of the schools. Mrs. Watson pointed out that there are now 44 students in the total program. Those students are identified in areas of giftedness such as general intellectual ability, specific subject matter aptitude, and creative productive thinking to name a few. Students are enrolled in the program ranging from the third grade to the twelfth, and special "blocks" of time are allotted for the classes.

Muleshoe Schools are in a Cooperative with five other schools in Region XVII, including Levelland, Littlefield, Petersburg, Southland and Union.

Students are selected, screened and identified in September of the school year. Then, in October, parents are notified and asked permission for their child to participate. Orientation of both parents, teachers and community is necessary and there is a parent advisory committee. Last year, the Muleshoe High School G/T

program, classes to improve general knowledge for adults (ie. typing classes). Continuing education is also a part of the curriculum, in that courses from SPC are being offered on a regular basis.

Muleshoe ISD will sponsor courses as Masters degree level in the fall of 1984 from either Texas Tech or Wayland University, Mrs. Watson said. A decision on which university will be made on March 23.

In another report, the School Board noted that 24,635 books have been in circulation through the four libraries through January 6.

Superintendent Fuller presented the third six weeks attendance report, and it was noted that the average daily attendance was slightly below the average for the year. He pointed out, however, that since the first and second six weeks were above the predicted level, the administration felt that the average daily attendance for the year would be satisfactory.

Plans for a volunteer program were announced as having been initiated for the 1984-85 school year. Mrs. Gail Witt from Kilgore will be the consultant on the project and will be meeting with school personnel and PTA representatives as well as the faculty advisory council on March 19.

A financial report was given by Assistant Superintendent Tom Jinks which reviewed all bank balances and expenditures in each function of the school budget.

In business action, the board approved the adoption of Update 21, Phases I and II to the local board policy manuals. A report from the Computer Literacy Committee was also accepted by the board for study and recommendations for adopting the program during the coming months.

A resolution was made proclaiming February 20-23 as Patriotic Week in the Muleshoe Schools, and all students and employees were to be encouraged to participate. In further business, the board reaffirmed a resolution by the State Board proclaiming March 5-9 as Texas Public Schools week. Approval was also made of a request to hold a Cinderella Girl Pageant in the High School Auditorium on April 7, 1984.

The Board approved plans to dismiss school at 2:15 on March 23. Busses will leave the high school parking lot at 2:15. Teachers will attend a faculty meeting from 2:30 to 4 p.m. with Texas Tech and Wayland University presenting details of their proposed Masters degree programs.

A tax collection report was given to the Board indicating that \$1,100,194 had been collected on the current year tax roll, which leaves \$58,440 delinquent at this time. This reveals 93.81 percent of the budget collected at the end of January, 1984. A total of this collected money in the amount of \$1,155,897 will be used for local maintenance and \$2,737 will go into interest and sinking funds.

Last on the agenda was an executive session by the board to consider contracts for administrators positions, athletic director, head coaches, supervisors and directors positions. Following the executive session, the board approved the Superintendent's recommendations to re-employ the present staff. Those individuals employed and their positions are as follows:



Record Insurance

Dividends Issued By VA

Administrator of Veterans Affairs Harry N. Walters has announced a record insurance dividend of \$721.8 million for some 3.6 million veterans who have kept their GI life insurance policies in force.

The amount to be paid to policyholders during 1984 is \$48.6 million above the 1983 figure of \$673.2 million. The increase comes from higher interest rates earned by the insurance fund.

"No application for the annual dividend is needed," Walters stressed. "Each policyholder will receive the dividend in the month of the anniversary date of the individual policy, and payments will be made in the manner selected previously by the policyholder" according to the VA chief.

Choices range from cash to the purchase of paid up insurance.


